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PREFACE

There is an increasing need for development statistics, particularly gender disaggregated statistics, as the country continues to tackle the various social and economic challenges present today. Gender statistics can highlight inequalities and reflect the differences that exist in the lifestyles and livelihood of women and men across Nigeria. Indeed, the need to improve the production and use of gender statistics in policy and decision making is backed by the resolutions of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), and the Beijing Platform of Action adopted at the Fourth World Conference on Women in 1995; the adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the Africa Agenda 2063; as well as national priorities encapsulated in the Economic Recovery and Growth Plan (ERGP). Ending all forms of discrimination against women and girls is not only a basic human right, it is also a crucial determinant of accelerated sustainable development, and it has been proven that the empowerment of women and girls has a multiplier effect on economic and inclusive growth in any country.

The Beijing Platform for Action identified twelve critical areas of concern in ensuring women empowerment through full participation in economic, social, political decision-making, poverty, education, health, gender-based violence (domestic violence), armed conflict, economic participation, inequality in power and decision making, lack of advancement opportunities, human rights, women and the media, natural resources and the environment, as well as issues around the girl child. Similarly, the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) lists 52 different gender indicators which aim to measure economic structures, participation in productive activities and access to resources, education, health and related services, public life and decision-making, human rights of women, and the girl child. These indicators and critical areas of concern underscore the significant need for information on the socio-economic status of women and men, and the Platform for Action specifically requires governments to generate and disseminate sex-disaggregated data and information for planning and evaluation as part of institutional mechanisms to advance women (BPA, 1995 - Strategic Objectives A1, A4, A3).

The National Bureau of Statistics, as the apex statistical agency in Nigeria, occupies a unique position in providing both granular and birds eye view on the status of various social, political and economic issues. The data included in this publication have been carefully and systematically collected, compiled, processed and analysed from a wide variety of primary and administrative data sources across the National Statistical System; and should serve as a

useful resource for policy makers at all levels (National, State, & Local), Civil and Private Sector Organizations and the Public.

The conceptual approach of the Statistical Report on Women and Men in Nigeria is in line with those published from 2008 to date i.e., gender disaggregated analysis of key social and economic indicators across several areas of contemporary life within the country.

This edition covers six crucial policy areas of the economy- Population, Health, Education, Work, Power and Decision Making, and Violence against Women (VAW)/Crime. In each of these areas, statistics from primary and secondary sources were identified, compiled, processed and analyzed, highlighting some differences between the status of girls, boys, women and men. Efforts have been made to ensure that these findings are easily accessible and easy to interpret, including the extensive use of graphical presentation and non- technical language. Further improvements have also been made to survey instruments to allow for better gender streamlining, for example the identification of gender profiles from non-traditional gender sectors such as economics has been made more intuitive rather than subjective.

It is my earnest hope that the present publication will be for policymakers, government agencies, civil service organizations, development partners, and the private sector, a critical tool in enabling the socio-political, and economic environment which supports the equal treatment of all its citizens, with special regard to the status of women in the country.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Introduction

In the Beijing Declaration adopted at the Fourth World Conference in 1995 on Women, the participating governments expressed their commitment “to advance the goals of equality, development and peace for all women everywhere in the interest of humanity”. This Statistical Report of Women and Men is being produced annually by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS), under the requirements of the Beijing Platform for Action and the SDGs gender indicators, in order to assess the success of the previously stated goals. This 2019 edition takes a cursory look at the status of women and men in the country over time, based on statistics from relevant Federal and State MDAs, and covers six focal policy areas of the economy: Population, Health, Education, Works, Power and Decision Making, and Violence against Women/Crime (VAW/C).

Concepts and Methods

Data was sourced from relevant Federal MDAs including but not limited to the Federal Ministry of Health, Federal Ministry of Education, National Examination Council (NECO), West Africa Senior Secondary Certificate of Examination (WASSCE), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), Nigeria Police Force, National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons (NAPTIP), National Assembly (NASS), Office of Secretary to the Government of Federation (OSGF) as well as from published sources e.g. NLSS (2018/19), MICS5 (2016/17), Nigeria Demographic and Health Survey (NDHS, 2018) and the 2018 Digest of Education Statistics in Nigeria (UBEC). The analysis of data – inferential statistics and graphics - was performed on Excel software and wherever possible, indicators have been disaggregated on the state level. A summary of indicators for each key thematic area is given below.

Population

Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa and the seventh most populous country in the world¹. In 2020, the population of Nigeria is estimated to be over 206 million compared to over 201 million in 2019 and over 196 million in 2018 (NPopC). Population growth is estimated to

be about 2.6 per cent in 2020. Women constitute 49.95 per cent while men constitute 50.05 per cent. The sex ratio is 100.2 men to 100 women in 2020.

In 2018, the estimated elderly population was 8,629,132 and in 2019 and 2020 it increased to 8,986,055 and 9,370,131 respectively. The percentage of female elderly stood at 46.02, 46.20 and 46.38 for 2018, 2019 and 2020 respectively. (NPopC).

Health

Life expectancy at birth depicts the average number of years a newborn child is expected to live given the current levels of mortality in a country. In 2016, life expectancy for male was 47 years, 51 years for female and 49 years for both (NBS, HDI 2018).

In 2018, the total fertility rate was 5.3 births per woman, crude birth rate was 38 live births per 1,000 women, and adolescent fertility rate was 107 live births per 1,000 women, while approximately 56.8 per cent of pregnant women had 4 or more antenatal care visits within the 12-month period (NDHS, 2018). According to the same report, the use of any contraceptive methods by women currently married or in union (or their partner) was 16.6 per cent in 2018, of which only 12.0 per cent used modern methods, while 83.4 per cent were not using any contraceptive methods.

In 2018, the maternal mortality rate was 512 per 100,000 live births, Under 5 mortality rate was 132 per 1,000 live births (NDHS, 2018). The projected percentage of women with HIV/AIDS increased from 53.1 in 2016 to 55.5, 55.83 and 56.03 in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. Women living with HIV who had access to Antiretroviral Treatment was 69.05 per cent in 2016, declined slightly to 68.71 in 2017 and rose slightly to 68.93 per cent in 2018. (NACA).

In Nigeria number of pregnant women with malaria was 484,269 in 2017 and reduced to 452,380 and 372,577 in 2018 and 2019 respectively. Percentage of female medical Doctors was below 35 per cent for 2017 and 2018 (34.55 and 34.60 per cents respectively) and increased slightly to 35.04 per cent in 2019. Also, the percentage of female dentists was 44.36 per cent in 2017 and increased slightly to 44.40 per cent in 2018 which shows 0.4 per cent point increase and dropped to 40.66 per cent in 2019. (Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria).

Education

From Nigeria Living Standard Survey (NLSS) 2019, literacy rate in English Language among young women and men age 15-24 was 72.3 per cent for female and 78.3 per cent for male in Nigeria. Available data from the Federal Ministry of Education shows that adult/basic literacy

female enrolment rate in 2016 was 48.49 per cent, it decreased to 45.57 per cent in 2017, increased to 50.48 per cent in 2018 and decreased slightly to 49.19 per cent in 2019.

Female enrolment into Nomadic Primary School in 2016, 2017 and 2018 was less than 50 per cent (47.04, 47.32 and 49.72 per cent respectively), and increased to 64.76 per cent in 2019 (National Commission for Nomadic Education). Girls' enrolment into primary school nationwide was below average in the three academic sessions, 47.5 per cent for 2015/16 and 2016/17 and 48.39 for 2017/18 (Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) and Federal Ministry of Education). In 2017, pupils that completed primary 6 in public and private primary school were 2,110,751 and 394,720 respectively, of these, 48.21 per cent of the pupils in public schools and 51.26 per cent of the pupils in private schools were females. From UBEC, Digest of Basic Education Statistics, 2018, total estimated number of children in primary school in Nigeria in 2017/18 that are out of school was 10,193,917; the percentage of females and males was 37.80 per cent and 62.20 per cent respectively. In 2016, 46.69 per cent of pupils that enrolled into JSS were female and slightly increased to 47.42 and 48.31 per cent in 2017 and 2018 respectively. Similarly, female enrolment into Senior Secondary School (SSS) in 2016 was 45.99 per cent and increased very slightly to 46.74 per cent in 2017. Percentage of females who enrolled in Colleges of Education in Nigeria was below average, 47.33 and 46.44 per cent for 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic session respectively.

In total, 40.68 per cent and 41.93 per cent of students who enrolled in polytechnics for the 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic sessions respectively were females (NBTE).

In 2015/16 a total of 4,732 enrolled for National Diploma into Colleges of Health Science of which females accounted for 74.01 per cent, while 2,872 enrolled for Higher National Diploma and 68.84 per cent were female. In 2016/17 academic session, enrolment of female for National Diploma dropped to 71.39 per cent while the female enrolment for Higher National Diploma increased slightly (69.30 per cent). The Out-Turn for the National Diploma and Higher National Diploma in Colleges of Health Science for 2015/2016 was 73.47 per cent and 65.73 per cent respectively. In 2016/2017 academic session, the percentage of female out-turn for National Diploma was 73.73 per cent while it was 74.11 per cent for Higher National Diploma (National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), Kaduna).

Female enrolment in Nigerian universities at undergraduate level was almost the same for the two academic sessions under review (43.87 per cent in 2017/18 and 43.82 per cent in 2018/19). The female enrolment for Postgraduate studies was below 40 per cent (37.56 and 37.97 per cent) in 2017/2018 and 2018/2019 respectively (NUC).

In 2015 - 2017 the percentage of registered female teachers in Primary Schools was 56.79 per cent and dropped in 2018 and 2019 to 56.55 per cent and 56.24 per cent respectively. Between 2015 and 2019, number of registered secondary school teachers remained constant at 50.47 and 49.53 per cent for female and male respectively.

The distribution of females among Academic staff in Nigerian Universities was 24.06 and 23.65 per cent for 2017/18 and 2018/19 academic session respectively. The percentage of female among non-academic staff of Nigerian Universities was 36.26 and 36.00 per cent in 2017/18 and 2018/19 academic session respectively. The percentage of female professors in Nigeria Universities in 2017 was low at 15.43 per cent compared to the male at 84.57 per cent.

Work

The females dominated the male counterpart in participation in the National Open Apprenticeship scheme in 2017 and 2018 with 64.50 and 58.50 per cent respectively. Female employed in SME was 43.43 per cent in 2017. About 42.02 per cent of females are small scale industrialists. (SMEDAN & NBS)

The total number of police officers in 2016 was 244,746 out of which the female officers accounted for 19.09 per cent. The figure dropped to 225,339 and females were 40,059 (17.77 per cent) in 2017. Furthermore, in 2018, there were 203,024 police officers and the females were 19,785 (9.75 per cent). In the three years under reference, females had larger percentage in the rank-and-file cadre than in the senior police officer's cadre. The percentage of females in the Senior Police Officers cadre in 2016 and 2017 were 13.11 and 12.99 per cent respectively and lowest in 2018 (9.06 per cent). Furthermore, female percentage in the rank-and-file cadre is 20.74 per cent in 2016, 19.52 per cent in 2017 and 10.14 per cent in 2018. From the data available, the ratio of a police to citizens was 1:572 in 2016, decreased to 1:621 in 2017 and further decreased to 1:648 in 2018 compared to the United Nations' (UN) standard recommendation of ratio 1:450, data was not available for females in Edo, Ekiti and Enugu states. (Nigeria Police Force).

Data from Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) shows that the total number of civil defence officers nationwide in 2017 and 2018 was 56,441 out of which females were 15,085 (representing 26.73 per cent). However, in 2019, there were 55,919 officers nationwide out of which females were 15,077 (26.96 per cent).

Analyzing by cadre, in 2017 and 2018, females in Superintendent Cadre, Inspectorate cadre and Assistant cadre were 26.53, 31.11 and 22.61 per cents respectively. It was relatively the same in 2019 as percentages of females were 26.82, 31.32 and 22.88 per cents for Superintendent, Inspectorate and Assistant cadre respectively. (NSCDC).

Among employees of Federal MDAs, females on grade level 01 – 17 and Special Grade were 40.58, 43.48 and 42.10 per cents for the years 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. From grade level 01 – 06 the percentage of female was 27.31 per cent in 2017 which increased to 33.53 per cent in 2018 and dropped to 27.49 per cent in 2019. Females in Grade level 15 – 17 recorded 34.17 per cent in 2017, increased to 36.23 per cent in 2018, but slightly dropped to 31.97 per cent in 2019. Female employment for Special Grade was 13.85 per cent in 2017, it dropped to 11.56 per cent in 2018 and increased again to 15.04 per cent in 2019.

Power and Decision Making

Despite all efforts to promote the contribution of women in the domain of politics and decision making, women have continued to record low representation at all tiers and levels of governance although they constitute almost half of the electorate. Available data from the office of the Secretary to Government of the Federation (SGF) reveals number of males and females appointed as Ministers from 2016 - 2019. In 2016 only 7 females were appointed, this decreased in 2017 to only 5 females. Female Ministers appointed in 2018 and 2019 were 6 and 7 respectively. In Nigeria women have never been appointed as secretary to the government of the federation nor elected as President or Vice President since independence and the return of democracy in 1999 to the last election in 2019. Also, women have been under represented in the National Parliament. The highest representation in National Parliament of 7.2 per cent was recorded in 2007-2011, it was 6.6 per cent each in 2011 - 2015 and 2015 - 2019. A total of 6 women and 73 men occupied principal positions in the Senate in 2016 and 2017. The years, 2018 and 2019 have the same figure of 7 women and 72 men as principal officers. In 2016 - 2019, only 6 women occupied the position of committee Chairpersons for each year. In 2018 and 2019 a woman each occupied the position of Minority Senate Leader in the Senate. The current Women representation in National Parliament (2019) is 6.2 per cent (National Assembly).

In Nigeria, 31.87 and 31.98 per cent were female members of National Judicial Officers in 2016 and 2017 respectively, while 2018 recorded 28.86 per cent. No female had been the Chief Justices of Nigeria, President of National Industrial Court and the Chief Registrar of Supreme Court from 2016 to 2018. For the same period, female had been the President of Court of Appeal (National Judicial Council).

Violence Against Women and Crime

Data from the Nigeria Police Force revealed that number of female that experienced Rape/Sexual Abuse in 2017 was 18 out of 26 cases reported. In 2018 and 2019, 62 and 59 cases were reported respectively, of which the number of females were 60 and 56 persons. The

percentage of women age 15 - 49 who have ever experienced physical violence since age 15 increased from 27.8 per cent in 2013 to 31 per cent in 2018. Among ever married women who reported experiencing physical violence, 60.6 per cent suffered it from their 'Current Husband/Partner' in 2013 and slightly decreased to 58.0 per cent in 2018. Among women age 15-49, the percentage that ever experienced sexual violence irrespective of person that committed the act was 7.4 per cent in 2013 and increased to 9.1 per cent in 2018. Greater percentage of incidence of sexual violence against women age 15-49 'ever married' was committed by their 'Current Husband/Partner' (57.9 per cent in 2013 and increased to 64.8 per cent in 2018) followed but not closely by their 'Former Husband/Partner' (21.6 per cent in 2013 and decrease to 18.4 per cent in 2018). In Nigeria about one out of three women (33.4 per cent) age 15-49 have experienced physical or sexual violence in 2018 while it was 29.6 per cent in 2013. The 'Never Married' women were not left out as a reasonable percentage of them suffered this violence from Stranger at 29.2 and 27.6 per cent in 2013 and 2018 respectively. Physical or Sexual Violence was highest among age group 30-39 (31.5 per cent) in 2013 and increased to 34.4 per cent in 2018. All forms of violence against women were higher in 2018 than 2013, as overall prevalence of spousal physical or sexual or emotional violence increased from 24.5 per cent in 2013 to 36.2 per cent in 2018 (NDHS, 2013 and 2018). Among women who had been circumcised, the highest percentage was in 45-49 age group (31.0 per cent) while women between 15 - 19 years old had the lowest percentage (13.7 per cent) (NDHS, 2018). No female was convicted for bank fraud as against 13 males convicted in 2018, three (3) females against 19 males and 1 female against 21 males convicted in 2017 and 2019 respectively. Few females were convicted for advance fee fraud, out of 118 females arrested in 2017 only 5 were convicted, only 1 out 349 females arrested in 2018 was convicted and 4 out 337 females arrested were convicted in 2019. There was a huge gap in the ratio of female to male convicted of economic crime across the years, it was 1 to 101 in 2017, 1 to 104 in 2018 and 13 to 145 in 2019. Seven (7) females were convicted for money laundering in 2019 and no female was convicted in 2017 and 2018. No female was convicted for the crime of embezzlement and bribery/corruption throughout the three years (2017-2019). Only 8 females were convicted for Cyber Crime in 2019 and none for 2017 and 2018 (EFCC). Female suspects arrested for drug related offences was 6.21 per cent in 2017, increased slightly to 7.18 per cent in 2018 and increased further to 9.58 per cent in 2019 (NDLEA). Females in the age groups (12-17 years) and 18+ were mostly trafficked (71.17 to 82.96 per cent for age group 12-17 and 84.05 to 90.88 per cent for age group 18+). Among children trafficked, 72.28 per cent were trafficked in 2016, 31.56 percent in 2017, 67.81 percent in 2018 and 58.6 percent in 2019 were females. The percentage of female trafficked for forced labor was 43.48 in 2016 and increased significantly to 78.53 in 2017, dropped slightly to 70 in 2018 and decreased to 9.23 in 2019. In 2016, all

victims trafficked for prostitution were females (100 per cent), however, it was 97.94, 97.58 and 99.59 per cent in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively.

