PREFACE

The need for credible and timely socio-economic data for development has continued to surge by the ever-increasing need for development and growing interest in Nigeria as destination for investment. This interest and need for data on Nigeria has further increased in recent times due to the current social and economic challenges being faced by the country. As the coordinator of the National Statistical System (NSS) and authoritative source of all official statistics in Nigeria, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS), by its mandate is expected to meet data demands of policy makers and users both within and outside the country.

This publication has been produced to meet NBS' specific mandate of collecting, collating, analysing and disseminating statistical information on all facet on the Nigerian economy, as well as that of coordinating the production of relevant official statistics at all levels in Nigeria.

The social Statistics Report 2016 is a compilation of data on the contemporary social situation in Nigeria. The report presents a variety of social and economic statistics that measure quality of life. Data for this publication was mainly generated from secondary sources from relevant Federal Government Ministries, Departments and Agencies to enrich our data base. In most cases, the information presented in this report spans from 2013 to 2015. Statistics over this time frame on annual basis form the benchmark for measuring social and economic conditions of the citizenry of Nigeria. However, there are gaps from some agencies who do not have the required data. The themes covered in the report include employment, education, health, public safety and transportation. In terms of structure, the report has been divided into sixteen chapters for convenience.

I wish to acknowledge the support of the Planning, Research and Statistics Department of relevant MDAs in supplying data for the compilation of this report. Agencies that did not respond to our data requests are kindly required to assist the Bureau in providing the needed data for future publications.

I have no doubt that the publication will go a long way in meeting the needs of policy makers, researchers, students, social advocates and other relevant stakeholders to formulate policies and strategies as well as track changes on various dimensions of socio-economic conditions in Nigeria.

It is therefore my pleasure to present this edition of Social Statistics Report 2016 to the various users. We welcome any suggestions and contributions that will help in improving future compilations.

CHAPTER ONE -AGRICULTURE

Agricultural production is central to the overall well-being of the populace. As a result, high premium is placed on agriculture in order to develop and protect the sector, thereby guaranteeing sustainable food security, employment opportunities among others. In Nigeria, the sector remains largely subsistent, primitive and undeveloped. The Nigerian agricultural sector has a rich history; recording world’s highest producers of palm oil, cocoa and groundnut, in the 1960s and up to the early 1970s. This led to improvement in material well-being of all citizens both in social, political and economic spheres. Over time, agricultural activities declined leading to a fall in output and contribution to national development. Given the reality of falling oil price in the international market and the need to diversify the economy, the Nigerian government has refocused its attention on agriculture amongst other key sectors to revamp the economy.

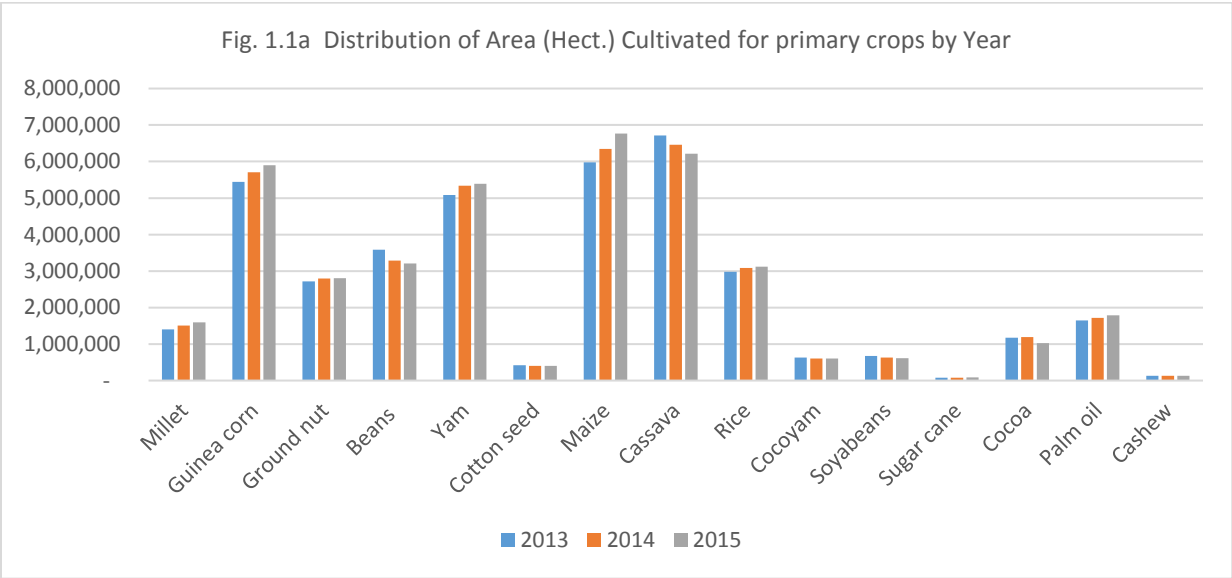
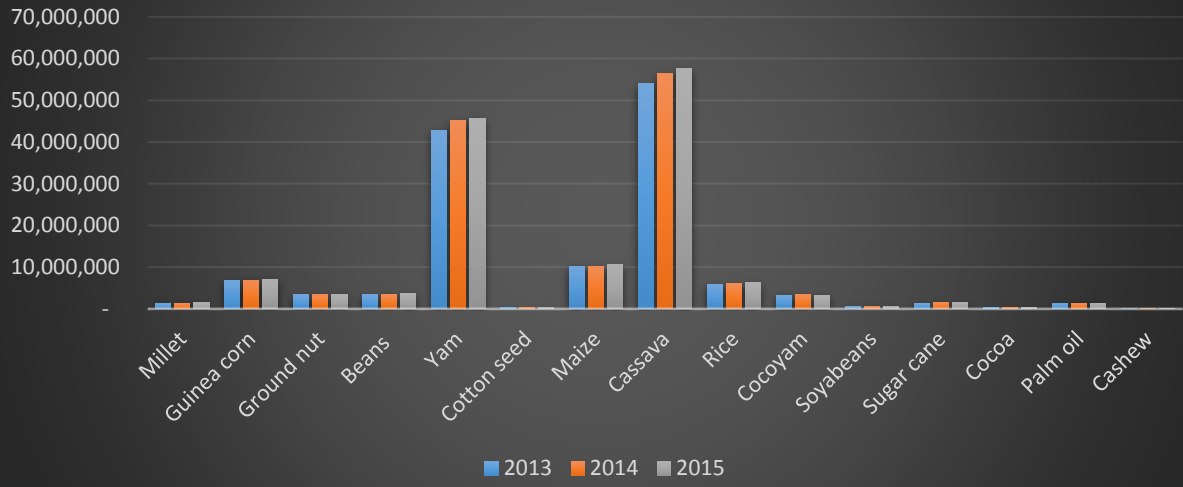


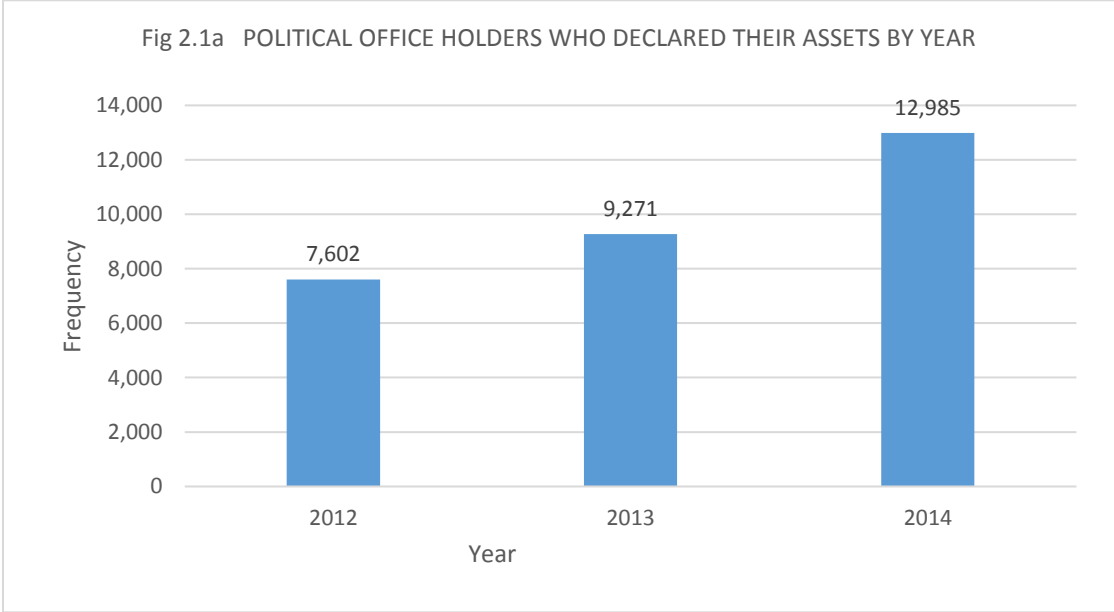
Fig. 1.1b Distribution of Primary Crops Production(Ton) by year

Figure 1.1a shows the distribution of area (hect.) cultivated and production of primary crops for the period 2013–2015. Cassava crop had the highest area cultivated for 2013 and 2014 with 6,718,490 and 6,458,435 respectively, while maize had the highest in 2015 with 6,771,189. In the three years under review, sugarcane had the least area cultivated with 77,030 in 2013, 81,870 in 2014 and 84,320 in 2015.

However, cassava crop had the highest production quantity for the three years with 54,023,150 in 2013, 56,328,480 in 2014 and 57,643,271 in 2015. Cottonseed had the least production quantity of crop with 296,610 in 2013, 290,162 in 2014, and 401,441 in 2015.