Introduction

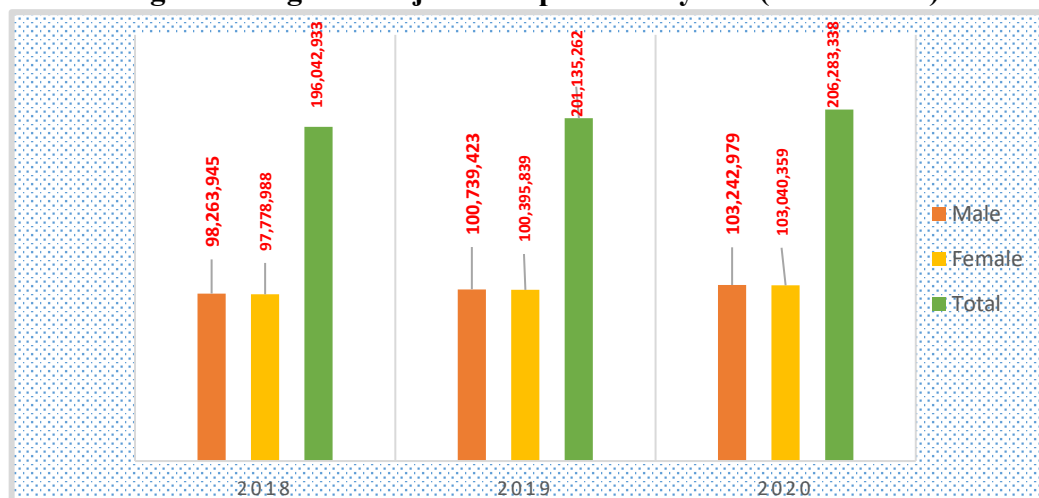
Population size and growth patterns directly affect human living conditions across the globe. This chapter elaborates, first, on general population dynamics and patterns in the country and the population of elderly men and women.

A. General Population Patterns

1. Population and Growth Rate

Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa and the seventh most populous country in the world². In 2020, the population of Nigeria is estimated to be 206 million compared to 201 million in 2019 and 196 million in 2018 (NPopC). Though, international migration has played a very negligible role in determining the population of Nigeria, increasing fertility and decreasing mortality rates have contributed significantly to the very high rate of population growth, which is estimated to be about 2.6 per cent in 2020. Women constitute 49.95 per cent while men constitute 50.05 per cent. The sex ratio is 100.2 men to 100 women in 2020. See Figure 1 below and ST 1 in the Statistical Annexes.

2. Distribution of Population of the Elderly (60+ Years) by Year and Sex

In Nigeria, both women and men over 60 year's old are regarded as elderly. The demographic phenomenon in Nigeria is that the proportion of young population is constantly increasing. Great transformations usually occur in societies where the majority of the population are young, active and vibrant, while societies with significant percentage of the elderly face challenges, primarily in ensuring that the access to adequate living conditions throughout the extended lifespan is guaranteed. In 2018, the estimated elderly population was 8,629,132 and in 2019 and 2020 it increased to 8,986,055 and 9,370,131 respectively. The percentage of female elderly stood at 46.02, 46.20 and 46.38 for 2018, 2019 and 2020 respectively. See Table 1 below.

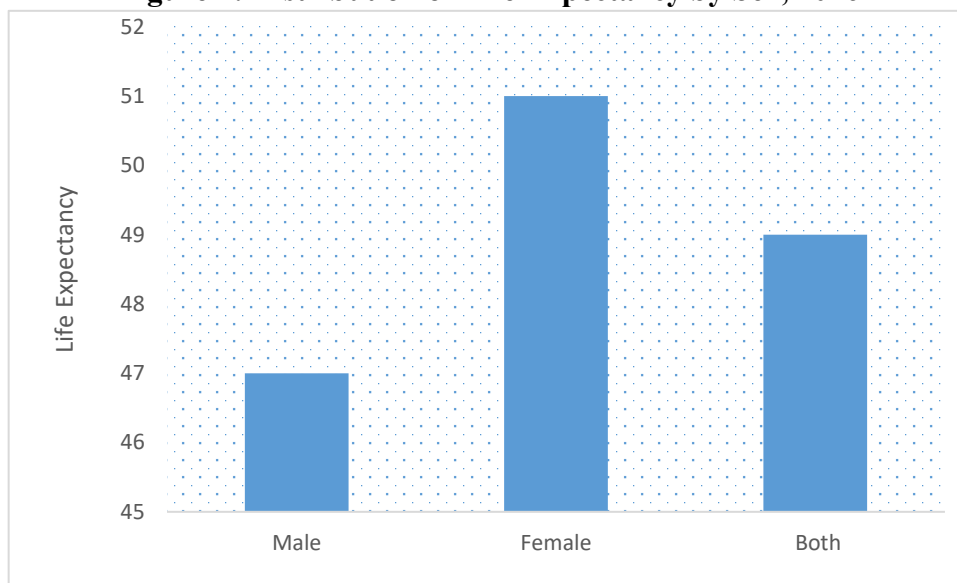
Women have the right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health that is essential to their life and well-being and their ability to participate in all areas of public and private life as posited in the 1995 Beijing Platform for Action (BPA, 1995). Women need to be healthy in order to realize their full potential. This includes proper nutrition, sexual and reproductive rights, and mental health, as well as freedom from violence. Health therefore “is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity” according to World Health Organization (WHO). However, gender inequality persists in the provision of health services and women often find it challenging to access proper healthcare. Empowering women with the necessary knowledge and skills to fulfil these health potentials, while ensuring availability and accessibility of primary healthcare, is not only essential to their well-being but also to that of their children and families. Tackling gender inequalities in the provision of health services will enable all women and men to enjoy healthier lives, which will ultimately lead to greater gender equality in all spheres of life and fulfillment of Sustainable Development

Goals (SDG) 3 which is “ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages” by 2030.

A. Life Expectancy at Birth

Life expectancy at birth depicts the average number of years a newborn child is expected to live given the current levels of mortality in a country. This health indicator is derived from the age-specific mortality rates, and it provides a picture of the overall health status of a population as well as allowing for the investigation of the longevity of women and men separately. In 2016, life expectancy was 47 years for male, 51 years for female, and 49 years for both male and female. (Figure 2 below).

Cross River state had the highest life expectancy for female which was 56 years, followed by FCT, Osun and Oyo state (55 years). Osun state had the highest life expectancy for male (52 years), followed by Oyo and Cross River states (51 years). Adamawa state had the least life expectancy for female (44 years) and for male (42 years). See Table 2 below.

B. Reproductive Health

The reproductive years of women begin at puberty through menopause, and this is the period when most women experience important life events such as becoming sexually active, getting married and reproducing. It is also at these time that particular health risks, especially pregnancy and childbirth related complications cause ill-health and even death for many women of childbearing age, which SDG 3.7 (“ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health-care services, including for family planning, information and education, and the integration of reproductive health into national strategies and

programmes”) is set to end by 2030. The reproductive age is within the 15-49 years age group.

1. Total Fertility Rate

Fertility, as a demographic indicator, refers to the ability of a human being to reproduce another human being, as currently being measured by the number of children ever born. Practices in childbearing depend on culture, tradition, educational level and the overall level of development of a particular society or community. Also, the age an individual becomes sexually active and the availability of contraception are two key determinants of fertility rate. The most commonly used measure or indicator of fertility is the total fertility rate (TFR), which is, the number of children a woman bears over her entire childbearing years. From NDHS, 2018 the total fertility rate was 5.3 implying that each woman in Nigeria had an average of 5 children during their entire childbearing years. Total Fertility Rate (TFR) was lower in urban area than in rural area, 4.5 for Urban residents and 5.9 for Rural residents.

2. Adolescent Fertility

Adolescent Fertility Rate is defined as the annual number of births to women aged 15–19 years per 1,000 women. It is also referred to as the age-specific fertility rate for women aged 15–19 years. From the table 3 below adolescent Fertility rate was 107 live births per 1000 women, 58 live births per 1000 women for urban residents compared to 144 live births per 1000 rural women.

3. Crude Birth Rate

Crude Birth Rate (CBR) is annual number of live births per 1000 population. From NDHS, 2018, Crude birth rate was 38 live births per 1000 in Nigeria. Crude Birth Rate (CBR) was lower for urban residents than for rural residents. The figures are 34 and 42 live births per 1000 women for Urban and Rural residents respectively during the years under reference. (Table 3 below).

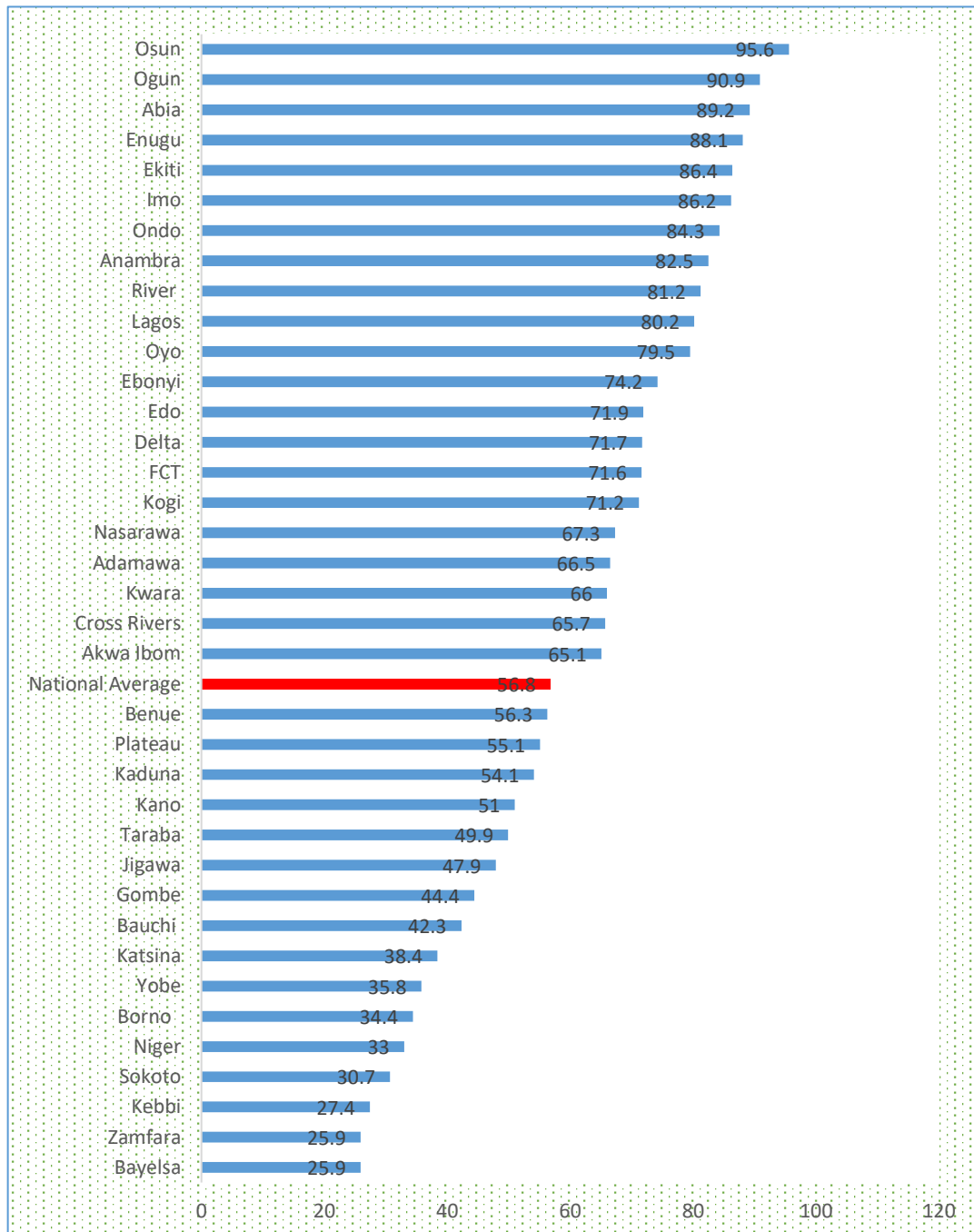

4. Antenatal Care

Antenatal care is known as the care given to a pregnant woman from the first trimester to the third trimester till delivery of the baby. The standard of antenatal care requires a pregnant woman to visit a hospital or Primary Health Care (PHC) at least four times or more during the duration of the pregnancy to improve the outcome of pregnancy and birth. The practice is not only to monitor the health of the mother and fetus but also allow identification of potential complications. In addition, it provides women with information of needed nutrition during pregnancy and breastfeeding. From the figure 3 below, 56.8 per cent of pregnant women had 4 or more antenatal care visits in 2018. Osun State had the highest percentage of 95.6 in 2018.

Bayelsa and Zamfara state had lowest percentage (25.9) of women who had 4 or more antenatal care in 2018.

5. Contraceptive Use

Couples can use any contraceptive methods to limit or space the number of children they should have, and this will align with part of SDG 3.7 on family planning. Information on the use of any method of contraceptives or none at all is provided by NDHS, 2018.

In 2018, the percentage of women who are currently married or in union who are using or whose partner is using contraceptive method for pregnancy prevention and family planning was 16.6

per cent in which only 12.0 per cent are using modern methods, while 83.4 per cent are not using any method. Yobe state recorded the highest percentage (98.1 per cent) of “No Method” followed by Sokoto state (97.7 per cent) and Lagos state had the lowest percentage of 50.6. (Table 4 above).

C. Maternal Mortality Ratio

Maternal mortality or maternal death is the death of a woman during pregnancy or childbirth or within 42 days after the birth or termination of pregnancy. Maternal mortality ratio is the number of maternal deaths per 100,000 live births. This has brought about the interest of international community to reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births (SDG3:1). In Nigeria, the maternal mortality ratio for the 7-year period before the 2018 NDHS is estimated at 512 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births.

D. Early Childhood Mortality Rate

Information on infant and child mortality is relevant to demographic assessment of a country’s population, socioeconomic development and quality of life. It can also help identify children who may be at high risk of death and lead to strategies to reduce such risks as enshrined in SDG 3.2 (end preventable deaths of newborns and children under 5 years of age by 2030).

1. Neonatal mortality Rate

Neonatal mortality is defined as the probability of children dying within the first month of birth. The result of the recent NDHS, 2018 revealed that neonatal mortality rate stood at 39 per 1,000 live births across the Nation. Bayelsa State had the least neonatal mortality rate of 13 followed closely by Ogun State with 15 per 1,000 live births while Kaduna State had the highest neonatal mortality of 63 per 1,000 live births. (Table 5 below).

2. Infant Mortality Rate

Infant mortality rate is the probability of children dying before their first birthday. Infant Mortality rate was 67 per 1,000 live births in 2018 as recorded in NDHS, 2018 report. Kebbi State had the highest infant mortality rate of 112 while Ogun State had the lowest infant mortality of 19 per 1,000 live births. (Table 5 below).

3. Child Mortality Rate

Child mortality is the probability of a child dying between the first and the fifth birthday. Child mortality rate was 69 per 1,000 live births nationally. Kebbi State had the highest in child mortality of 157 while Bayelsa recorded the lowest position in child mortality of 8 per 1,000 live births. (Table 5 above).

4. Under 5 Mortality

Under-5 mortality is the probability of a child dying between birth and the fifth birthday, i.e., before the fifth birthday. This was 132 per 1,000 live births in the 2018.

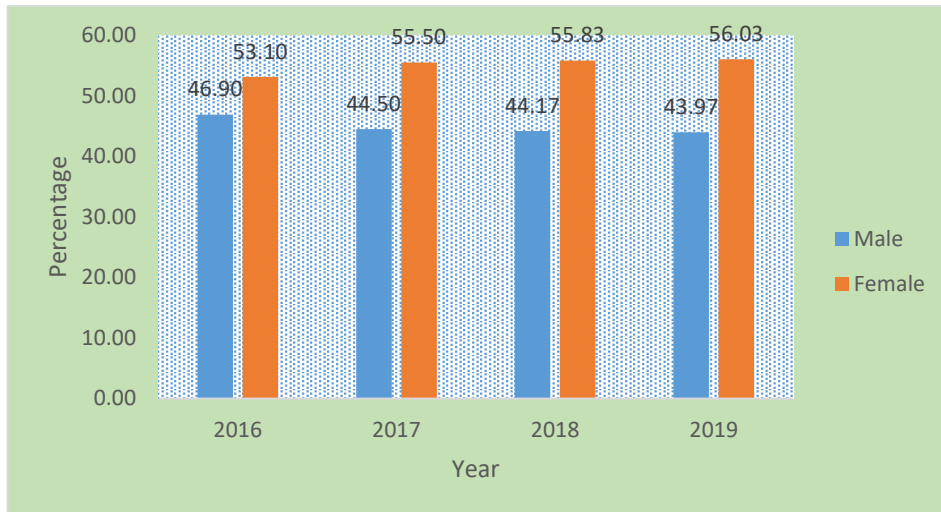
Across States, Kebbi State maintained the lead even in under-5 mortality as it recorded 252 mortality of under-5 children per 1,000 live births while Ogun State had the least at 30 followed closely by Bayelsa State with 31 per 1000 live births. (Table 5 above).

E. HIV and AIDS

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is one of the most serious public health and development challenges facing the world today. AIDS is caused by the Human Immune Deficiency Virus (HIV). HIV weakens the immune system, making the body susceptible to secondary infections and opportunistic diseases. Without treatment, HIV infection leads to AIDS, which is invariably fatal. The predominant mode of HIV transmission is sexual contact. Other modes of transmission are unsafe injections, use of tainted blood supplies during blood transfusion and mother-to-child transmission (in which the mother passes HIV to her child during pregnancy, delivery or breastfeeding). Nationally, HIV/AIDS programs have received a boost through the efforts of the government and the support of development partners, which has led to a scale up of prevention, care and treatment programs aimed at combating the disease (NDHS, 2018).

Since early 1980s, HIV/AIDS has been a critical health issue for women and men in Nigeria. The epidemic continued to undermine development efforts worldwide and mostly afflict populations already beset by extreme poverty. It has been noted to particularly affect the working population, preventing women and men from making meaningful contributions to economic and social development while impacting heavily on the structure of families. At the household level, the epidemic increases the burden of care and erodes savings. SDG Goal 3 – Target 3 aims at ending the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and neglected tropical diseases and combat hepatitis, water-borne Diseases and other communicable diseases by 2030. Recent statistics indicate that approximately half of the projected population of HIV patients are women. Figure 4 below shows the percentage distribution of projected population who had HIV/AIDS from (2016-2019). The percentage of women with HIV/AIDS increased from 53.1 per cent in 2016 to 55.5, 55.83 and 56.03 per cents in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. However, men with HIV/AIDS decreased from 46.9 per cent in 2016 to 44.5, 44.17 and 43.97 per cent in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively.

Figure 4: Percentage Distribution of Projected HIV Patients by Year and Sex

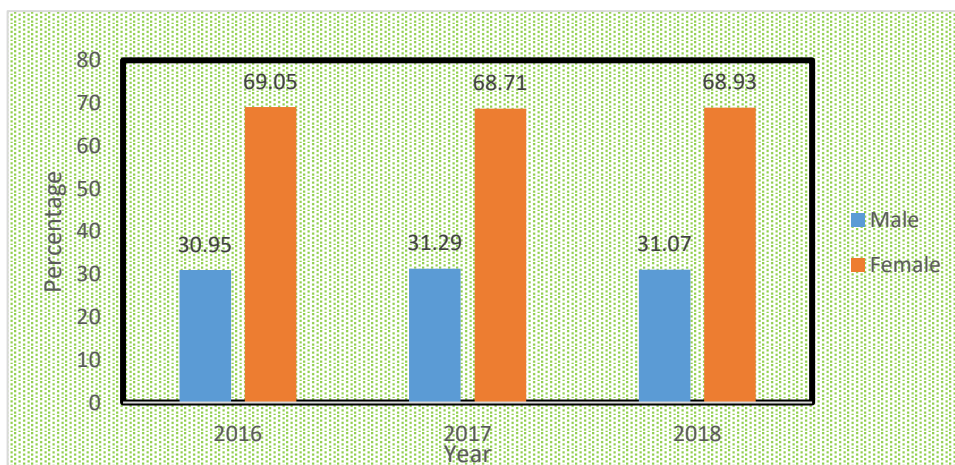


1. Percentage of HIV/AIDS Patients Having Access to Antiretroviral Treatment (2016-2018)

Figure 5 below shows the percentage of HIV/AIDS patients who had access to antiretroviral treatment by sex from 2016 to 2018. The percentage of female patients in 2016 was 69.05 per cent. It however declined slightly in 2017 to 68.71 per cent and rose to 68.93 per cent in 2018.

Male patients witnessed increase from 30.95 per cent in 2016 to 31.29 per cent in 2017, however it dropped to 31.07 per cent in 2018.

Figure 5: Percentage of HIV/AIDS Patients having Access to Antiretroviral Treatment (2016-2018)



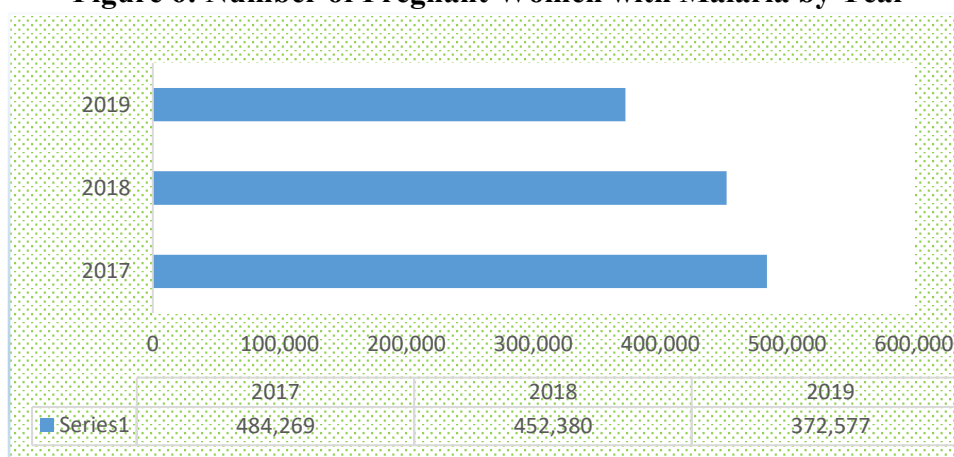
F. Reported Cases of Pregnant Women with Malaria

According to World Health Organization (WHO), malaria infection during pregnancy is a significant public health problem with high risks for the pregnant women, her fetus and the newborn child. Malaria in low transmission settings (where patients have relatively little

acquired immunity to malaria) can lead to spontaneous abortion, stillbirth, premature birth and low birth weight, while infant mortality might be the result for malaria in high transmission settings.

The number of pregnant women with malaria across all states decreased slightly from 484,269 in 2017 to 452,380 in 2018 which shows 6.58 per cent decrease compared to 2017 and further decreased to 372,577 in 2019 (17.64 per cent decrease compared to 2018). (Figure 6 below). Sokoto state with 54,006 had the highest number of pregnant women that suffered from malaria in 2017. In 2018 & 2019, Borno state recorded the highest number of 61,154 and 55,161 respectively. Ekiti state had the lowest number of 179, 194 and 304 in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. (Appendix, ST 4)

G. Health Personnel

1. Doctors and Dentists

From Table 6 below, on the average, percentage of female medical Doctors was below 35 per cent for 2017 and 2018 and increased slightly to 35.04 per cent in 2019. Also, the percentage of female dentists was 44.36 in 2017 and increased slightly to 44.40 in 2018 which shows 0.4 percent point increase and dropped to 40.66 percent in 2019.

CHAPTER 3: EDUCATION

Key Findings

- *From Nigeria Living Standard Survey (NLSS) 2019, literacy rate in English Language among young women and men age 15-24 was 72.3 percent for female and 78.3 percent for male in Nigeria*

- *Total estimated number of children in primary school in Nigeria that are out of school in 2017/18 was 10,193,917; the percentage of female and male was 37.80 per cent and 62.20 per cent respectively.*
- *In 2016, 46.69 per cent of female enrolled into JSS and slightly increased to 47.42 and 48.31 per cent in 2017 and 2018 respectively.*
- *Percentage of females who enrolled in colleges of education in Nigeria for 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic sessions was below average, 47.33 and 46.44 percent respectively*
- *In 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic sessions, 40.69 percent and 41.93 percent of students who enrolled in polytechnics were female respectively.*
- *Female enrolment in Nigerian universities at undergraduate level was almost the same for the two academic sessions under review (43.87 percent in 2017/18 and 43.82 percent in 2018/19).*
- *The female enrolment for Postgraduate studies was below 40 percent in 2017/2018 and 2018/2019.*
- *The distribution of females amongst Academic staff in Nigerian University was 24.06 percent and 23.65 percent for 2017/18 and 2018/19 academic session respectively*
- *The percentage of female professors in Nigeria Universities in 2017 was low at 15.43 compared to the male at 84.57.*

Introduction

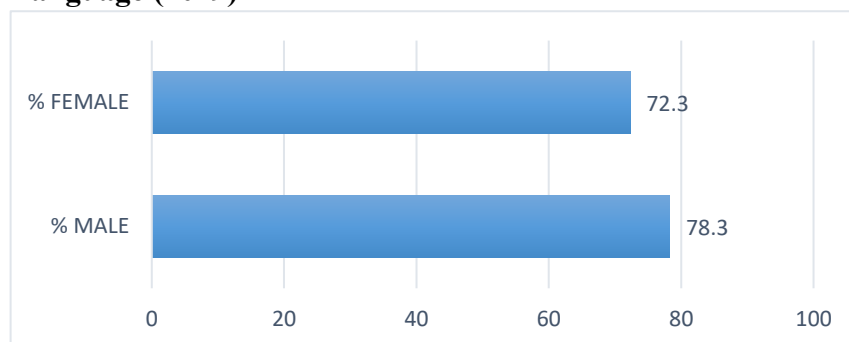
Education is the bedrock of human development and social progress in a country. To this end, the importance of education for the advancement of women was highlighted in the Beijing Platform for Action, in which it was identified as one of the 12 critical areas of concern and affirmed as critical for gender equality and women empowerment. Eliminating gender-based discrimination in education at all levels as well as eradicating illiteracy among women, improving access to vocational training, science and technological education and continuing education were all identified as important measures on the platform. Also Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) goal 4 ensures inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all by 2030.

A. Educational Outcomes

1. Literacy

Literate person is someone who can with understanding both read and write a short, simple statement on his/her everyday life, and an illiterate person is one who cannot with understanding both read and write a short simple statement on his/her daily life (UNESCO). The literacy rate in English Language among young women and men age 15-24 years interviewed was 72.3 per cent and 78.3 per cent respectively (NLSS, 2019) . (Figure 7 below).

B. Participation in Education

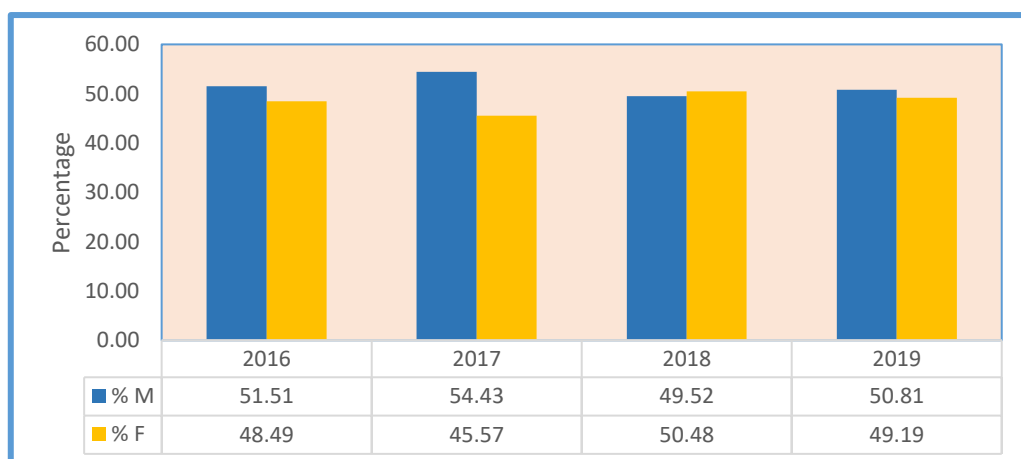
1. Adult/Basic Literacy Education

1.1 Total Enrolment in Adult/Basic Literacy Education by State, Sex and Year (2016-2019)

Data from figure 8 below shows that female enrolment in Adult/Basic Literacy Education in 2016 was 48.49 per cent, it decreased to 45.57 per cent in 2017, increased to 50.48 per cent in 2018 and decreased slightly to 49.19 per cent in 2019.

Kebbi State had the lowest percentage of female enrolment in all the years under reference. It was below 20 per cent in 2016, 2017 and 2019, however it was 22.19 per cent in 2018. In 2016, Edo state has the highest female enrolment of 98.13 per cent, River State had highest female enrolment of 87.24 and 85.92 per cent in 2017 and 2018 respectively while Kano State had the highest female enrolment (94.58per cent) in 2019. (Appendix, ST 7).

2. Nomadic Education

Nomadic education is a crucial sub-system of the formal educational system aimed at equalizing educational opportunities for all social groups irrespective of ethnic, geographical origin, gender or social class.

2.1. Distribution of Nomadic Primary School Pupils Enrolment by Year and Sex (2017-2019)

Data from National Commission for Nomadic Education shows that female enrolment into Nomadic Primary School in 2016, 2017 and 2018 were less than 50 per cent (47.04, 47.32 and 49.72 per cents respectively). In 2019 female enrolment increased to 64.76 per cent, while that of male dropped to 35.24 per cent. (Table 7 below).

Kogi state had the highest percentage of female enrolment in 2016 (54.32 per cent), while Niger state had the lowest (39.47 per cent).

In 2017 and 2018, Yobe state has the lowest percentage of female enrolment with 39.81 and 37.32 per cents respectively. Also, in 2017, Kogi state top the list with 70.1 per cent, while Sokoto state has highest percentage of female enrolment in 2018 with 73.28 per cent. In 2019, Yobe state again has the lowest female enrolment of 43.79 per cent, followed closely by Adamawa state with 44.18 per cent, while Bauchi state has the highest enrolment of female students with 90.53 per cent. (Appendix, ST 8)

3. Universal Basic Education

3.1 Early Childhood Care Development Education

ECCDE aims at the holistic development of a child's social, emotional, cognitive and physical needs in order to build a solid and broad foundation for lifelong learning and well-being. This education curriculum has the potential of producing caring, responsible and responsive future citizens.

3.1a. Early Childhood Care Development Education Enrolment by Sex (2013/14-2016/17)

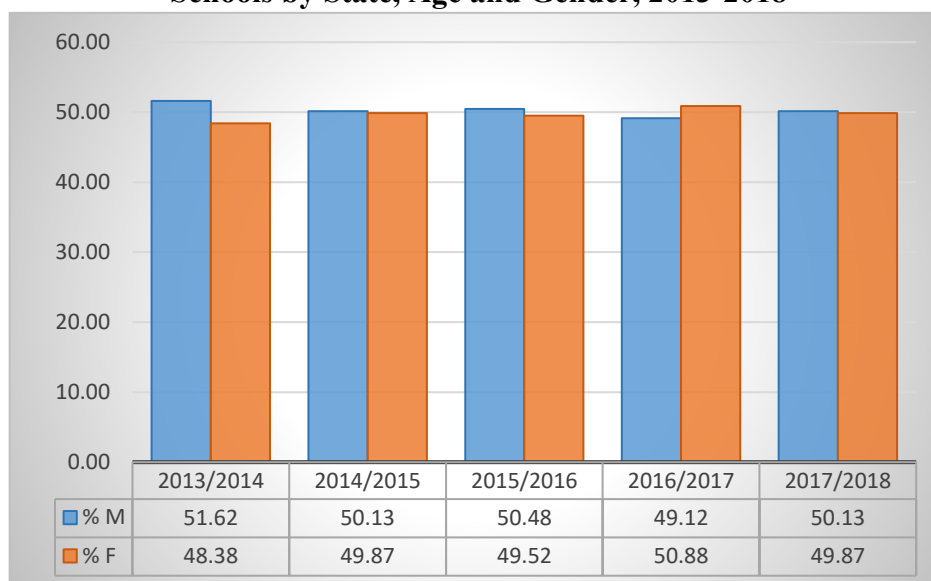
Data from UBEC and Federal Ministry of Education showed that girl's enrolment nationwide was below average during the years under reference except in 2016/17. In 2013/14, female enrolment was 48.38 per cent but slightly increased to 49.87, 49.52 and 50.88 per cent in 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2016/17 respectively. It declined to 49.87 per cent in 2017/18. (Figure 9 below).