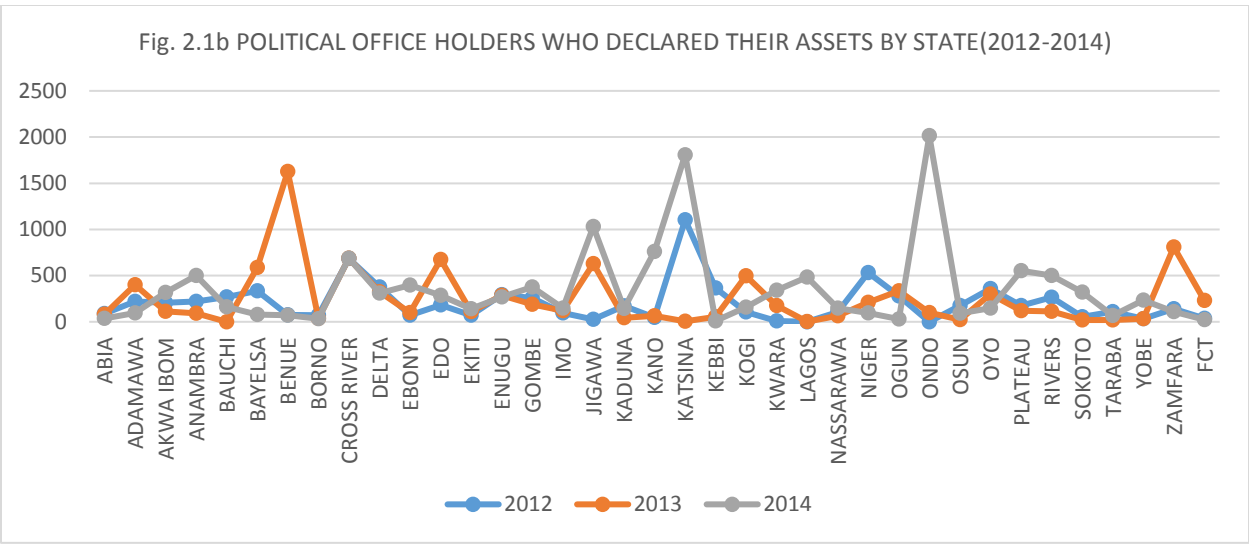
CHAPTER TWO - ANTI-CORRUPTION

Corruption is a multifaceted word which generally refers to dishonest or immoral behaviour that is not in line with accepted standards of society norms and values. Officially, corruption can be considered as the abuse of an entrusted position for personal benefit or as the misused of an office for securing an undeserved gain. Corruption in Nigeria like any other country manifests in various forms. It is a common phenomenon in both public and private sectors, formal and informal sectors of the economy. Corruption undermines sustainable development strides either sectorially or institutionally and creates a strong disincentive to foreign investment drive. This chapter deals with corruption related data in Nigeria generated from the activities of Independent Corrupt Practices Commission (ICPC), Economic Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) and most importantly Code of Conduct Bureau (CCB).

The number of political office holders who purportedly declared their assets increased from 7,602 in 2012 to 9,271 (21.95%) in 2013 and thereafter rose to 12,985(40.06%) in 2014.



Data from CCB further indicates that, on a state by state basis, Ondo state topped the ranking of number of political office holders that declared their assets with 2,014, followed by Katsina State which had 1,807, while the least among the states was Kebbi with a record of 10 in 2014. Fig 2.1b below shows a state by state depiction of this indicator for 2012 to 2014.



Between 2012 and 2013 the number of civil servants who openly declared their assets rose from 44,943 in 2012 to 61,776 in 2013 (37.45%) but suddenly declined to 41,527 in 2014. However, it increased to 81,343 (57.48 %) in 2015. Kano state recorded the highest number among the states with 7,984 followed by Oyo and Gombe state with 5,780 and 5,796 respectively while Abia state had the lowest number among the states with 49 in 2015.

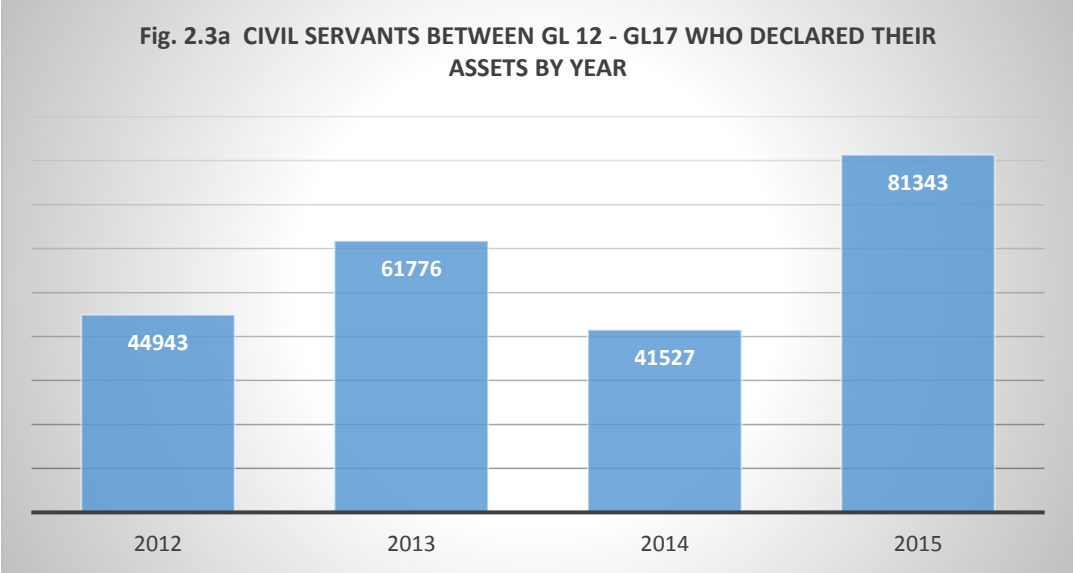
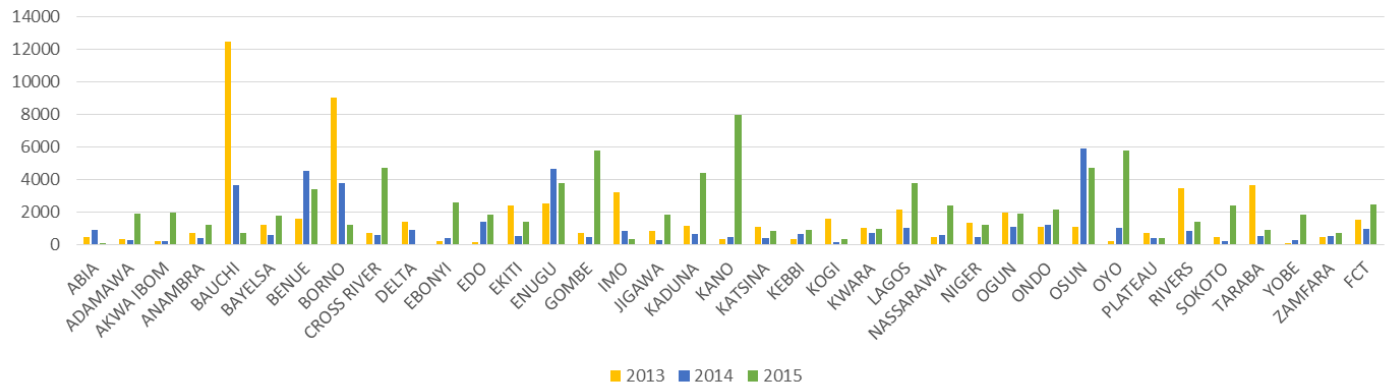


Fig. 2.3b CIVIL SERVANTS BETWEEN GL 12 - GL17 WHO DECLARED THEIR ASSETS BY STATE AND YEAR (2012 - 2015)



CHAPTER THREE - CIVIL SERVICE

The Nigerian civil service is a vital instrument of the federal government that provides platform for social development and the sustainability of governance in the society. The government relies on the civil service to carry out the will of the state. The civil service consists of employees in Nigerian government agencies other than the military. Most employees are career civil servants in the Nigerian ministries, departments and agencies, progressing based on qualifications and seniority. The Nigerian civil service consists of many personnel with technical skills which provide capacity for large scale management. In this chapter, data on the employment into the civil service by the Federal Civil Service Commission is presented.

In the year 2012, a total number of new employee that entered the federal civil service was 2,334 and 3,352 in 2013. When compared with the number in 2014, which was put at 3,255, there was a slight decline of 2.89%.

Delta state recorded the highest number of new intakes by state of origin, with 168, while Rivers State came next with a record of 152; Jigawa State recorded the least with 43 in 2014.

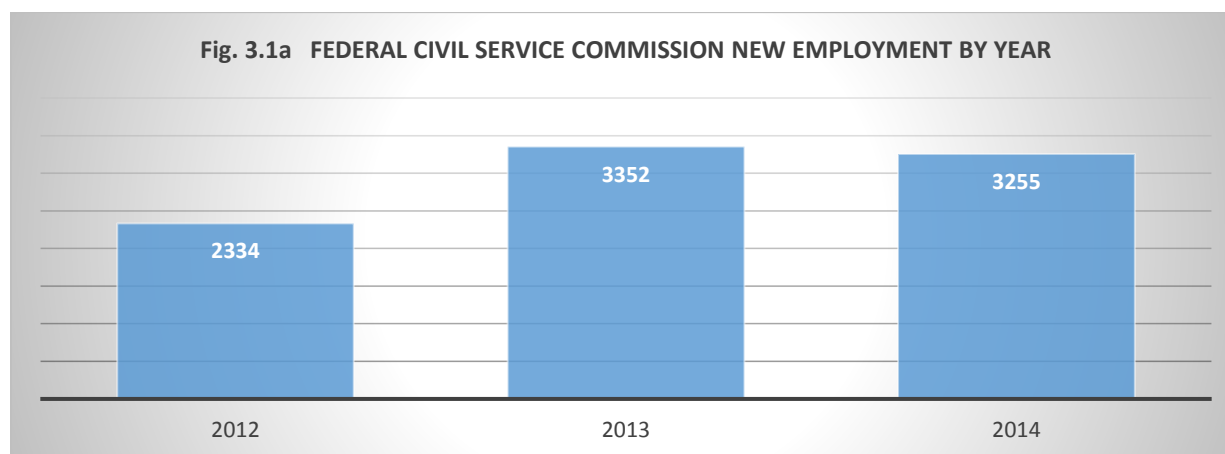
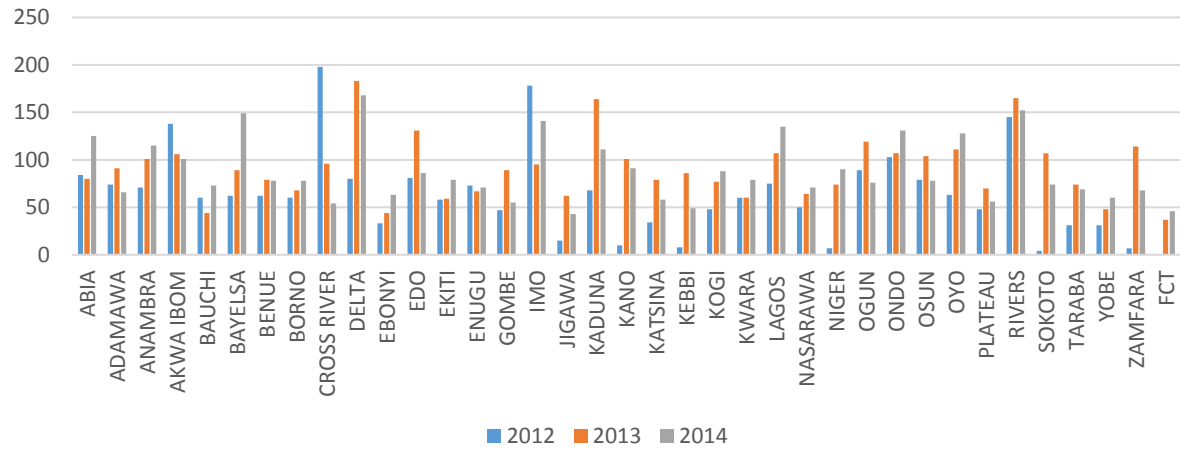