In 2013/14, eight (8) states have no data for ECCDE enrolment, Jigawa state has the least female enrolment of 38.42 per cent and Oyo State has the highest of 52.65 per cent.

In 2014/15 however, six states (6) have no data for enrolment, Zamfara has the lowest female enrolment of 42.47 per cent while Kano has the highest figure of 59.31 per cent. Zamfara state was also having the least enrolment of 40.71 and 39.5 per cents in 2015/16 and 2016/17 respectively while Oyo state has the highest enrolment of 52.45 per cent in 2015/16 and Ekiti recorded highest female enrolment in 2016/17 academic session (60.69 per cent).

In 2017/18, Zamfara state still has the lowest figure of 45.04 per cent and Oyo state has the highest enrolment of 51.41 per cent. (Appendix, ST 9).

Figure 9: Percentage Distribution of ECCDE Enrolment in Public and Private Schools by State, Age and Gender, 2013-2018



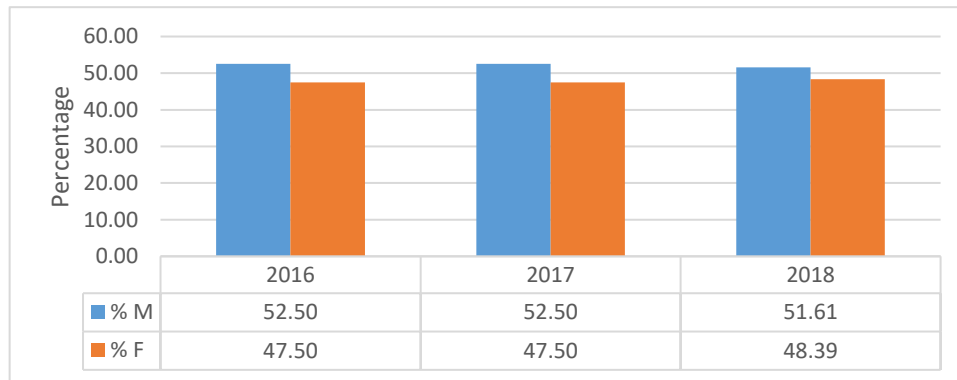
3.2. Primary School

3.2a. Primary School Enrolment by Sex, (2016 - 2018)

Figure 10 below shows the enrolment among school age boys and girls in Primary school (2016 - 2018). Percentage of girls' enrolment was 47.50 per cent for each of the year 2016 and 2017 and slightly increased to 48.39 percent in 2018. In the three years under reference, more than half of the students enrolled in Primary school were boys.

Zamfara state has the lowest female enrolment of 35.53 per cent in 2016, Yobe recorded the least female enrolment of 36.93 per cent in 2017 and Zamfara state again has 38.26 per cent in 2018 as the least state. Oyo State recorded the highest percentages of female enrolment of 51.88 and 51.94 per cents in 2016 and 2018 respectively, while Zamfara recorded the highest of 51.99 per cent in 2017. (Appendix, ST 10).

Figure 10: Percentage Distribution of Primary School Enrolment in Public and Private School by Year and Sex

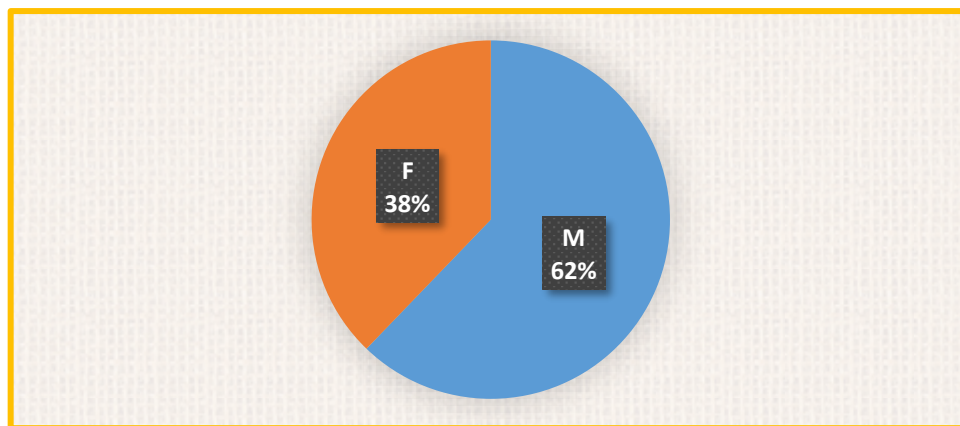


3.2b. Estimated Number of Out-of-School Children at Primary School Level by Sex, 2017/2018

From Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC), Digest of Basic Education Statistics, 2018, total estimated number of children in primary school in Nigeria that are out of school was 10,193,917; the percentage of females and males was 37.80 per cent and 62.20 per cent respectively. (Figure 11 below).

Edo state had the highest percentage of primary school girls out of school (94.27 per cent) while Delta state had the lowest (2.51 per cent) of primary school girls out of school. (Appendix ST 11)

Figure 11: Percentage of Out-of-School Children at Primary School Level by Sex, 2017/2018

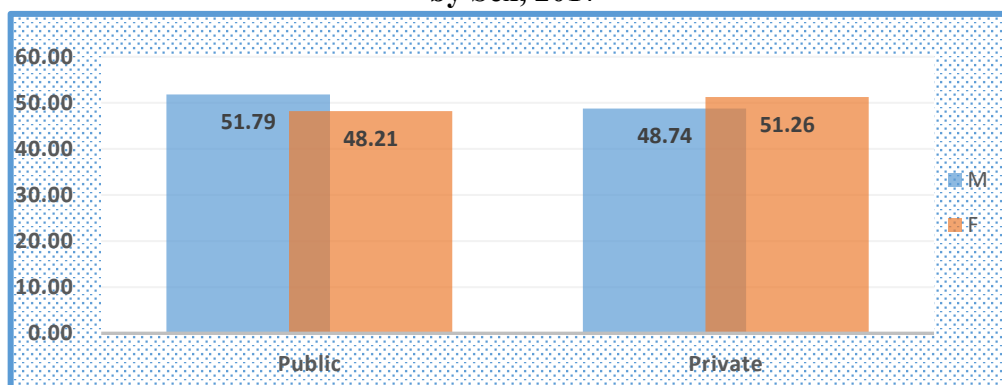


3.2c. Distribution of Pupils that Completed Public and Private Primary 6 by Sex, 2017

In 2017, pupils that completed primary 6 in public and private primary schools were 2,110,751 and 394,720 respectively. Of these, 48.21 per cent of the pupils in public primary school and 51.26 per cent of the pupils in private primary school were female. However,

the percentage of boys that completed primary 6 in public and private primary school was 51.79 and 48.74 respectively.

Figure 12: Percentage of Pupils that Completed Public and Private Primary School by Sex, 2017



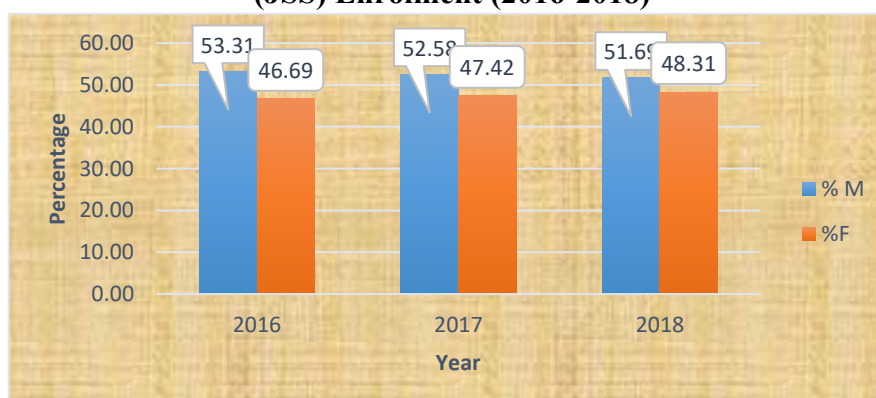
3.3. Junior Secondary School

3.3a. Junior Secondary School Enrolment in Public and Private Schools (2016-2018)

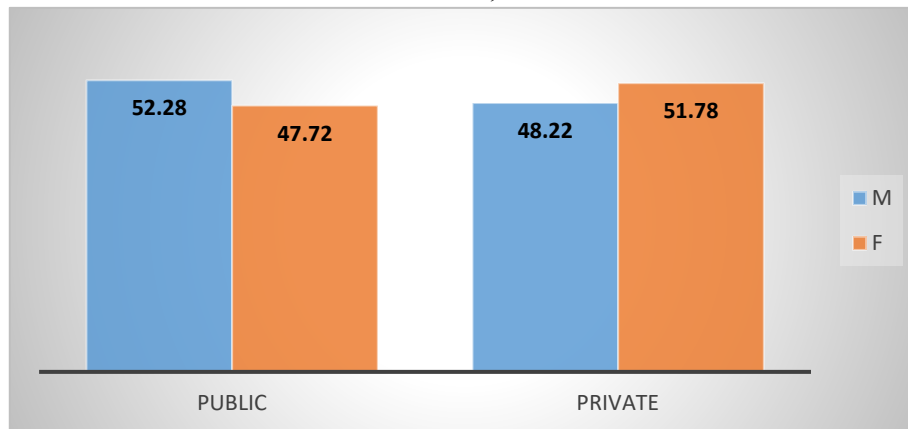
Figure 13: Percentage Distribution of Public and Private Junior Secondary School (JSS) Enrolment (2016-2018)

The percentage of female enrolment followed the same pattern with that of primary school during the years under reference nationwide. More than half of the students who enrolled into Junior Secondary School from 2016 to 2018 were boys. In 2016, 46.69 per cent of female enrolled into JSS. The figure slightly increased to 47.42 and 48.31 per cents in 2017 and 2018 respectively. (Figure 13 below).

Kebbi state has the least percentage of female enrolment in 2016, 2017 and 2018, which was 33.34, 34.20 and 36.12 per cent respectively. Abia state recorded the highest female enrolment of 55.55 and 54.08 per cent in 2016 and 2018 respectively, while Enugu had the highest (54.40 per cent) in 2017. (See Appendix, ST. 13).

3.3b. Percentage of Students that Completed JSS 3 in Public and Private School, 2017

The figure 14 below reveals that the percentage of males that completed JSS 3 in 2017 in Public school was 52.28 per cent which is more than that of private Junior Secondary school (48.22 per cent). However, female students that completed JSS 3 in the same year was 47.72 and 51.78 per cents for public and private school respectively.

Figure 14: Percentage of Students that Completed JSS 3 in Public and Private School, 2017



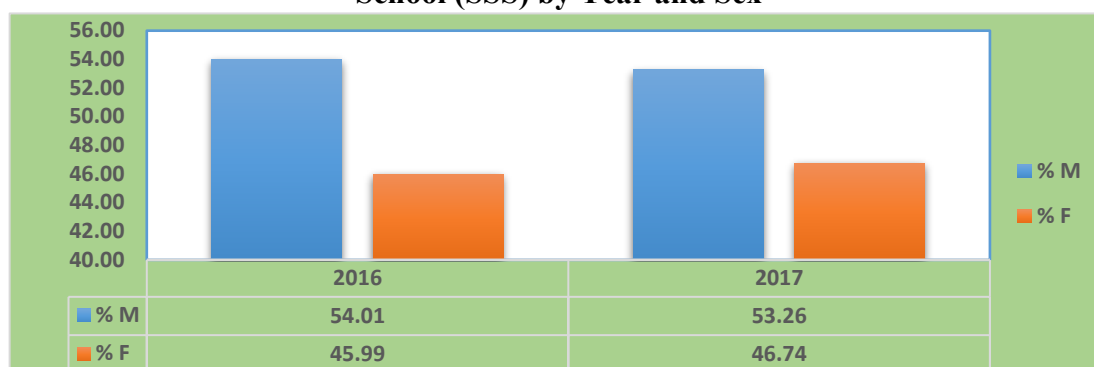
4. Senior Secondary School Education

4.1. Enrolment of Students into Senior Secondary School (SSS)

Figure 15 below shows enrolment of students into Senior secondary School (SSS) nationwide between 2016 and 2017. Female enrolment in 2016 was 45.99 per cent and increased very slightly to 46.74 per cent in 2017.

In 2016, Kebbi state had the least percentage of female enrolment of 29.46 per cent, followed closely by Zamfara state with 29.58 per cent while Abia state recorded the highest enrolment of 55.86 per cent. However, in 2017, Zamfara state had the lowest female enrolment of 32.67 per cent and Enugu had the highest (55.56 per cent).

5. Tertiary Education

Tertiary institutions include Colleges of Education, Colleges of Health Science, Polytechnics, and Universities in Nigeria. On average, enrolment into tertiary institutions across the country was dominated by men.

5.1 Nigerian Colleges of Education

5.1a Enrolment into Nigerian Colleges of Education (2015/2016 – 2016/2017)

Table 8 shows that the percentage of females who enrolled in colleges of education in Nigeria for the reference period was below average, 47.33 and 46.44 per cent for 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic session respectively.

Furthermore, private college of education had the highest percentage of female enrolment (56.33 per cent in 2016/2017 academic session compared to 2015/2016 academic session which was 49.38 per cent).

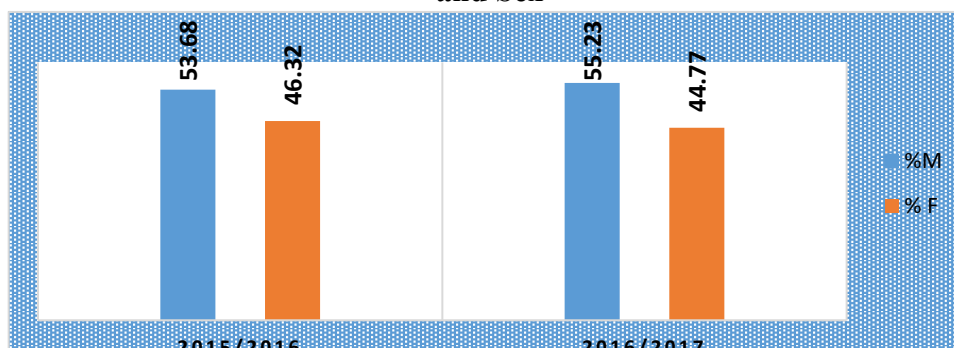

5.3. Colleges of Health Sciences

5.3a. Colleges of Health Sciences Enrolment by Types of Certificate, Year and Sex

Table 10 shows the enrolment in Nigerian Colleges of Health Science for 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic session. A total of 4,732 enrolled for National Diploma of which females accounted for 74.01 per cent, while 2,872 enrolled for Higher National Diploma and 68.84 per cent were female. In 2016/17 academic session, enrolment for female for National Diploma dropped to 71.39 per cent while the female enrolment for Higher National Diploma increased slightly (69.30 per cent) from 68.84 per cent in 2015/2016.

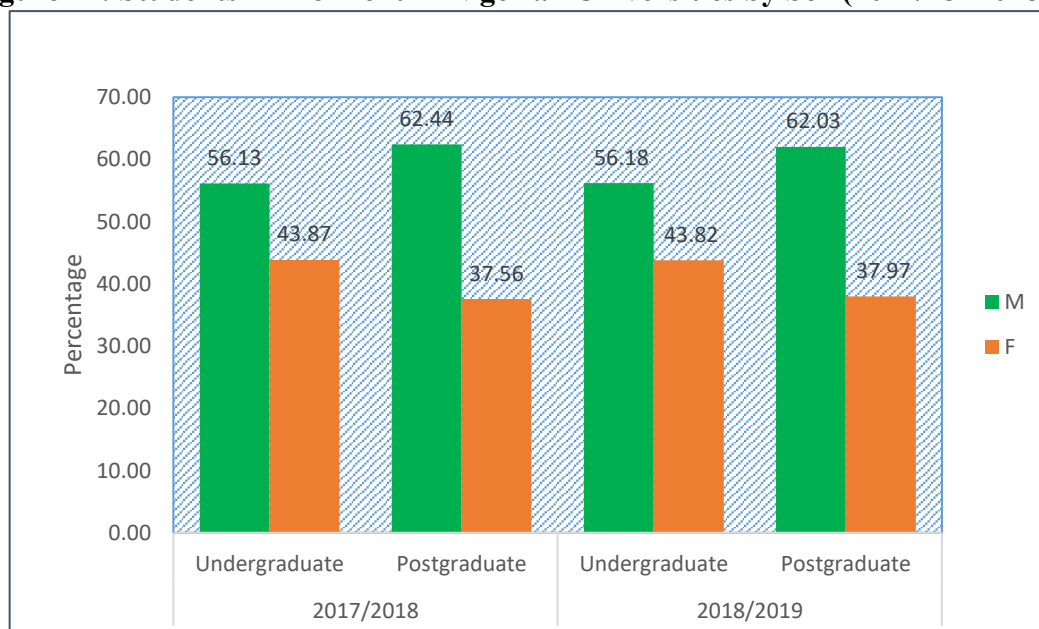

5.5. Nigerian Universities

5.5a. Students' Enrolment in Nigerian Universities (2017/18 - 2018/19)

Figure 17 below reveals that female enrolment in Nigerian universities at undergraduate level was almost the same for the two academic sessions under review (43.87 per cent in 2017/18 and 43.82 per cent in 2018/19). The female enrolment for Postgraduate studies was below 40 per cent in 2017/2018 and 2018/2019. Generally, males dominated the students' enrolment in Nigeria University for Undergraduate and Postgraduate across the two academic sessions.

5.5b. Enrolment in Nigeria Universities by Ownership, Level, Academic Session and Sex

The Table 13 below shows that the percentage of females who enrolled in the Nigeria University for Postgraduate studies was below 40 per cent in 2017/2018 and 2018/2019 for federal, State and Private Universities while their male counterpart enrolment was

over 60 per cent.

In 2017/2018 academic session females accounted for 51.41 per cent of enrolment into undergraduate programmes in Private University followed by the State Universities with 45.71 per cent and Federal Universities had 42.48 per cent of female enrolment. In 2018/2019 academic session the Undergraduate enrolment of females in the federal universities decreased slightly (42.17 per cent) compared to 42.48 per cent in 2017/2018 academic session. Female enrolment in State universities for undergraduates increased slightly from 45.71 per cent in 2017/2018 to 45.84 per cent in 2018/2019 academic session. Private University experienced a slight decrease in the female undergraduate enrolment in 2018/2019 session (50.99 per cent) against 51.41 per cent in 2017/2018 academic session.

5.6. Nigeria Law School Student Statistics

Nigerian Law School was founded on the principle to educate and train graduates in vocational skills that would enable them function optimally as barristers and solicitors, to make the world a better place. Table 14 below gives insight into the student statistics of various Nigeria Law Schools from 2015/2016 to 2017/2018 academic sessions. In 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic sessions, the percentage of female student in Nigeria Law School was below 50 per cent at (48.87 per cent and 49.54 per cent) respectively and 50.10 per cent in 2017/2018 academic session.

In 2015/2016 academic session, Yola Law School had the highest female percentage at 57.48 per cent and 42.52 per cent for males, followed by Abuja Law School at 55.88 per

cent for female and 44.12 per cent for male counterpart, while Kano Law School had the least female percentage (34.73 per cent). In 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 academic sessions Abuja Law School had the highest female percentage at 57.79 per cent and 60.37 per cent respectively and Yola Law School had the least female percentage with (37.41 per cent and 35.90 per cent) respectively.

1. 1. Distribution of NECO (SSC) Examination by Year and Sex (June/July), 2016 - 2017

In 2016, a total of 595,534 males and 426,940 females wrote NECO (SSC) examinations, 66.86 per cent of males and 73.77 per cent of females passed with 5 credits and above including Mathematics and English. The candidates that sat for the examination increased in 2017, the number of males and females was 605,387 and 446,085 respectively. The percentage that passed with 5 credits including Mathematics and English among the males was 69.17 per cent and 73.15 per cent for females. (Table 15 above).

1.2. Distribution of NECO (SSC) Examination by Year and Sex (Nov/Dec)

In Nov/Dec 2016 among the 27,346 male and 19,772 female candidates that sat for NECO (SSC) examination, 59.17 per cent males and 62.46 per cent females passed with five credits including English and Mathematics. A total of 24,068 male and 18,361 females sat for the examination in 2017, among which 54.69 per cent male and 59.56 per cent female had 5 credits including English and Mathematics. The percentage of students that passed with 5 credits including Mathematics and English Language was 56.53 per cent and 48.15 per cent in 2017 and 2018 respectively. Among the female and male candidates that sat for the examination in 2017, the percentage pass with 5 credits including Mathematics and English Language was 59.47 and 53.95 per cents for female and male respectively. In 2018, the total number of candidates that sat for the examination increased from 1,558,452 in 2017 to 1,571,536. Five credits pass including Mathematics and English Language among females and males that sat for the examination in 2018 was 51.01 per cent and 45.55 per cent respectively.

2.2. Distribution of West African Senior Secondary Certificate Examination (WASSCE) by Sex (NOV/DEC, 2017 and 2018)

In 2017 and 2018 the total number of 133,258 and 109,978 candidates sat for Nov/DEC, WASSC examination, 24.01 per cent passed with 5 credits including Mathematics and English Language in 2017 while it was 33.81 per cent in 2018. Out of the total females that wrote the examination in 2017 (65,959), 24.42 per cent had 5 credits including Mathematics and English. 3. National Business for Technical Examinations Board

3.1. Distribution of Enrolment for National Business for Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB) May/June by Trade, Year and Sex

In May/June 2017, a total of 32,334 students comprising of 108 unindicated, 6,876 female and 25,350 male students sat for National Business for Technical Examinations. Enrolment decreased to 31,441 in 2018 to 31,995 in 2019. Female and male enrolment in each of the years was about 22 per cent and 78 per cent respectively. Specifically, percentage of

females among the indicated candidates was 21.34 per cent in 2017, it rose to 22.02 per cent in 2018 and slightly decreased to 21.93 per cent in 2019. (Table 19 below).

3.2. Distribution of Enrolment for National Business for Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB) Nov/Dec by Trade, Year and Sex

A total of 16,881 students enrolled for NABTEB examination in Nov/Dec. 2017, unindicated students among them were 542, and the total indicated students that enrolled for the examination was 16,339 with 6,158 female and 10,181 male students. Enrolment decreased to 14, 045 in 2018 and further decreased to 13,901 in 2019. The percentage of females among the candidates identified who got enrolled in 2017 was 37.69, it increased slightly to 38.68 per cent in 2018 and decreased to 37.82 per cent in 2019. 4.1. Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) Application and Admission by Year and Sex

Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) is an examination conducted by Joint Admission and Matriculation Board for prospective undergraduates into Nigeria Universities, Polytechnics and Colleges of education.

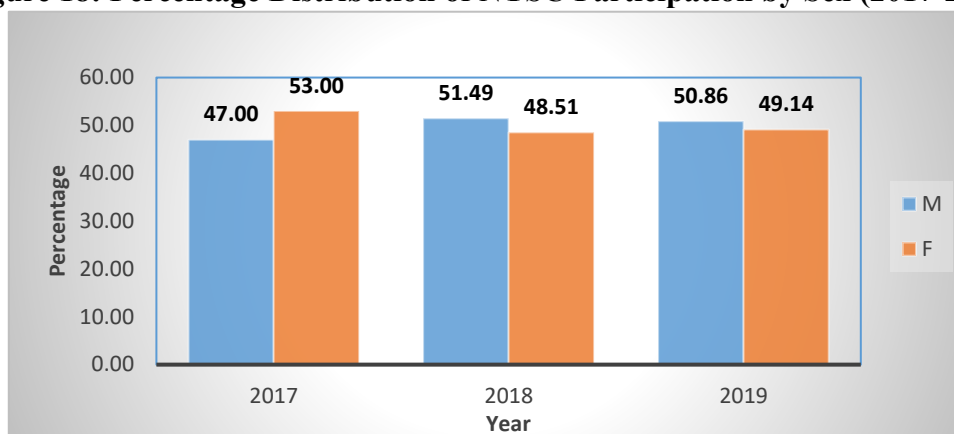
In 2016, a total of 1,592,462 applied for UTME admission, only 598,369 (37.58 per cent) were given admission, the share of male and female was 20.98 and 16.60 per cents respectively. The application increased in 2017 to 1,722,236, out of which only 428,249 (24.87 per cent) were given admission; the share of male was 13.65 per cent and 11.26 per cent for female. In 2018, the application decreased to 1,653,127, while 582,593 (35.24 per cent) were given admission. The share of male and female was 19.33 and 15.91 per cents respectively. There was also increased in the application in 2019 to 1,886,488 but only 608,859 (32.27 per cent) got the admission, male had 17.39 per cent share while the share of female was 14.88 per cent (Appendix ST. 38 and 39).

D. National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) Members

1. National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) Members Participation by Sex and Year

Fig 18 shows the distribution of NYSC participation from 2017-2019. In 2017, the percentage of female across the country was 53.00 per cent but dropped to 48.51 per cent in 2018 and increased slightly to 49.14 per cent in 2019.

Similarly, in 2018, female recorded highest percentage participation of 63.01 per cent in Arts, followed by Social Science (56.56 per cent) and Law with (56.44 per cent). Male participation in Engineering and Technology was 73.65 per cent, Environmental Science

(69.26 per cent) and Veterinary Medicine 69.16 per cent. Female Youth corps members' participation of 63.75 per cent was highest in Arts in 2019, followed by Law with 55.13 per cent and Social science was third highest with 54.78 per cent. They have the least participation in Engineering and Technology, Environmental Science and Veterinary Medicine with 28.22, 31.77 and 31.90 per cent respectively. (Table 22 above).

3. Distribution of National Youth Service Corp (NYSC) Members by Age Group (2017-2019)

Table 23 below shows the distribution of NYSC members by age group. The percentage of female in the age group (15-19) years was 65.01 in 2017, it decreased to 58.86 in 2018 and increased to 61.81 in 2019 while that of male counterparts was less than 40 per cent in 2017 and 2019. In the age group (20-24) years, the percentage ranges between 53 and 60 per cent in the years under reference. The percentage of female participation in the age range (25-29) years and age 30 was less than average in the three years considered. For age group (25-29) years, the range is between 44.21 and 47.10 per cent while it is from 34.2 to 40.3 per cent for age group 30 years. Analysis reveals further that female in the age bracket (15-19) years participate more in the scheme than other age groups. Also, as the age advances, percentage of female participation drops.

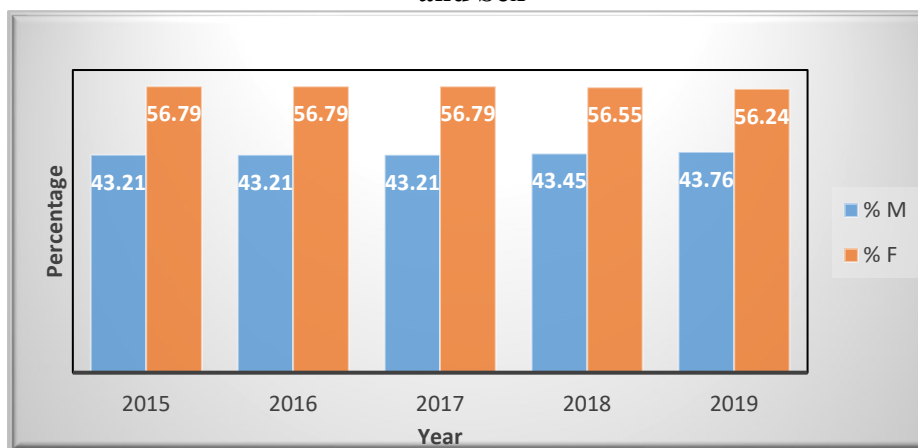

1. Distribution of Registered Primary School Teachers

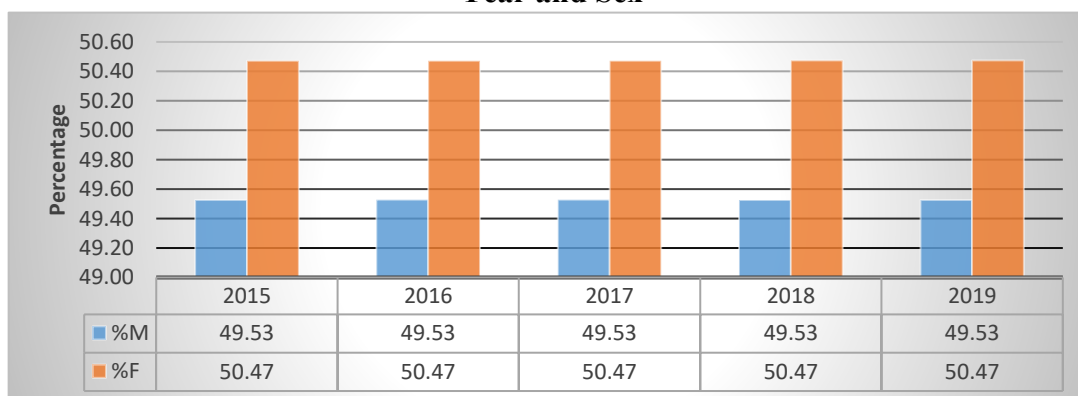
Registration of Teachers in Nigeria schools is very important as it helps to ensure quarks are not recruited as well as build solid base for education to thrive in all ramifications. Data below from Teachers Registration Council of Nigeria gives us a clearer view of the status of Registered Teachers in Primary schools.

From the above chart, within the years under reference, there were more female registered teachers in primary schools. In 2015 - 2017 the percentage of registered female teachers was 56.79 per cent, the figure dropped in 2018 and 2019 to 56.55 per cent and 56.24 per cent respectively. The percentage of registered male primary school teachers was constant (43.21 per cent) for 2015 - 2017 but there was slight increase in 2018 and 2019 with 0.24 and 0.55 percentage point difference respectively.

Figure 20: Percentage Distribution of Registered Secondary School Teachers by Year and Sex



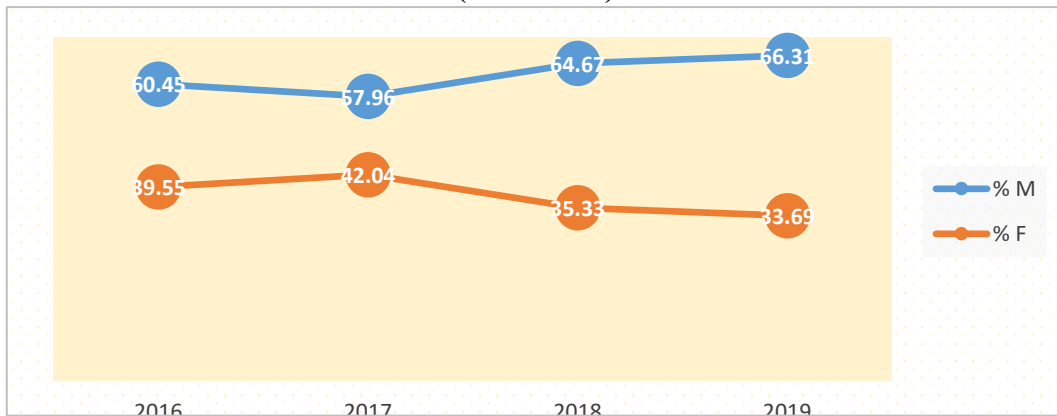
2. Registered Secondary School Teachers

Registered secondary school teachers with Teachers Registration Council of Nigeria (TRCN) shows that registered female teachers were more than their male counterpart. The chart above shows that between 2015 to 2019, number of registered secondary school teachers have remained constant at 50.47 and 49.53 per cent for female and male respectively.

3. Distribution of Nomadic Primary School Teachers by Sex (2016-2019)

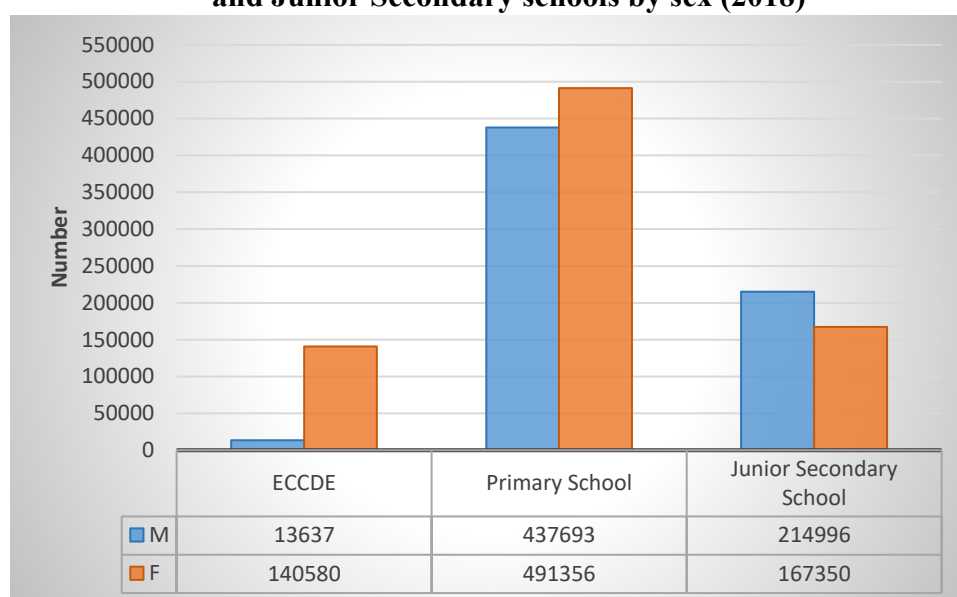
Figure 21: Percentage Distribution of Nomadic Primary School Teachers by Sex (2016-2019)

From figure 21 below, the percentage of female teachers in Nomadic schools has always trailed behind that of their male counterparts from 2016-2019. It was 39.55 per cent in 2016, increased to 42.04 in 2017 and decreased to 35.33 and 33.69 per cent in 2018 and 2019 respectively.