Fig. 3.1b FEDERAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION NEW EMPLOYMENT BY STATE of ORIGIN AND YEAR



CHAPTER FOUR - COMMUNICATION

One of the sectors that enhances and facilitates development in the country is the Telecommunication sector. This has brought about an immense transformation to Nigeria economy as information is easily disseminated both locally and globally. The communication sector in Nigeria comprises radio, television, fixed and mobile telephones, Nigerian Postal Services (NIPOST) and the Internet. Telecommunication facilities constitute critical parts of infrastructure in Nigeria and determine the efficiency of the communication system. This chapter presents data on both the accessibility and usage of telecommunication via phone calls and use of internet.

Fig: 4.1 shows the statistical data of communication industry in Nigeria as at December, 2013 presented with service categories which include Mobile (GSM), Mobile CDMA, Fixed Wireless, fixed wired showing the different values for Connected Lines, Active Voice Subscribers and Active Internet Subscriptions. In the service category, there were more Connected Lines of Mobile (GSM) (159,758,538) compared to Fixed wired (1,108,567) which is the least in this category. There are also more Active Voice Subscribers on Mobile (GSM) with a total of 124,841,315, fixed wireless category which had the least Connected Lines with a total of 101,979. Mobile (GSM) lines of communication has shown how dynamic and versatile it is, going by the high figure also reflected in the Active Internet Subscriptions of 64,229,097.

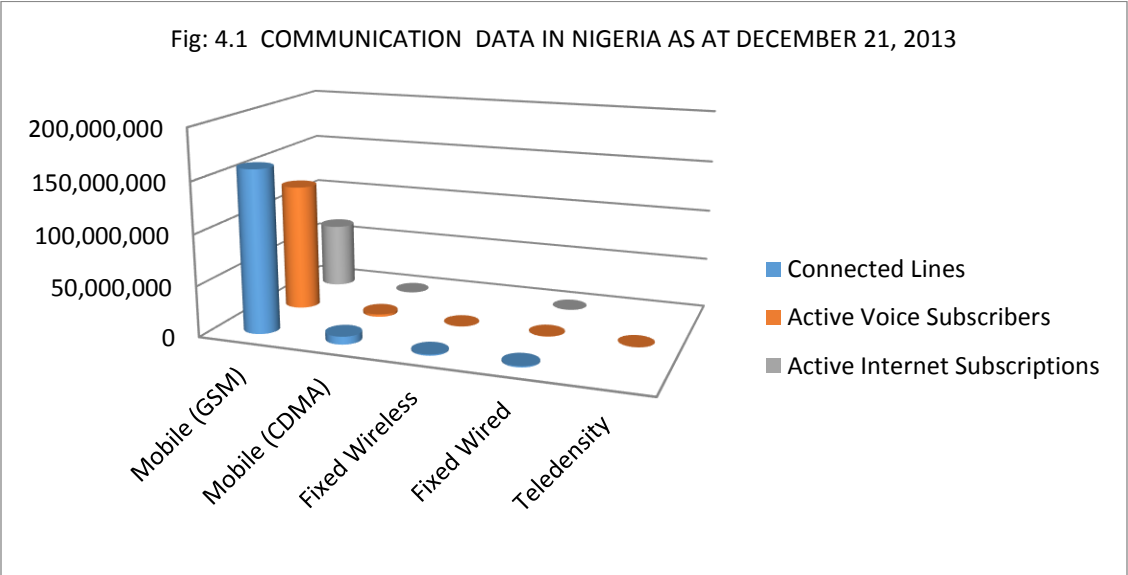


Fig. 4.2 shows that in 2014, the case was not the same compared to 2013 even though Mobile (GSM) line still retained the highest in ranks across Connected Lines; Active Voice Subscribers and Active Internet Subscriptions with (179,973,274), (131,910,228) and (73,869,523) respectively. Fixedwireless apparently recorded the least in the year for both Connected Lines and Active Voice Subscribers with a total of 173,495 and 65,746 respectively.

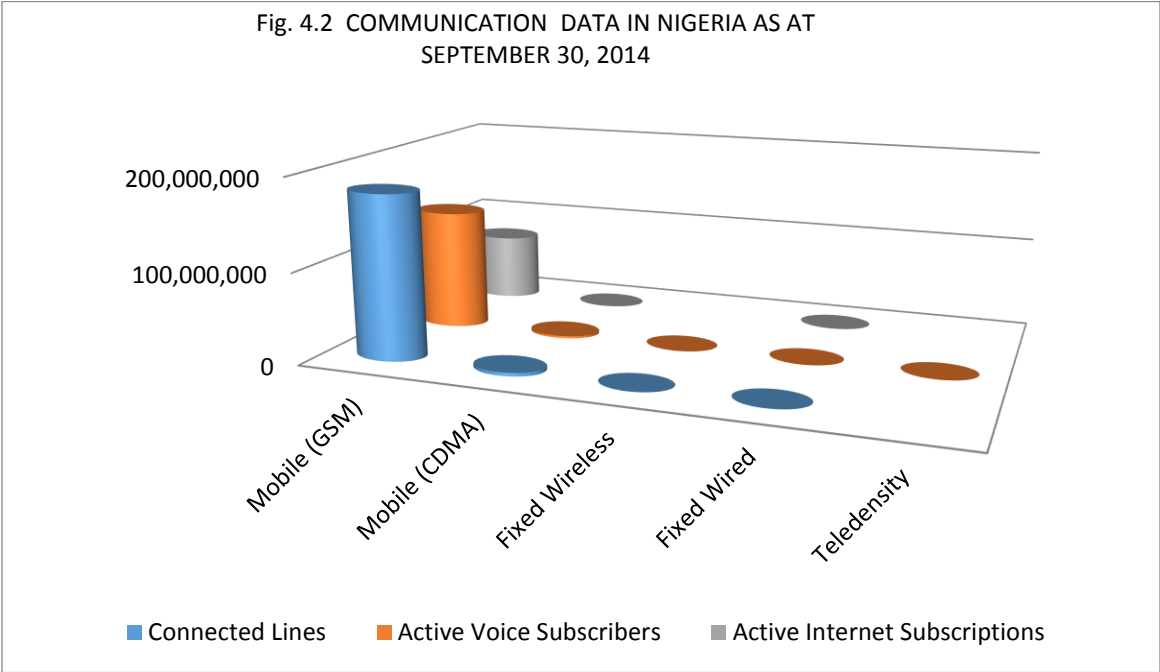
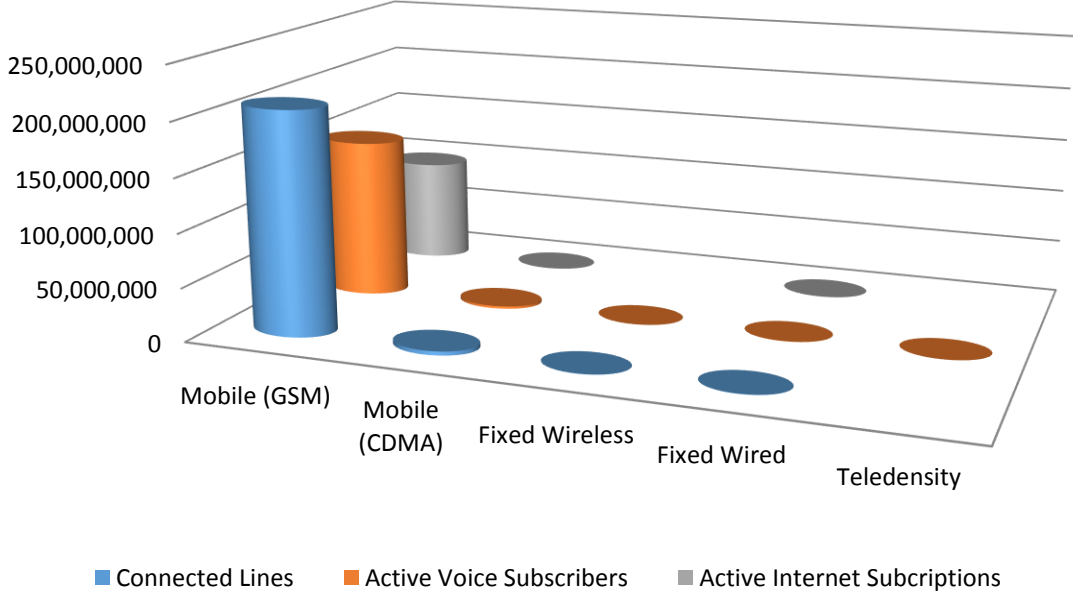


Fig 4.3 shows that in terms of ranking, the pattern in 2014 is maintained in 2015. Mobile (GSM) had the highest (207,928,275), followed by active voice subscribers (148,681,362) while active internet line subscribers had 97,032,543. Fixed wireless recorded the lowest with 152,534 subscribers.