4. Teaching Staff in Public and Private ECCDE, Primary and Junior Secondary schools

The chart below shows the distribution of teachers in public and private Early Childhood Education, Primary and Junior secondary school in 2018. The percentage of female teachers in ECCDE in 2018 was 91.16 per cent (140,580) while it was only 8.84 per cent (13, 637) for male. Teaching staff at the Primary School level in the same year was 52.89 per cent (491,356) and 47.11 per cent (437,693) for female and male respectively. In Junior secondary school the number of male teaching staff was more than that of female (214,996 males and 167,350 females) which is 56.23 and 43.77 per cent for male and female respectively.

5. Teaching Staff/Non-Teaching Staff of Nigerian Universities

The quality of the teaching staff is a major determining factor for the quality of education rendered. Most importantly, gender balance among the teaching staff is critical for promoting gender parity in access to and achievement in education and for creating a supportive and non-discriminating learning environment for both women and men.

The feminization of the teaching profession particularly in states where women have lower socioeconomic status, can have a positive impact on younger women and their decision to pursue their studies, and for parents to choose to educate their daughters.

5.1. Academic and Non-Academic Staff of Nigerian Universities (2017/18 – 2018/19)

Table 24 below reveals the distribution of academic and non-academic staff of Nigerian universities in 2017/18 and 2018/19. The table shows a consistent lower percentage of female staff in both academic and non-academic staff in the two academic sessions. The distribution of females among Academic staff was 24.06 per cent and 23.65 per cent for 2017/18 and 2018/19 academic session respectively as against the male population which stood at 75.94 per cent in 2017/18 and 76.35 per cent in 2018/19. Similarly, the distribution of female in the non-academic staff was lower than male counterpart, the percentage was 36.26 and 36.0 per cent in 2017/18 and 2018/19 academic session respectively.

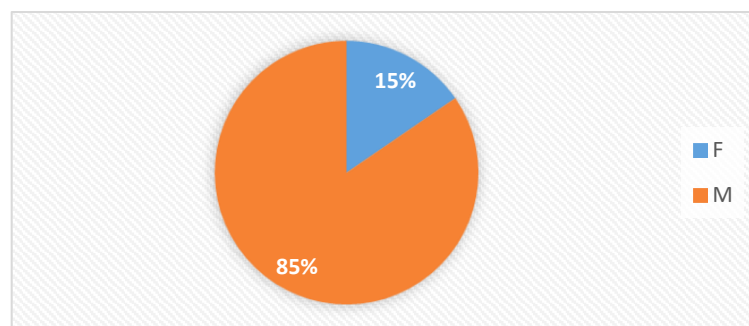

5.2. Percentage Distribution of Professors in Nigerian Universities (2017)

The professors in the Universities are a major resource that contributes significantly to the quality of the institutions and the economy in a variety of ways.

Professors provide academic leadership to the University, primarily through demonstrating and fostering excellence in research, teaching, professional activities and policy development at a variety of levels – within the academic discipline, academic unit, the institution and the economy as a whole. The percentage of female professors in Nigeria Universities in 2017 was low at 15.43 percent compared to the male at 84.57 per cent.

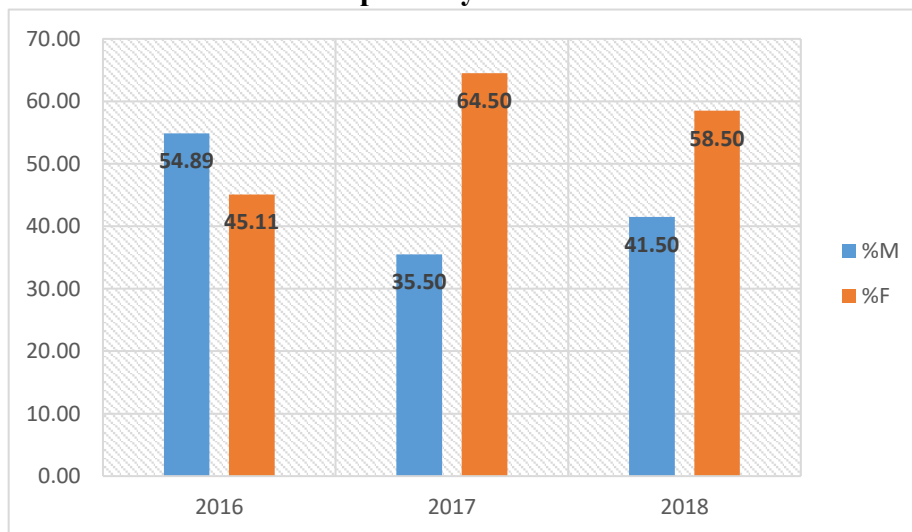

1. Distribution of National Open Apprenticeship Scheme Participants by Sex and Year

The females dominated the male counterpart in participation in the National Open Apprenticeship scheme in 2017 and 2018 with 64.50 per cent against 35.50 per cent for male and 58.50 per cent against 41.50 per cent for male in 2017 and 2018 respectively while the male participated more with 54.89 per cent than the female with 45.11 per cent in 2016. (Figure 24 below).

2. Distribution of Employment in Small and Medium Enterprise (SMEs) by Sex and Sector as at December 2017

Nationally males were more employed in SMEs (56.57 per cent) while it was 43.43 per cent for females. Males dominated employment in almost all the sectors except in education; and human health and social works, which had the highest percentage of female employment among the sectors. The percentage of employment in education sector was 52.60 and 47.40 for female and male respectively while that of human health and social works was 55.81 for female and 44.19 for male.

3. Educational Qualification of Employees of Small and Medium Enterprises as at Dec. 2017

The male employees of small and medium enterprises were more educated at all levels of education including 'NO EDUCATION' except 'NCE/OND/NURSING' where the percentage of female were 55.60 per cent against the male with 44.40 per cent. The percentage of female (27.11 per cent) was less than male (72.89 per cent) at 'Doctorate'

level. Also 'No Education' level of female was 30.35 per cent while 69.65 per cent was recorded for male.

4. Distribution of Small-Scale Industrialists by Sex and Sector, 2018

From the table below the percentage of small-scale industrialists for male were 57.98 per cent while about 2 out of 5 (42.02 per cent) are females. Males dominated small scale industrialists in all sectors with the highest percentage in mining and quarrying at 83.71 per cent followed closely by water supply, sewerage, waste management and remediation activities with 81.18 per cent, except accommodation and food services which had more female industrialists (55.86 per cent) than male (44.14 per cent). Female had higher participation in the sector percentage share in whole sale/retail trade and agriculture with 26.55 against 21.06 per cent male and 25.31 against 24.56 per cent male respectively.

5. Security Personnel

Crime and Insecurity remain major challenges to governments globally. Governments (National, states and Local) invest chunk of their resources in fighting crimes and insecurity. In Nigeria, many security agencies were established and each of them was given specific mandate(s) to enforce laws, combat different forms of crimes and prosecute defaulters.

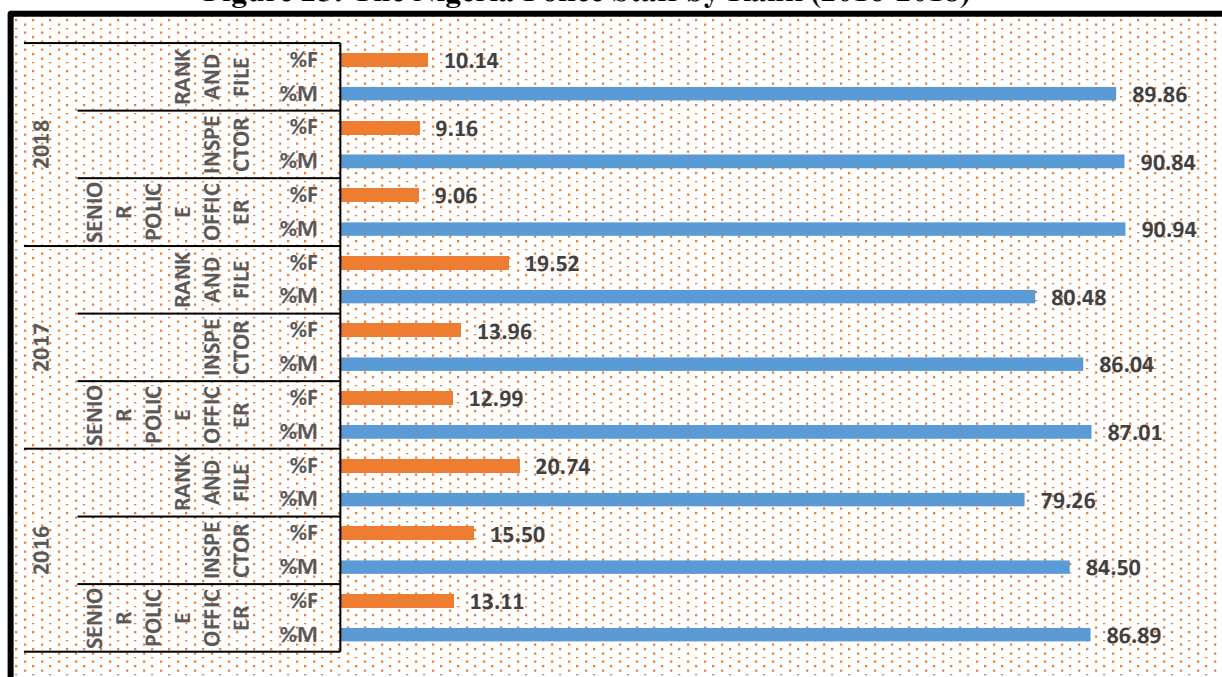
5.1a. The Nigeria Police (2016-2018)

The Nigeria Police is the principal law enforcement and lead security agency in Nigeria. It was established in 1930. By virtue of section 214 of the constitution of Federal Republic of Nigeria (as amended), the Nigeria Police is saddled with the sole responsibility of maintaining peace and order. They are also in charge of promotion of public safety, prevention of crime as well as prosecuting offenders.

Though, data was not available for females in Edo, Ekiti and Enugu states in the three years under reference, available data shows that the total number of police officers in 2016 was 244,746 out of which the female officers accounted for 19.09 per cent. The figure dropped to 225,339 and females were 40,059 (17.77 per cent) in 2017. Furthermore, in 2018, there were 203,024 Police Officers and the females were 19,785 (9.75 per cent). (ST. 45)

Analysis by cadre shows that in the three years under reference, female has larger percentage in the rank and files cadre than in the senior police officer cadre. The percentage of females in the Senior police officer is highest in 2016 (13.11), followed by 12.99 per cent in 2017 and dropped to 9.06 per cent in 2018. Further, their percentage in the rank and files cadre is 20.74 percent in 2016, 19.52 per cent in 2017 and 10.14 percent in 2018. (Figure 25 below).

5.1b. Police-to-Citizen Ratio by State

This ratio describes the number of people that a police officer is responsible to secure. The United Nations (UN) standard recommends a ratio of 1:450. For Nigeria, the ratio was 1:572 in 2016, decreased to 1:621 in 2017 and 1:648 in 2018. In all the referenced years, FCT had highest police to population ratio of 1:121, 1:90 and 1:181 in 2016, 2017 and 2018 respectively. In contrary, Bauchi had lowest police to population ratio of 1:1,188 in 2016, Abia has 1:1,309 in 2017 and Sokoto has 1:1,511 in 2018. (ST 46)

5.2. Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (2017-2019)

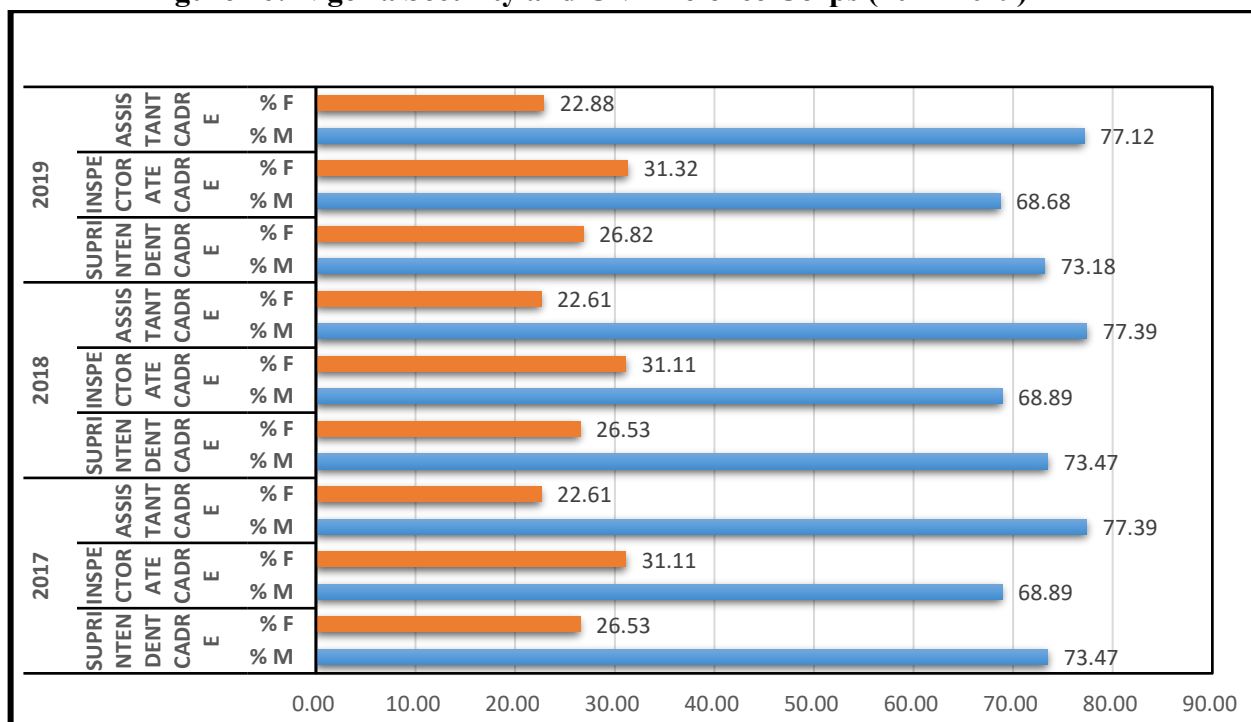
NSCDC has the mandate to maintain peace and order and to safe the civil society during period of emergency such as war and terrorism. Aside from protecting lives and properties, they also ensure government properties are protected against vandalization.

Data from Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) shows that the total number of civil defence officers nationwide in 2017 was 56,441 out of which females were 15,085 (26.73 per cent), the figures remain the same in 2018. However, in 2019, there were 55,919 officers nationwide out of which females were 15,077 (26.96 per cent).