Fig. 4.3 COMMUNICATION DATA IN NIGERIA AS AT DECEMBER 31, 2015

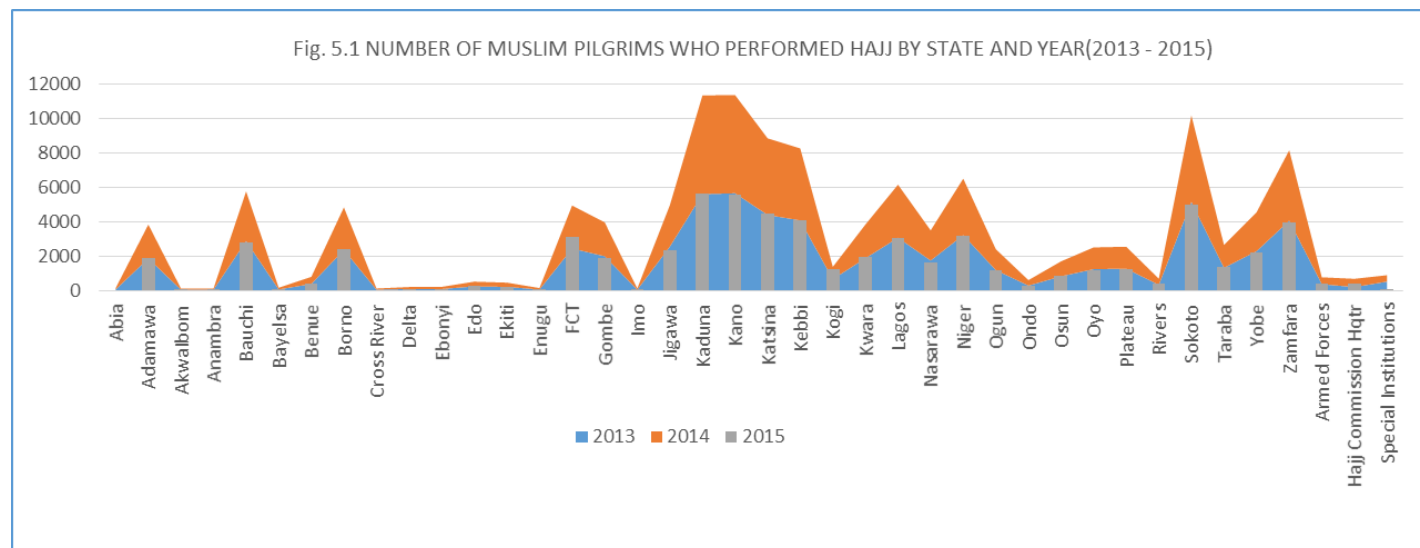


CHAPTER FIVE - CULTURE AND TOURISM

Tourism is one of the growing sectors of the Nigerian economy; tourist visiting the country will gain insights to a glorious past as well as a promising future and the natural beauty of the country. From rain forests in the south, broad savannah woodlands in the centre to a semi-desert region in the north. Nigerian culture and tourism activities are wide; however, data availability constrains this chapter to report only on pilgrimage.

Nigeria in the comity of nations has not been left out in the pilgrimage exercise as both religion (Islam and Christianity) are usually involved in the periodic pilgrimage exercise. The Muslims thus perform hajj just as Christians also usually visit the holy land of Israel. It is worthy of note that states in the south-east and south-south of the country also have Muslims who perform hajj though at a lower ratio compared to the northern and south-west states. This chapter shows the number of Muslim pilgrims who performed hajj from 2013 – 2015.

Fig. 5.1 shows a constant trend of yearly total of 66,000, for the three years under review. However, the slots allotted to different states, special institutions and hajj headquarters differed from year to year. Kano State had the highest number of pilgrims (5,676) in 2013, Imo, Anambra, Cross Rivers and Akwalbom all had the same lowest number of Pilgrims with 80. In the year 2014, Kaduna had the highest number of pilgrims (5,732) while Cross River, Imo, Anambra and Akwalbom had 70, 72, 72 and 73 respectively. However, in the year 2015, there was a decline of the South South/Eastern States, Cross River had 39 participants, Abia 41, Akwalbom and Imo both had 72 and Anambra had 73 while Kaduna State still retained the highest with 5,682.



CHAPTER SIX - EDUCATION

Education continues to occupy a pivotal position in all developmental programs of Government. It produces socio-economic, technological and political advancement. Good and quality education statistics would facilitate educational planning at all levels as well as influence and stabilize positive changes in other sectors. At the formal level, education is structured into primary, secondary and tertiary as presented in this chapter.

Fig. 6.1 shows the public primary school enrolment disaggregated by sex for 2013 and 2014. Enrolment declined for both sexes with 12,916,185 males and 11,268,842 females in 2013 to 12,145,968 and 10,983,958 respectively in 2014.

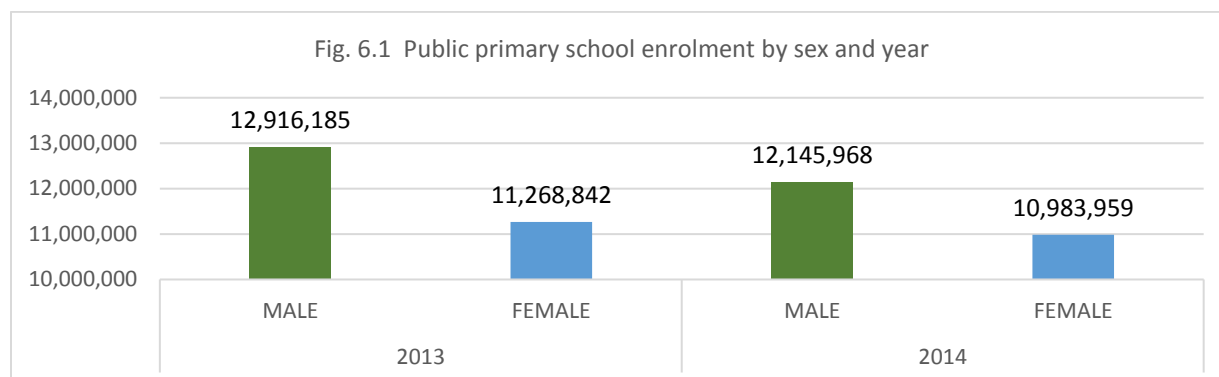


Fig. 6.2 shows the number of public primary schools in Nigeria by state and year. Kano state recorded the highest number of schools with 5,335 in 2013 which increased to 5,732 in 2014. The least was FCT with 525 and 544 schools in 2013 and 2014 respectively.

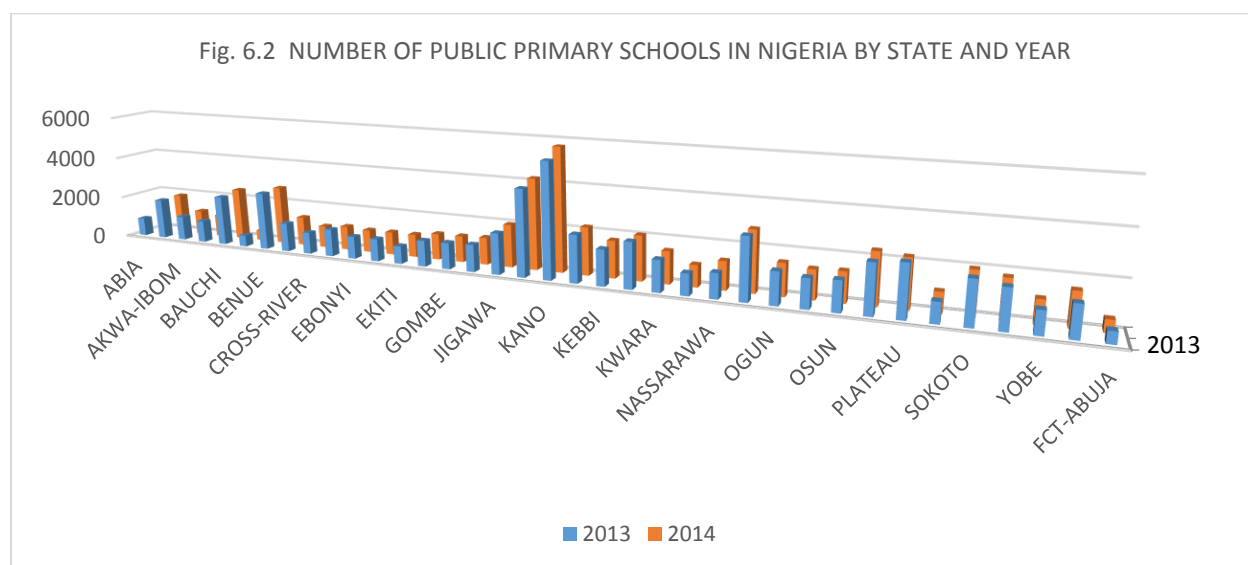


Fig. 6.3 shows the summary of Public Primary Schools in Nigeria for 2013 and 2014. There was a decrease in the total number of teachers from 577,303 in 2013 to 574,579 in 2014 (0.47%). For teacher/pupil's ratio, 2013 recorded a ratio of one teacher to 42 pupils while in 2014, it had one teacher to 40 pupils.

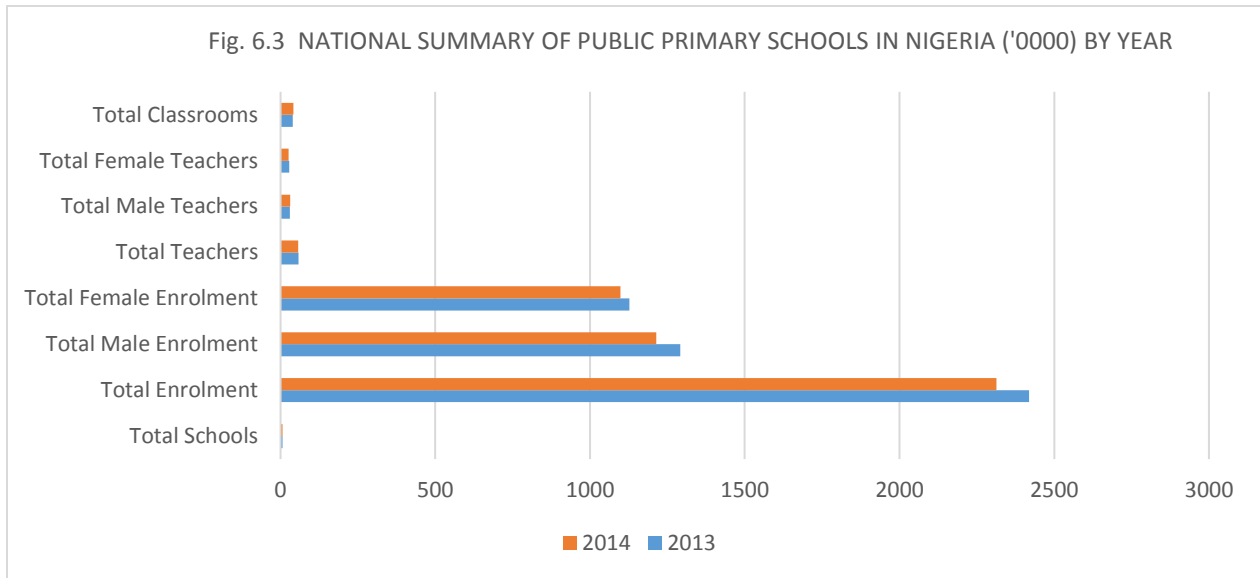


Fig 6.4 shows information on public Early Childhood Curriculum Development Education (ECCDE) from 2013 to 2014. The total number of schools decreased from 30,901 in 2013 to 27,258 in 2014, while total enrolment increased in 2013 from 2,968,201 to 3,101,542 in 2014.

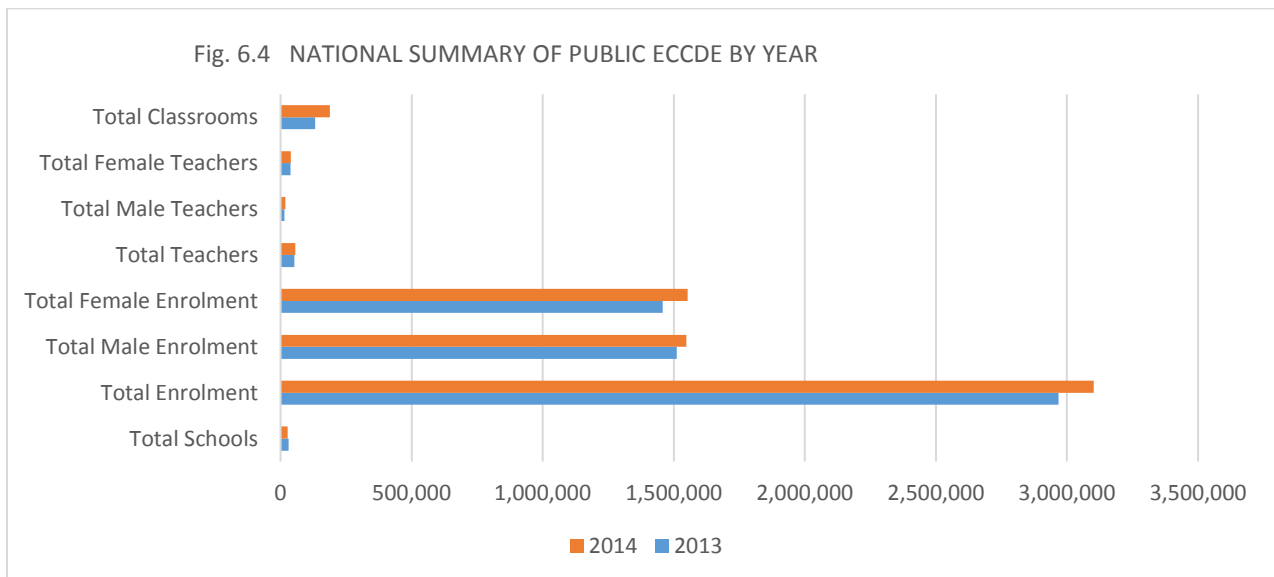
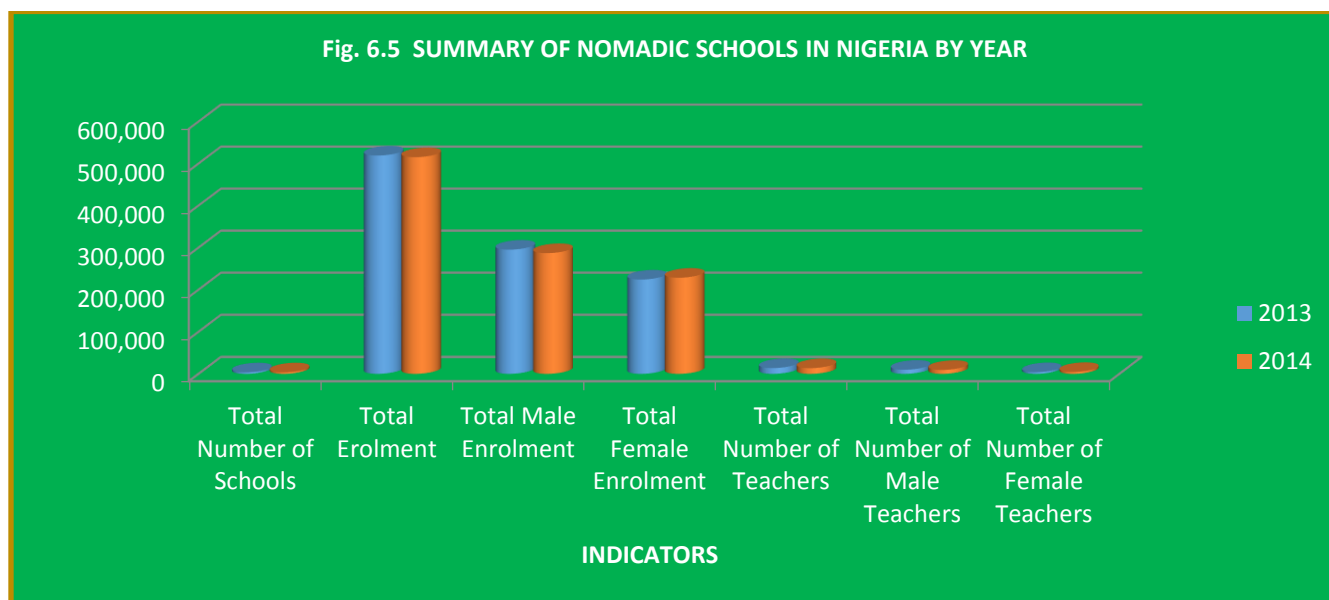


Fig 6.5 shows summary of nomadic schools in Nigeria from 2013 to 2014. There was a decline in total enrolment from 519,018 in 2013 to 515,080 in 2014 by 0.76% while total number of teachers increased from 13,675 in 2013 to 13,737 in 2014 (male 9,319 and female 4,418).



There was an increase in the total number of classrooms from 3,451 in 2013 to 3,628 in 2014 by 5.12%. However, classrooms under tree shade showed continuous decline over the years from 3,187 in 2010 to 794 in 2014, showing a 75.1% decline. Fig 6.6 gives the summary of Public Junior Secondary schools by year. There was a decrease in total number of schools from 11,874 in 2013 to 11,651 in 2014, number of classrooms rose from 82,757 in 2013 to 88,928 in 2014. The teacher/pupils ratio was 1:26 in 2014 compared with 1:25 in 2013.

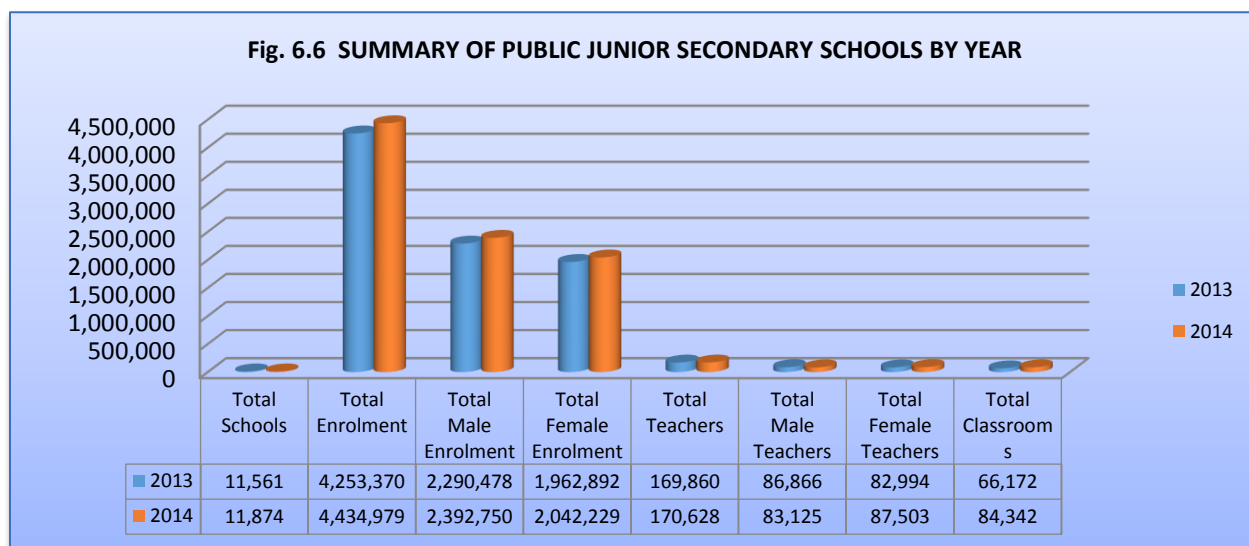


Fig. 6.7 shows application into Nigerian University by sex from 2013 to 2015. With a decline in application over the years, from 1,738,810 in 2013 to 1,475,600 in 2015, Imo state recorded the highest number of application in 2015 with 104,382.