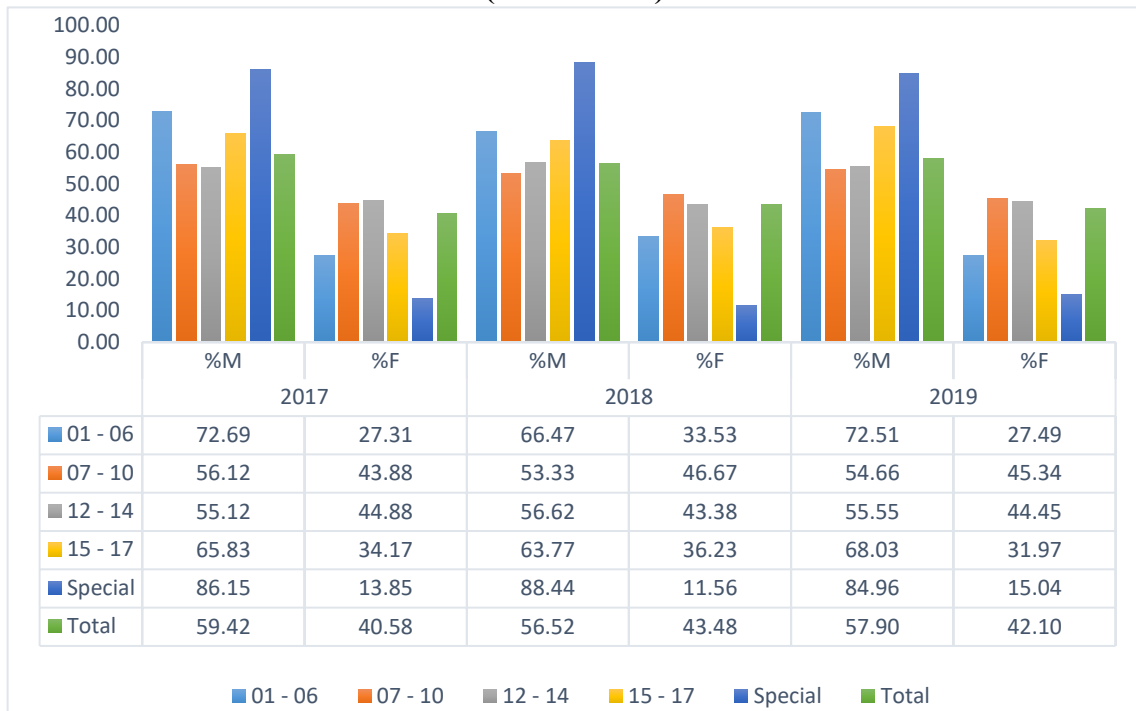
Figure 26: Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (2017-2019)

Analyzing by cadre, in 2017, females in Superintendent Cadre, Inspectorate cadre and Assistant cadre were 26.53, 31.11 and 22.61 per cent respectively. The figures were the same in 2018. In 2019, the distribution was relatively the same. The percentages of female

were 26.82, 31.32 and 22.88 per cents for Superintendent, Inspectorate and Assistant cadre respectively. (Figure 26).

6. Employment in Federal MDAs by Grade Level and Sex (2017 – 2019)

The figure below shows an overview of employment at Federal MDAs with male as the main dominance. Female on grade level 01 – 17 and Special Grade were 40.58, 43.48 and 42.10 per cent for the year 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. From grade level 01 – 06 the percentage of female was 27.31 per cent in 2017 which increased to 33.53 per cent in 2018 and dropped to 27.49 per cent in 2019. Grade level 15 – 17 recorded 34.17 per cent in 2017, increased to 36.23 per cent in 2018, but slightly dropped to 31.97 per cent in 2019. Female employment for Special Grade was 13.85 per cent in 2017, it dropped to 11.56 per cent in 2018 and increased again to 15.04 per cent in 2019. (Figure 27).

CHAPTER 5: POWER AND DECISION MAKING

Key Findings

- *From independence, women have never been the president or the vice President in Nigeria.*
- *Representation at National Parliament was 93.8 per cent male and 6.2 per cent female in 2019*
- *Only 7 women were among 43 appointed Ministers in 2019*
- *A total of 7 women and 72 men occupied principal positions in the Senate in 2019*
- *Only 9 women out of 106 members of House of Representatives occupied principal positions*
- *Female members of National Judicial Offices decreased from 31.98 per cent in 2017 to 28.86 per cent in 2018*

Introduction

From antecedents, men have been predominant and still dominate the world of politics. Though, marginalization of women is caused by patriarchy, poverty, illiteracy, religious and cultural norms. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights recognizes the right of every individual to take part in the government of his or her country³. Equal access to power, decision making and leadership at all levels is necessary for a proper and effectively functioning democracy. The SDG goal 5, also ensures women's full and effective participation as well as equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decision-making in political, economic and public life.

This chapter provides an assessment of the current situation as well as recent trends of the participation of women and men in positions of power and decision making across the country. The chapter covers three main areas, politics and governance in the Executive, Legislature and Judiciary.

A. Politics and Governance

The high-leveled disparities between the participation of men and women in the domain of politics and decision-making limit women's political, social and economic opportunities. The gender inequality in the domains stated above is owing to the limited number of female participations in government, especially, where key policy decisions are made and resource allocations are decided. Women have continued to suffer in all facet of politics and leadership positions, despite the recognition of the importance of women's political empowerment within the framework of the SDGs.

1. Executives

1a. Representation in Executive Arm of Government

Since independence in Nigerian, male has been the major actors in politics. Women had rarely been represented in any of the three arms of government. It is becoming a norm that men play the most important roles in politics, particularly at the federal level with regards to the position of president, vice presidents and secretary to the government of the federation as well as appointive ministerial positions.

Table 28 below clearly shows the current statuesque, with regards to gender representation as president or vice President, with all the positions held by men.

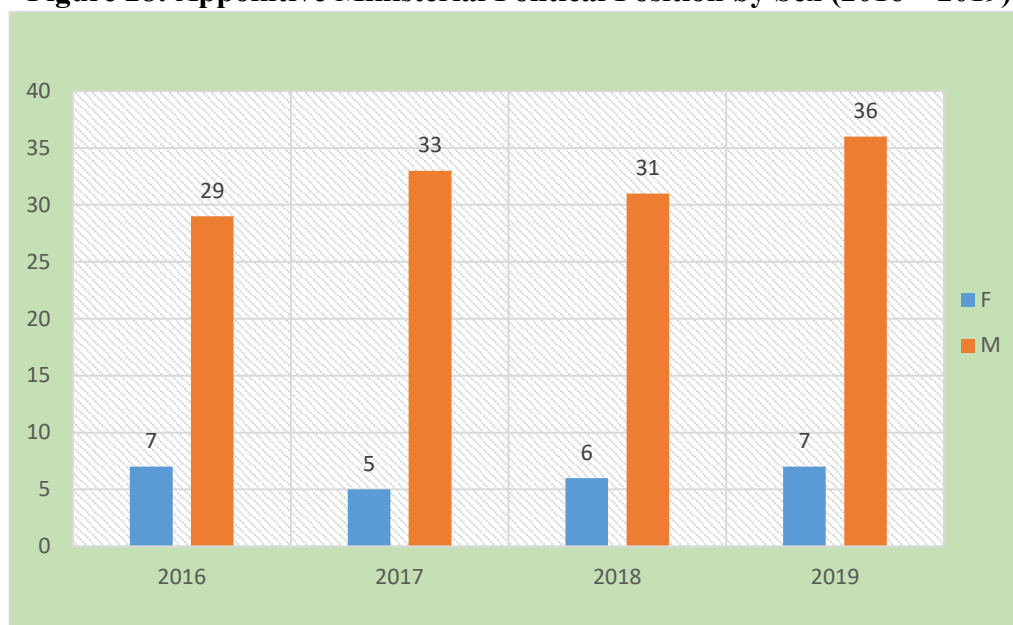

1b. Appointive Ministerial Political Position

Appointive positions cut across the three levels of governance, that is, the federal, state and local government. However, available data allows us to focus the report only on the ministerial appointees at the federal level.

Figure 28 below shows the number of males and females appointed as ministers from 2016 - 2019. In 2016 only 7 females were appointed, this decreased in 2017 to only 5 females. Females Minister appointed in 2018 and 2019 were 6 and 7 respectively.

1c. Secretary to the Government of the Federation

In Nigeria, women have never been appointed as secretary to the government of the federation since independence. (Table 29 below).

2. Legislators

2a. Representation at the National Parliament

Women population is estimated to account for almost half of the total population in Nigeria. Representation at the National Parliament is measured as the proportion of seats held by men and women in the lower and upper-houses of the National Assembly.

Since the return of democracy in 1999 to the last election in 2019, women have been under represented in the National Parliament. The highest representation of 7.2 per cent was recorded in 2007-2011, it was 6.6 per cent each in 2011 - 2015 and 2015-2019. The current Women representation in National Parliament (2019) is 6.2 per cent. (Table 30).

2b. Principal Positions at the National Assembly by Sex

Table 31 below shows that male dominated the principal office in the Senate. A total of 6 women and 73 men occupied principal positions in the Senate in 2016 and the figures stood for 2017. Years 2018 and 2019 have the same figures of 7 women and 72 men as principal officers. From 2016 - 2019, only 6 women occupied the position of committee chairpersons for each year. In 2018 and 2019 a woman each occupied the position of Minority Senate Leader in the Senate.

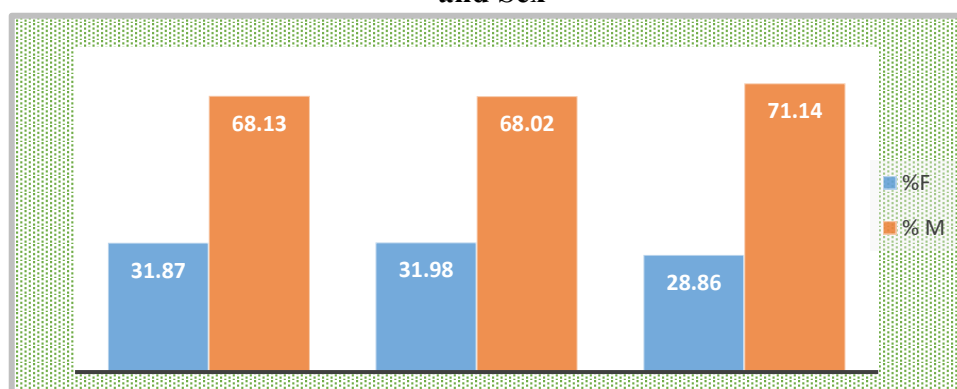

3a. National Judicial Officers by Position, Year and Sex

In Nigeria, 31.87 and 31.98 per cent were female members of National Judicial Officers in 2016 and 2017 respectively, while 2018 recorded 28.86 per cent. No female had been Chief Justice of Nigeria, President of National Industrial Court and Chief Registrar of Supreme Court from 2016 to 2018 as shown in Table 33 above. In the same period, female had been the President of Court of Appeal.

CHAPTER 6: VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND CRIME

Key Findings

- *The number of female that experienced Rape/Sexual Abuse in 2017 was 18 out of 26 cases reported. In 2018 and 2019, 62 and 59 cases were reported respectively, of which the number of females were 60 and 56 persons*
- *The percentage of women age 15 - 49 who have ever experienced physical violence since age 15 increased from 27.8 per cent in 2013 to 31 per cent in 2018*
- *Among ever married women who reported experiencing physical violence, 60.6 per cent suffered it from their 'Current Husband/Partner' in 2013 and slightly decreased to 58.0 per cent in 2018*
- *Among women age 15-49, the percentage that ever experienced sexual violence irrespective of person that committed the act was 7.4 per cent in 2013 and increased to 9.1 per cent in 2018.*
- *In Nigeria about one out of three women (33.4 per cent) age 15-49 have experienced physical or sexual violence in 2018 while it was 29.6 per cent in 2013*
- *Female suspects arrested for drug related offences was 6.21 per cent in 2017, increased slightly to 7.18 per cent in 2018 and increased further to 9.58 per cent in 2019*
- *Among children age 1 - 11 years trafficked, the percentage of females were 72.28, 31.56, 67.81 and 58.6 percent in 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively*
- *The percentage of female trafficked for forced labor was 43.48 per cent in 2016 but increased significantly to 78.53 per cent in 2017 and dropped to 70 per cent in 2018 and decreased to 9.23 percent in 2019*
- *In 2016, all victims trafficked for prostitution were females (100 per cent), however, it was 97.94, 97.58 and 99.59 per cent in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively.*

Introduction

Violence and crime are social ill that threaten peaceful co-existence and the realization of the objectives of equality, development and peace. Violence prevents women from enjoying their fundamental human rights and freedom. In all societies, women and girls are vulnerable to physical, sexual or psychological abuse that cuts across lines of income, class and culture. Low social and economic status of women can be both a cause and a consequence of violence⁴. The Beijing Platform for Action requires all governments and the United Nations to promote research, collect data and compile statistics related to the prevalence of different forms of violence against women (especially domestic violence). The initiative also urges stakeholders to encourage research into the causes, nature, seriousness and consequences of violence against women, as well as effectiveness of measures implemented to prevent and redress violence against women. Goal 16 of the Sustainable Development Goal (SDGs) promotes peaceful and inclusive societies which

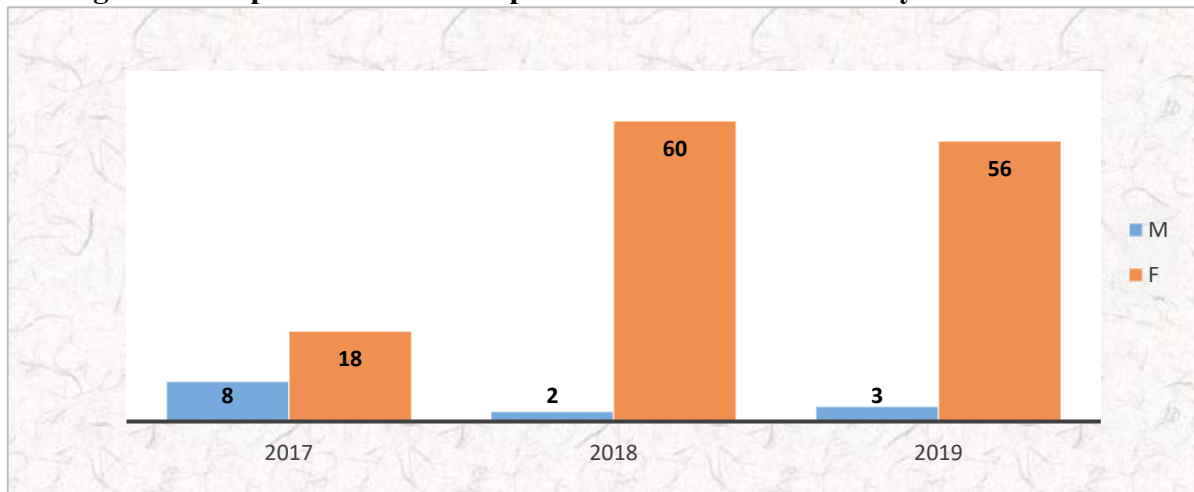
provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels.

A. Prevalence and Increase of Violence Against Women and Children

1. Reported Cases of Rape/Sexual Abuse Incidence by Sex and Year

Rape is described as all incidents that involve penetration of all kinds such as oral, fingering, anal, e.t.c. It is considered as a significant component of Gender based violence. Rape is a global scourge that affects mostly women and girls, regardless of their age and socio-economic status. Figure 30 below shows the reported cases of Rape/Sexual Abuse incidence from 2017-2019. Females are mostly the victims of rape. The number of female that experienced rape/Sexual Abuse in 2017 was 18 out of 26 cases reported. In 2018 and 2019, 62 and 59 cases were reported respectively, of which the number of females were 60 and 56 persons.

Physical Violence Against Women

Physical violence consists of acts aimed at hurting the victim and include, but not limited to pushing, grabbing, twisting the arm, biting or hitting with the fist or an object, to trying to straggle or suffocate, burning or scalding on purpose and attacking with some sort of weapon, a gun or knife.

2.1. Percentage of Women Age 15 - 49 Who Have Experienced Physical Violence Since Age 15 and Percentage Who Experienced Physical Violence During the 12 Months Preceding NDHS, 2013 and 2018 Survey

From ST 49 in the Statistical Annexes, the percentage of women age 15 - 49 who have ever experienced physical violence since age 15 increased from 27.8 per cent in 2013 to 31 per cent in 2018. The percentage of women age 15-49 who experienced physical violence since age 15 irrespective of the perpetrator in 2013 was highest in Edo State with 75.4 per cent, followed closely by Benue State with 72.1 per cent while Kano State had the lowest at 1.1 per cent. Taraba State had the highest percentage of 67.6 per cent followed closely by Edo State with 64.7 per cent while Jigawa State recorded the lowest at 4.4 per cent followed by Kano at 5.9 per cent in 2018.

Among women age 15 - 49 who experienced physical violence in the past 12 months preceding the survey, greater percentage reported experiencing it 'often or sometimes' (11.2 per cent in 2013 and 13.7 per cent in 2018) followed by 'sometimes' (9.5 per cent in 2013 and 11.7 per cent in 2018) across the two years under review. It was 1.6 and 2.0 per cent for 2013 and 2018 respectively for those that experienced it often.

2.2 Percentage of Persons Committing Physical Violence

Among ever married women who reported experiencing physical violence, 60.6 per cent suffered it from their 'Current Husband/Partner' in 2013 and slightly decreased to 58.0 per cent in 2018. Another category of persons that committed physical violence against ever married women significantly was 'Mother/Stepmother' (25.7 per cent in 2013 but it decreased to 19.4 per cent in 2018) while 'Father-in-law', 'Police/Soldier' and 'Current Boyfriend' were the least perpetrators of physical violence against ever married women in both years. Current boyfriend recorded 0.2 per cent in 2013 and 2018 while police/soldiers recorded 0.1 per cent for the same period. Father-in-law responsible for 0.1 per cent in 2013 but did not commit physical violence against ever married women in 2018.

Never married women also suffered significant percentage of physical violence from their mother/step mother, it was 42.5 per cent in 2013 but decreased to 35.4 per cent in 2018. This was followed by 'Sister/Brother at 31.7 per cent in 2013 and declined to 22.5 per cent in 2018, just as 'Teacher' contributed 29.5 per cent in 2013 but reduced significantly to 17.1 per cent in 2018. Of all categories of persons that committed physical violence against never married women 'Police/Soldier' contributed the least in the 2 years with 0.2 per cent in 2013 and zero percent in 2018. 2.3. Prevalence of Sexual Violence

From table 35 above, among women age 15-49 the percentage that ever experienced sexual violence irrespective of person that committed it was 7.4 per cent in 2013 and increased to 9.1 per cent in 2018. Adamawa State had the highest of 38.4 per cent followed by Taraba State with 28.1 per cent while Katsina and Kwara States had the least at 0.6 per cent followed closely by Kano State with 0.7 per cent. Gombe State took the lead in 2018 with 44.9 per cent while Kebbi State recorded the least at 0.4 per cent, followed by Sokoto State with 1.0 per cent. The percentage of women who suffered sexual violence in the 12 months preceding the survey increased from 3.3 per cent in 2013 to 4.1 per cent in 2018. It was 24.1 per for Adamawa State in 2013 and 22.0 per cent for Gombe in 2018 while Zamfara recorded the least at 0.1 per cent followed by Kwara and Osun with 0.3 per cent in 2013 and Ogun State had no incidence of sexual violence followed by Lagos State with 0.2 per cent in 2018.

2.4. Persons Committing Sexual Violence

Table 36 below reveals that greater percentage of incidence of sexual violence against women age 15-49 'ever married' was committed by their 'Current Husband/Partner' (57.9 per cent in 2013 and increased to 64.8 per cent in 2018) followed but not closely by their 'Former Husband/Partner' (21.6 per cent in 2013 and decrease to 18.4 per cent in 2018). The 'Never Married' women were not left out as a reasonable percentage of them suffered this violence from Stranger at 29.2 and 27.6 per cent in 2013 and 2018 respectively, followed by 'Current/Former Boyfriend' with 22.9 per cent in 2013 and 26.7 per cent in 2018. The Police/Soldier and Others are the least perpetrators of sexual violence against women in the two years under review.

2.5. Experience of Different Forms of Violence

In Nigeria about one out of three women (33.4 per cent) age 15-49 have experienced physical or sexual violence in 2018 while it was 29.6 per cent in 2013. In 2013 and 2018, 22.2 and 24.4 per cents have experienced only physical violence respectively. About 2 per cent experienced sexual violence only for both years, while Physical and Sexual Violence accounted for 5.6 per cent in 2013 and increased to 6.7 per cent in 2018.

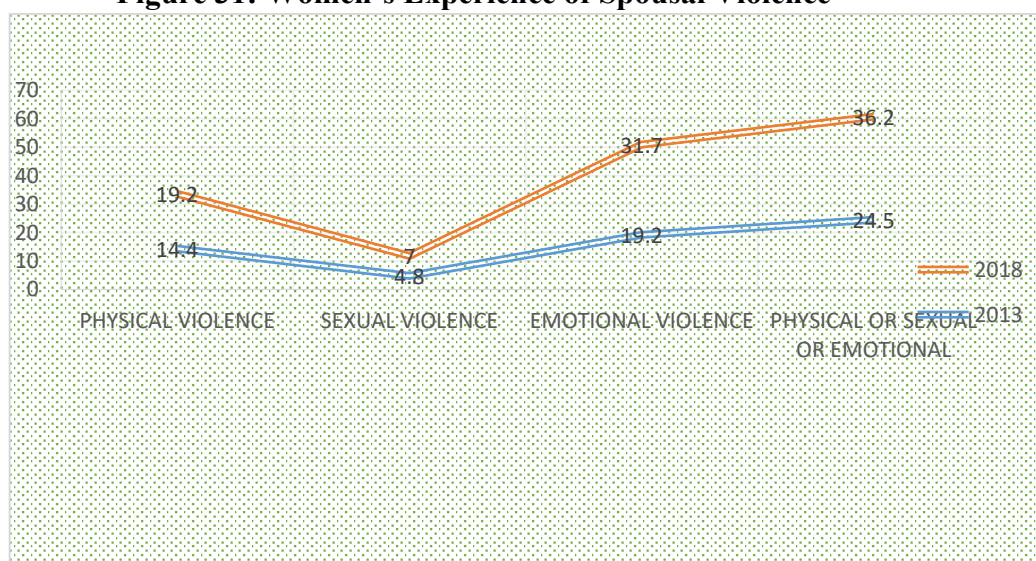
Physical or Sexual Violence was highest among age group 30-39 (31.5 per cent) in 2013 and increased to 34.4 per cent in 2018. ‘Physical violence only’ was 23.8 per cent in 2013 and increased slightly to 23.9 per cent in 2018. (Table 37)

2.6. Women’s Experience of Spousal Violence

Figure 31 above shows that all forms of violence against women was higher in 2018 than 2013, as overall prevalence of spousal physical or sexual or emotional violence increased from 24.5 per cent in 2013 to 36.2 per cent in 2018.

B. Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) among Women/Girls

Female Genital Mutilation/Cutting (FGM/C) is a cultural practice involving the ceremonial circumcision of a female child. Though the ceremony can be carried out at any age, it is mostly done before a female child attains the age of 15 years. This practice has been widely criticized due to its immediate and long-term medical negative implications to the well-being of the female and her reproductive health and well-being. Therefore, FGM/C is considered violence against women because it is a breach of the right of women as captured in SDG 5.3

Available statistical data from NDHS, 2018 indicated that women in the 45-49 age group had the highest percentage who had been circumcised (31.0 per cent), while women between 15 - 19 years old had the lowest percentage (13.7 per cent). This reveals decreased in circumcision in Nigeria. (Figure 32).

Figure 32: Percentage of women age 15 - 49 who have been Circumcised

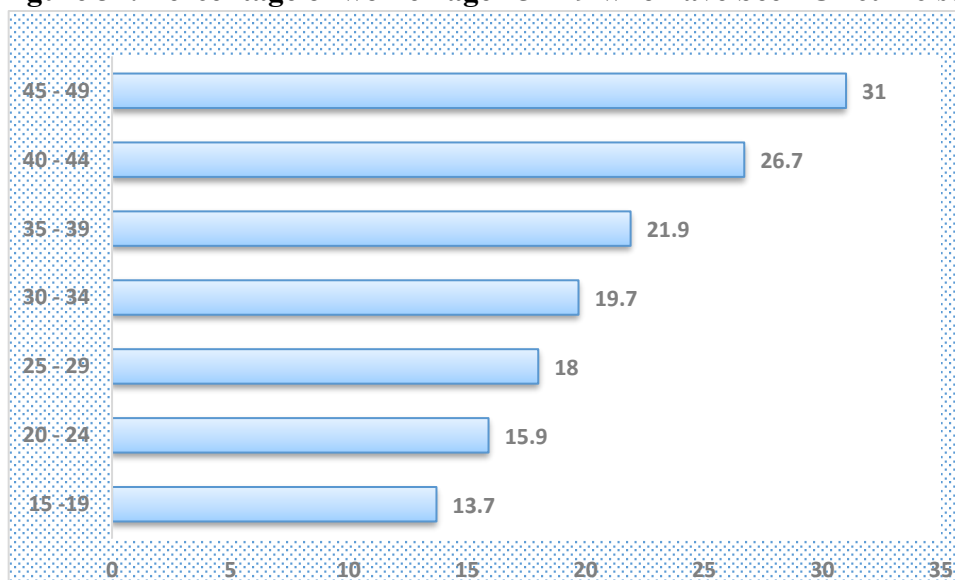

C. CRIME

1. Economic and Financial Crime

The Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) was established in 2003 by Government of Nigeria to investigate financial crimes such as advance fee fraud (419) and money laundering. The Commission is empowered to prevent, investigate, prosecute and penalize economic and financial crimes. It is also charged with the responsibility of enforcing the provisions of other laws and regulations relating to economic and financial crimes, including Bank Fraud, Advance Fee Fraud, Economic Fraud, among others.

1a. Economic Crime

Economic crime refers to illegal acts committed by an individual or a group of individuals to obtain a financial or professional advantage. The principal motive in such crimes is economic gain.

Arrest and conviction of people for economic crime over the period were on the increase for both male and female, except in 2017 and 2018 with 1 conviction each. There was a huge gap in the ratio of female to male convicted of economic crime across the years, it was 1 to 101 in 2017, 1 to 104 in 2018 and 13 to 145 in 2019. (Table 39 below).

1b. Financial Crime Cases in Nigeria

The number of males arrested for financial crime were on the increase from 1,532 in 2017 to 1,746 and 2,176 for 2018 and 2019 respectively. The number of male convicted for financial crime was consistently more than that of females in the referenced years with no female convicted at all against 48 males in 2019. Similarly, 2 females were convicted against 34 males and 5 females convicted against 58 males in 2017 and 2018 respectively. (Table 39 below).

1c. Money Laundering

Money Laundering refers to illegal process of concealing the origin of money obtained fraudulently by passing it through a complex sequence of banking and commercial transactions. The objective of a money launderer is to obscure the origin of money especially money obtained illegally. Data from table 39 below shows that males were more involved in the crime of money laundering during the three years under reference. Analysis further reveals that both arrest and conviction were decreasing, 211 males were arrested against 64 females in 2017, 154 males against 12 females were arrested in 2018 and 102

males against 17 females were arrested in 2019. No female was convicted for the crime of money laundering in 2017 and 2018 but 7 males and 21 males were convicted respectively. In 2019, no male but 7 females were convicted.

1d. Bank Fraud

Bank fraud is the use of potentially illegal means to obtain money, assets, or other property owned or held by a financial institution, or to obtain money from depositors by fraudulently posing as a bank or other financial institution. In many instances, bank fraud is a criminal offence. From table 39 below, bank fraud was more in 2019 as both male and female recorded highest number of arrest and conviction that year. The number of females arrested for bank fraud is less than that of males across the referenced years, it was 315 males against 179 females arrested in 2017, 303 males against 160 females and 344 males against 205 females arrested in 2018 and 2019 respectively. The ratio of female to male convicted for bank fraud was significant across the three years, there was no female convicted as against 13 males convicted in 2018, three females against 19 males and 1 female against 21 males convicted in 2017 and 2019 respectively. (ST. 41)

1e. Advance Fee Fraud

Advance fee fraud or “419” refers to the act of obtaining property or money by false pretence (“obtain by tricks”). Table 39 shows that males were more involved in advance fee fraud than the females and increased exponentially across the years under reference. The number of males convicted was 48 against 5 females in 2017, 107 males against 1 female and 285 males against 4 females in 2018 and 2019 respectively. Few females were convicted for advance fee fraud, out 118 females arrested in 2017 only 5 were convicted, only 1 out 349 females arrested in 2018 were convicted and 4 out 337 females arrested were convicted in 2019.

1f. Embezzlement

This is a financial fraud that involves withholding assets for the purpose of conversion of same by one or more persons to whom the assets were entrusted either to be held or to be used for specific purposes. Though, arrest and conviction of offenders due to embezzlement witnessed a downward trend from 2017 to 2019. Table 39 below further shows that males were more involved than females in the crime. 252, 151 and 129 males were arrested against 36, 16 and 25 females in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. Only one male was convicted each in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively for embezzlement while no female was convicted for the crime in all the three years.

1g. Bribery and Corruption

Bribery is giving or receiving an unearned reward to influence someone's behavior while corruption is any unlawful or improper behavior that seeks to gain an advantage through illegitimate means. Bribery and corruption do not just enrich the criminals, they inflict untold damage to society and business by undermining trust.

From table 39 below, the proportion of males involved in bribery and corruption is significantly higher than that of females in the three years under reference. 54, 53 and 45 males were arrested compared to 1, nil and 3 females in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively. No female was convicted throughout the three years, also no male was convicted in 2018. However, one (1) male was convicted in 2017 while three (3) males were convicted for the crime in 2019.

1h. Cyber Crime

Cyber Crime refers to several internet-assisted crimes. Cybercrime has remained a challenging issue despite increasing awareness and conscious attention devoted to addressing it both at local and international levels. It poses danger to the nation, institutions and people at large. Among its numerous adverse effects are huge monetary losses, reputational damage, productivity and rising costs and many more. Variants of cybercrime are cyber terrorism, cyber fraud, malware, password sniffing, wiretapping, spam, cyber stalking etc.

Table 39 below shows an exponential increase in both arrest and conviction of offenders due to cybercrime. In 2017, 2018 and 2019 the number of males arrested for cybercrime were 277; 319 and 878 as against 21; 48 and 73 females respectively. Out of these, 134, 151 and 390 males were convicted in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively, while only 8 females were convicted in 2019.

D. Suspects Arrested for Drug-Related Offences

Of all the suspects arrested for drug related offences in Nigeria from 2017 - 2019, the percentage of male suspects was far higher than the female though at a slightly declining rate. It was 93.79 per cent in 2017 and decreased to 92.82 per cent in 2018 and further decreased to 90.42 per cent in 2019 for male while the female suspects arrested was 6.21 per cent in 2017, increased slightly to 7.18 per cent in 2018 and increased further to 9.58 per cent in 2019. Special Command recorded highest percentage of arrest across the three years for male (91.67 per cent in 2017, declined to 85.53 per cent in 2018 and increased in 2019 but with 1.19 percentage point less than 2017) against 8.33 per cent in 2017, 14.47 per cent in 2018 and 9.52 per cent in 2019 for female. Although Seaports made the least arrest across the years, it is worthy to note that the highest percentage of female arrested was at seaports with 28.57 per cent in 2017, no female was arrested in 2018 and 14.29 per cent arrested in 2019. (Table 40).

A. Trafficking in Person

1. Number of Trafficked Person by Age Group, Sex and Year

Human trafficking remains both a domestic and global crime with victims trafficked either for sex trade, forced labor or domestic servitude within their own country to neighboring countries or inter states. Vulnerabilities as a result of poverty, unemployment, displacement, lack of knowledge/experience and other forms of difficult situations influence the traffickers to prey on weaknesses of the victims. Human trafficking can cause physical, emotional and psychological trauma to the survivors. Many of the victims can end

up experiencing depression, memory loss, shame, fear and anxiety and other severe forms of mental trauma.

Analysis from table 41 below shows that women are mostly trafficked than their male counterparts. Furthermore, females in the age groups (12-17 years) and 18 years and above were mostly trafficked. In 2016, 84.05 per cent of those trafficked were women 18+. This increased to 90.42 and 90.88 per cents in 2017 and 2018 respectively before it slightly dropped to 87.39 percent in 2019. This was same for the age group (12-17) years. The percentage of trafficked women is in the range of 71.17 - 82.96 per cent during the years under reference. Even for the children in the age group (1-11) years, females suffered more from human trafficking as 72.28 percent were trafficked in 2016, 31.56 percent in 2017, 67.81 percent in 2018 and 58.6 percent in 2019.

2. Identified Trafficking for Forced Labour

The percentage of female trafficked for forced labor was below average in 2016 (43.48 per cent). It increased significantly in 2017 (78.53 per cent) and dropped slightly to 70 per cent in 2018 and decreased to 9.23 percent in 2019. Males were mostly trafficked for forced labour in 2017 and 2019. (Table 42).

3. Identified Trafficking for Prostitution

From table 42 below, identified trafficking for prostitution from 2016-2019 were less than 3 per cent males, females were the major victims of human trafficking for prostitution. In 2016, all victims trafficked for prostitution were females. The percentage of females trafficked for prostitution were not less than 97 per cent (97.94, 97.58 and 99.59 per cent) for 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively.

4. Distribution of Trafficked Persons by Type, Sex and Year

In 2016, females trafficked for child labor recorded the highest number (288) followed by the ones for external sexual exploitation (231). Also, males were mainly trafficked for child labor (94), followed by external trafficking for labour exploitation (62).

In 2017, the number of females trafficked for external sexual exploitation was 417 followed by 151 females due to child labor, while 148 males were mainly trafficked for child labor and 74 males due to internal labor exploitation. Table 43.

In 2018, females were trafficked mostly for external sexual exploitation (172) followed by child abuse (113) while males were mainly trafficked for internal labor exploitation (51), then child abuse (38).

In 2019, females trafficked for external sexual exploitation were 205 followed by 113 females for child labor and 113 females for child abuse, males on the other hand were mainly trafficked for external labor exploitation (59) followed by 51 males for child labor.