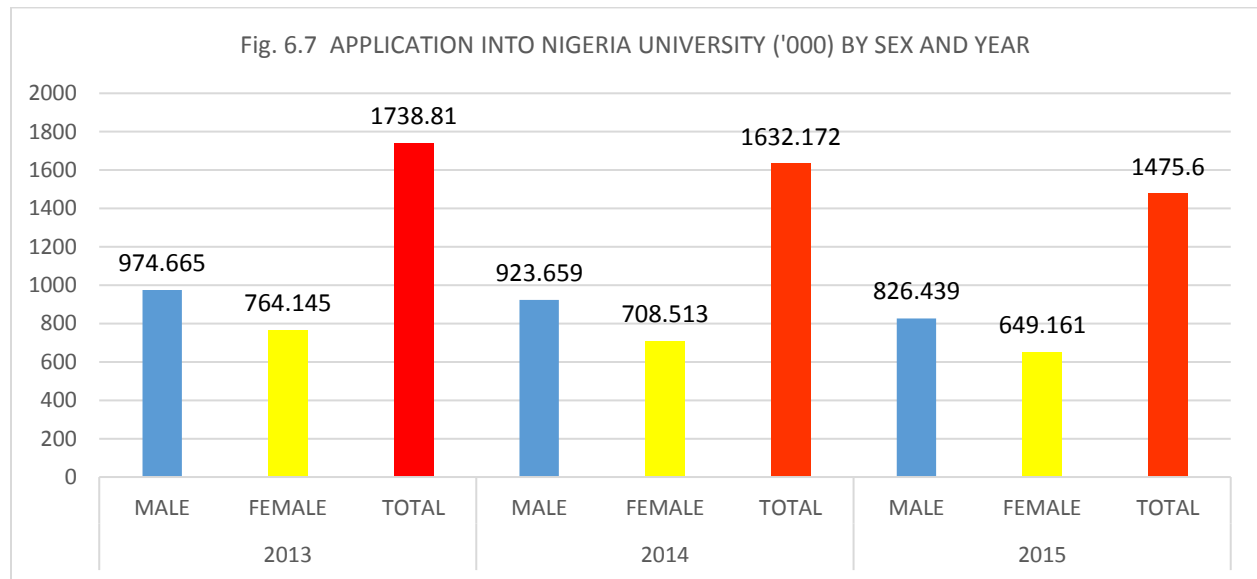


Fig 6.8 shows the distribution of registered students into Nigeria law school by campus, set and session (2013 to 2015). October set of 2014/2015 had the lowest registration with 4,641 students which increased to 5,436 in 2015/2016 by 17.12%.

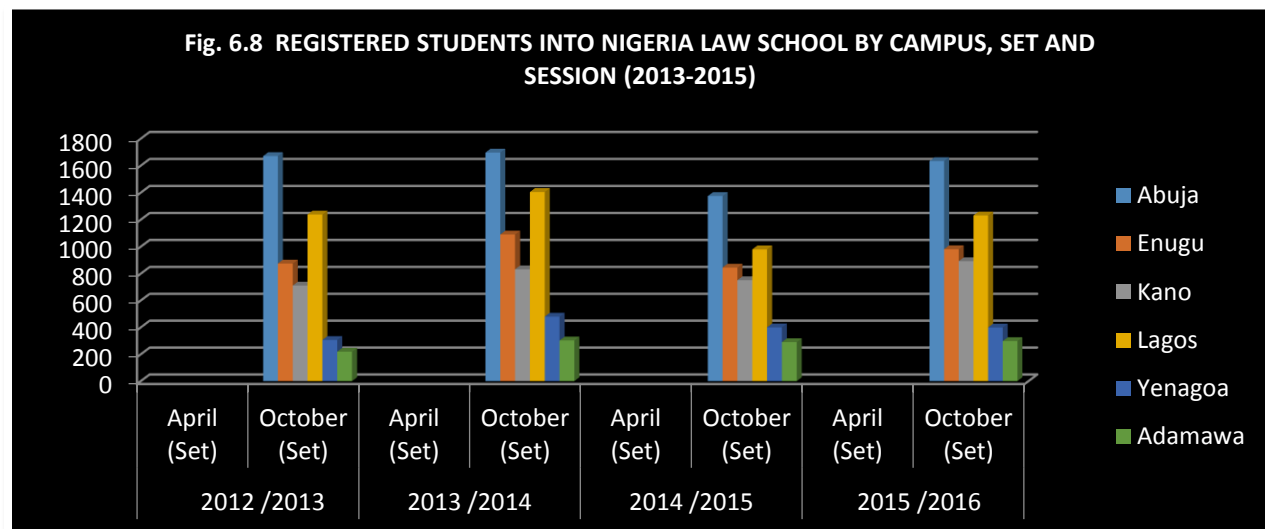

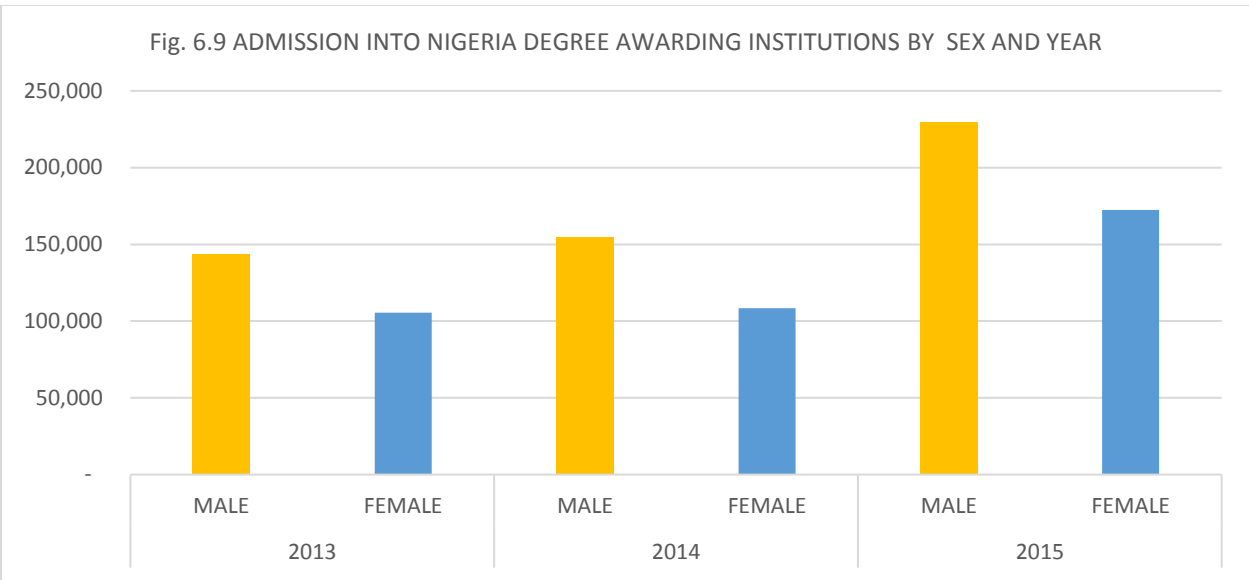


Fig. 6.10 shows the distribution of deployed corps members (NYSC) by state from 2010 to 2014. Nationally, 222,224 corps members were deployed in 2010, it rose in 2011 to 275,704 but dropped in 2012 and 2013 to 249,119 and 218,701 respectively. There was however a rise in 2014 to 264,364 with male accounting for 128,096 and female 136,268.

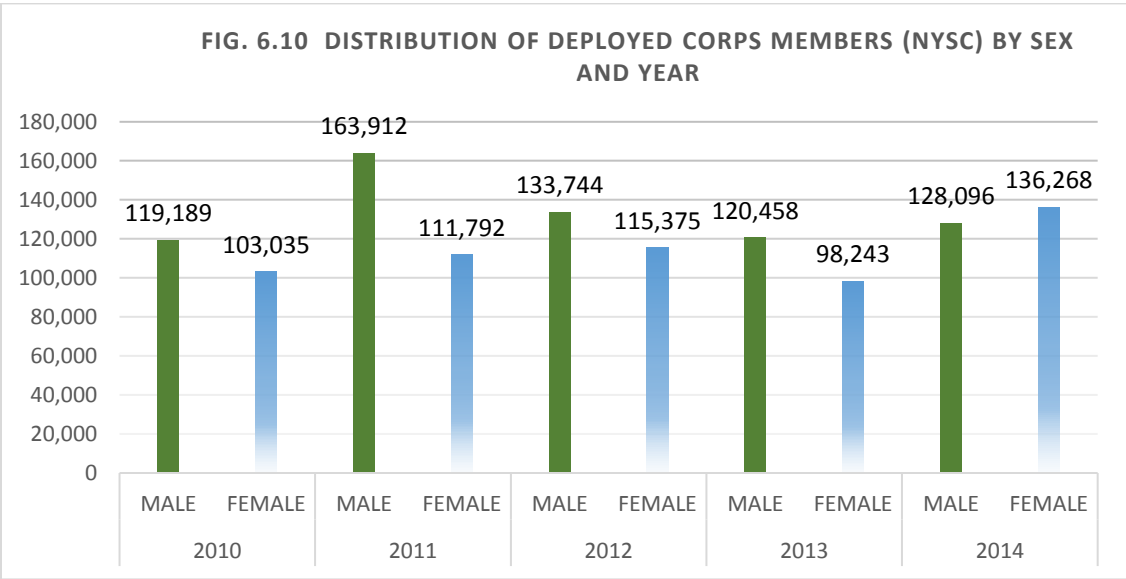


Table 6.11 shows the distribution of National youth service corps members by age group and sex for the period 2013 - 2014. There was a higher number of corps members recorded within the age 25 to 29 with the total of 45,829 and 37,074 in 2013 and 2014 respectively.

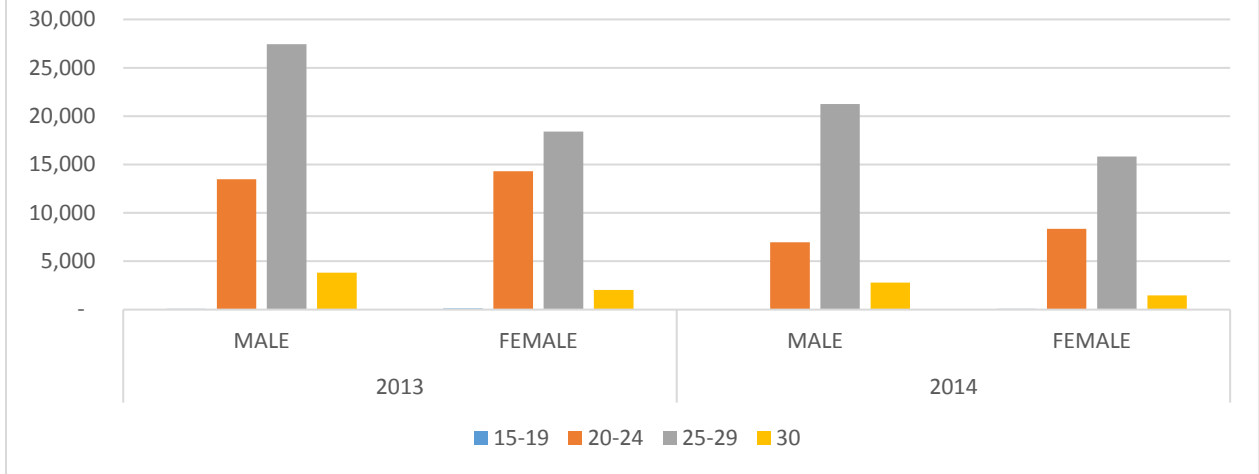


Fig. 6.12 shows the summary of National Library registered readers by year and category (2013 to 2015). The yearly total shows an upward trend in the three years referenced with 746,852 registered readers in 2013 and 1,429,535 in 2015. On the category of readers, hourly count readers accounted for the highest number of readers with 566,642 and 629,483 in 2014 and 2015 respectively.

Fig. 6.12: TOTAL NUMBER OF NATIONAL LIBRARY REGISTERED READERS BY CATEGORY AND YEAR

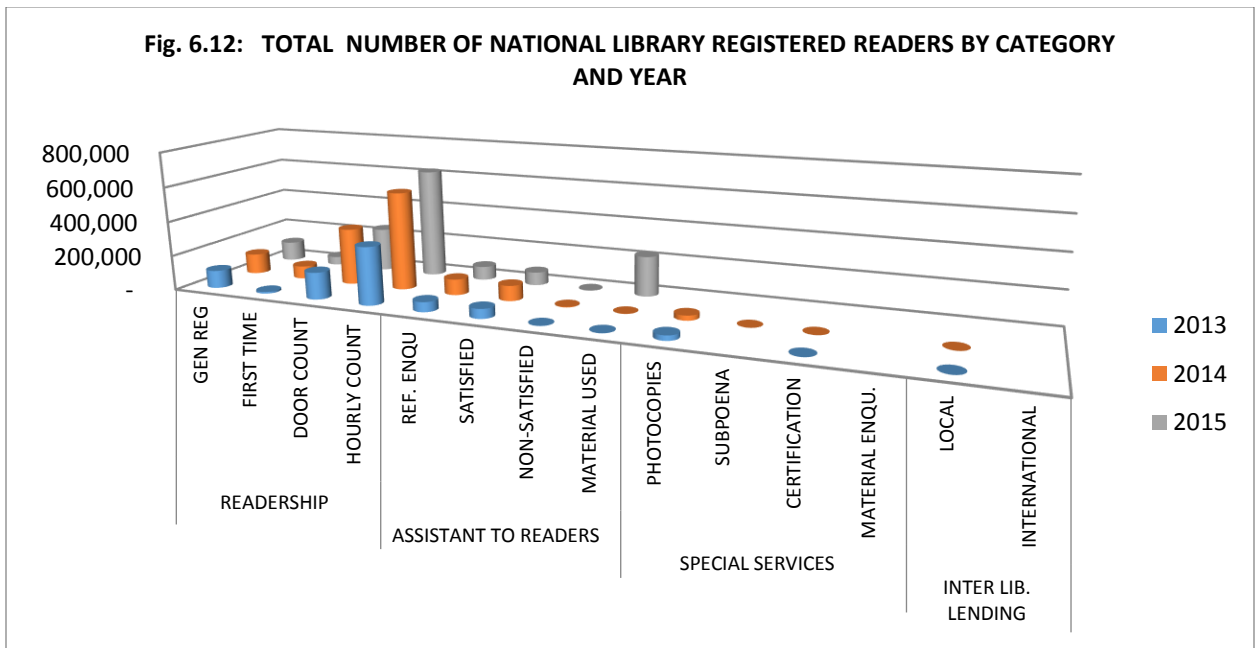
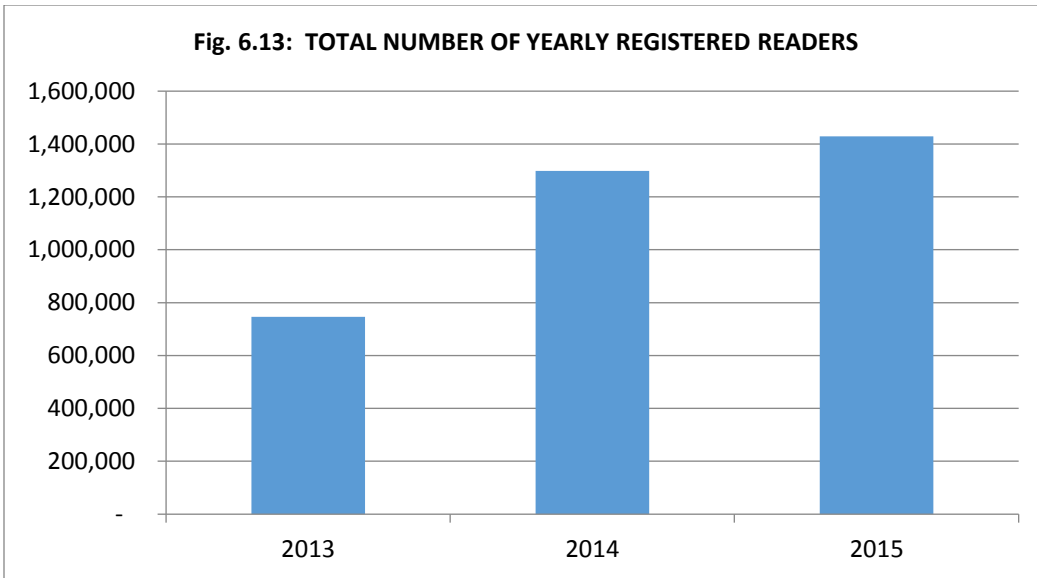
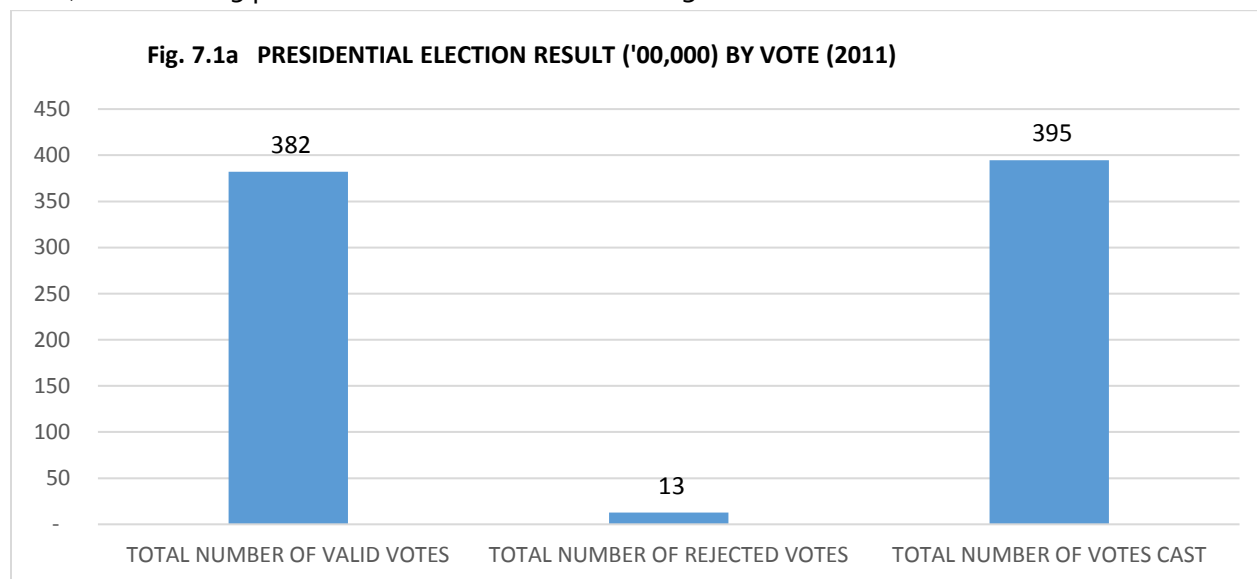


Fig. 6.13: TOTAL NUMBER OF YEARLY REGISTERED READERS



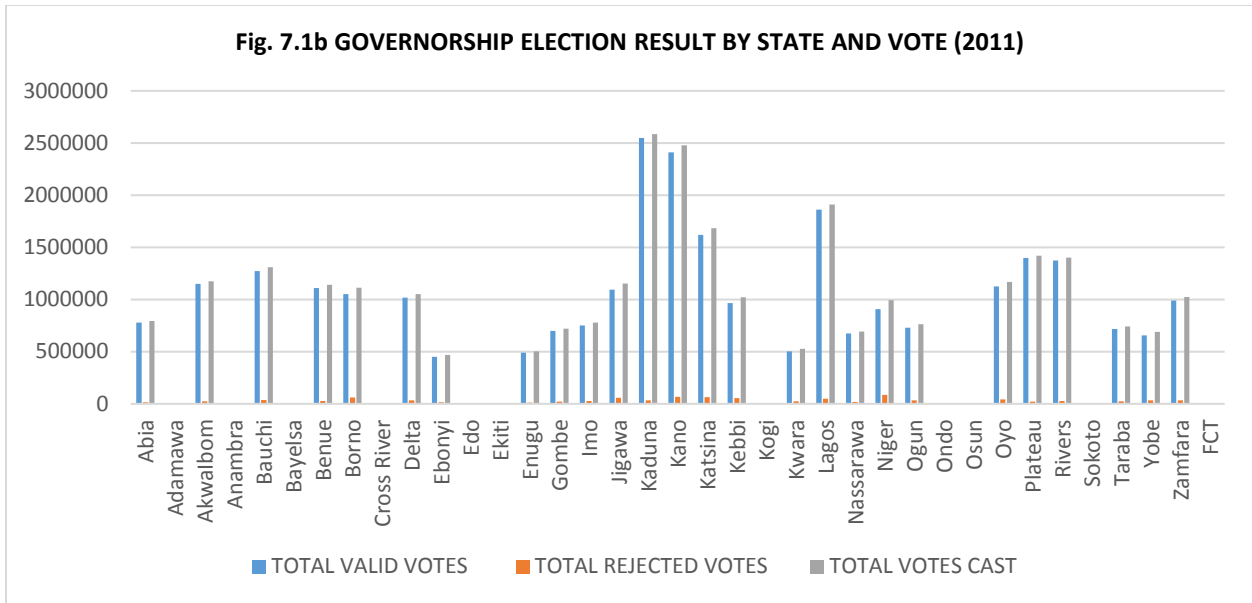
CHAPTER SEVEN - ELECTION STATISTICS

Elections are the cornerstone of democratic governance. The ability to conduct credible elections and to manage electoral processes in a harmonious and constitutional manner is essential to the foundation of democratic government. In the course of elections, the legislature, executive, state and local government offices are filled. This chapter provides electoral data on some specific election results conducted in Nigerian to fill in some certain positions within a specific period. The total number of votes cast in 2011 presidential election was 39,469,484, out of which 38,209,978 votes were valid and 1,259,506 were rejected. Out of the total number of votes cast, PDP recorded 57 Per cent. This was followed by CPC (31 Per cent) and ACN (5.3 Per cent). PDP had 25 percent of the total votes cast in 31 States.



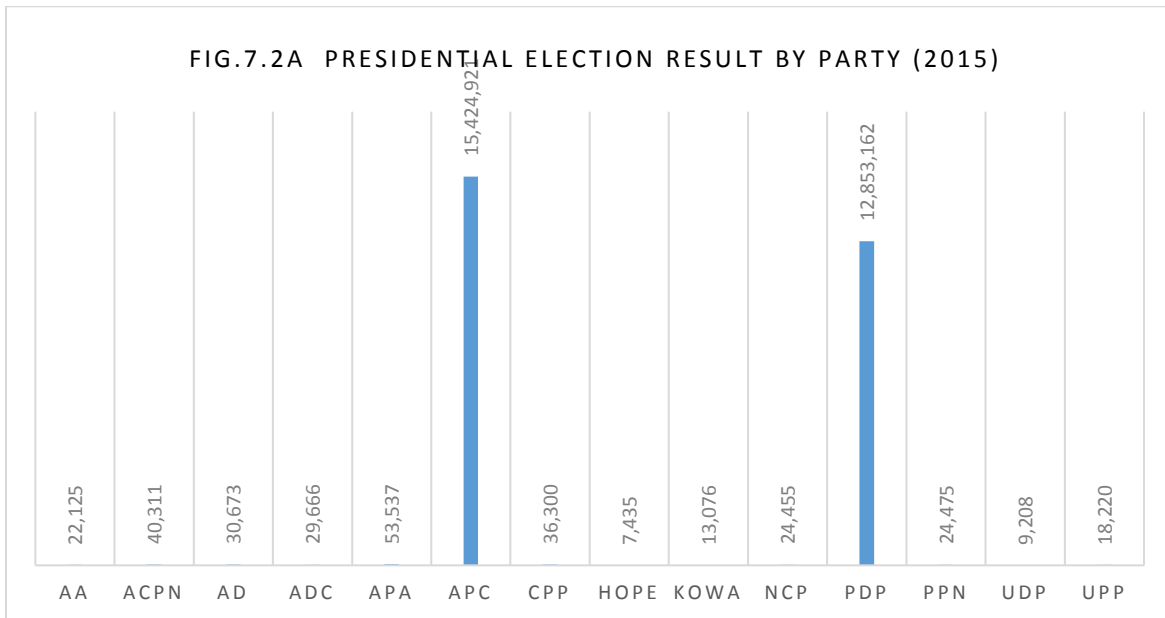
The Governorship election was conducted in 26 States with a total number of 29,298,453 votes cast, out of which total valid votes were 28,347,842, and total rejected votes were 950,611. The highest number of votes cast was recorded in Kaduna with 2,584,500, followed closely by Kano with 2,477,112 while the least State was Ebonyi with 467,573 votes.

Fig. 7.1b GOVERNORSHIP ELECTION RESULT BY STATE AND VOTE (2011)

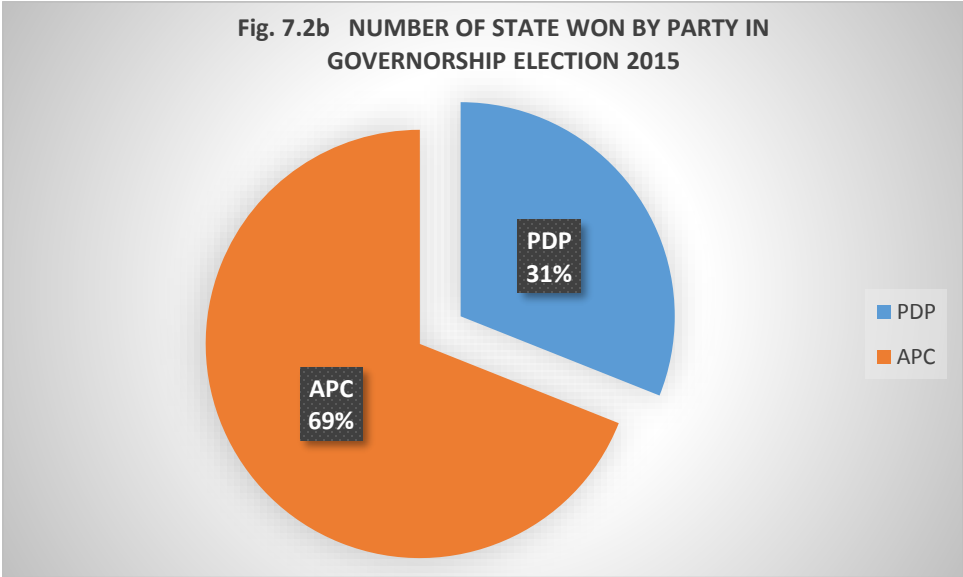


The 2015 presidential election recorded a percentage decrease of 17.8 per cent of the total votes cast over that of 2011. The total votes cast was 29,432,083 out of which 844,519 were rejected and 28,587,564 were valid. The highest votes cast was recorded in Kano State with 2,128,821, followed by Kaduna State with 1,617,482, while the least State was Ekiti with 300,691. APC recorded 15,424,921, PDP 12,853,162 and APA 53,537.

The Governorship general election was conducted in 29 states with APC wining 20 States while PDP won 9 States. Election did not take place in 7 states in 2015.



CHAPTER EIGHT- ENERGY & ENVIRONMENT

Energy and environment are indispensable in achieving sustainable development in a country. Energy serves as the main spring of state development and all the activities, while environment is the sum total of our surroundings including natural forces. The natural environment plays an important role in supporting economic activities. This chapter presents projected data on energy supply up till 2030 and reported disaster on flood and fire.

Fig. 8.1 shows the reported rain/wind storm and flood from 2013 to 2015. This table shows a decrease in the total number of affected persons from 183,590 in 2013 to 43,075 in 2014 accounting for 76.54%. However, in 2015 the reported cases rose to 85,919 compared to 43,075 in 2014. Akwa Ibom had the highest number of affected and reported cases of storm and flood with 59,844 persons affected in 2 occurrences.

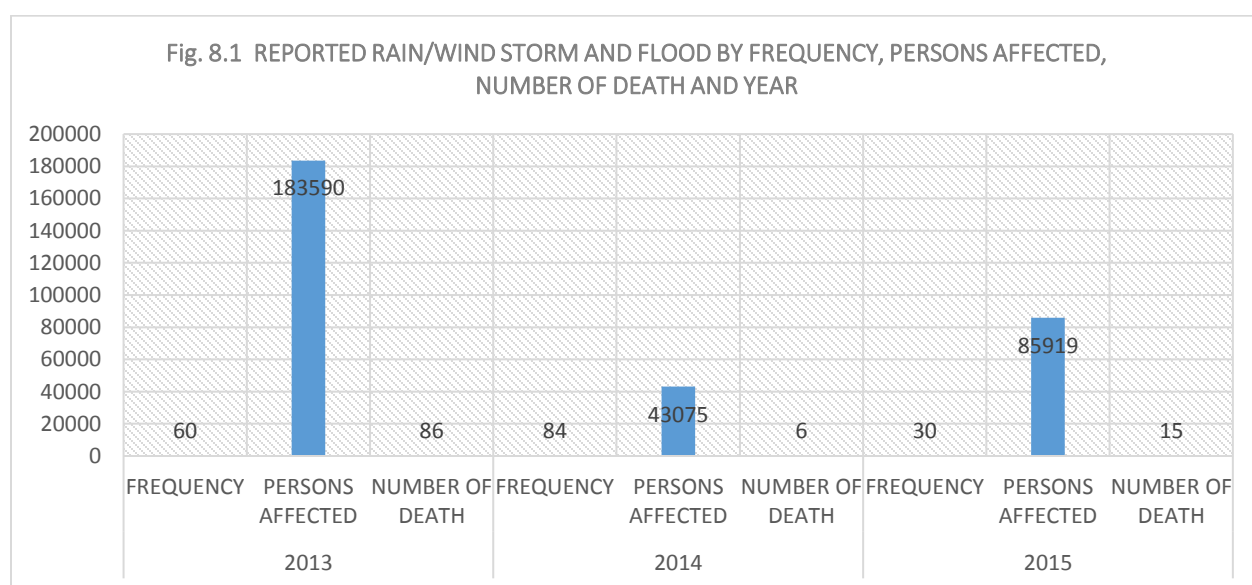


Fig 8.2 shows reported fire disaster by state, frequency, persons affected, number of death and year (2013 - 2015). The highest occurrence of fire disaster was recorded in 2014 while the highest number of persons affected was recorded in the same year.

The reported cases of fire disaster in 2013, shows that Lagos had the highest number of occurrence for the three year period of reference. Ogun State recorded the highest number of affected persons in 2013 while Sokoto State recorded the highest in 2014 and Niger State in 2015. There was no death recorded from fire disaster in 2013 while 14 deaths were recorded in 2014 and 167 in 2015.

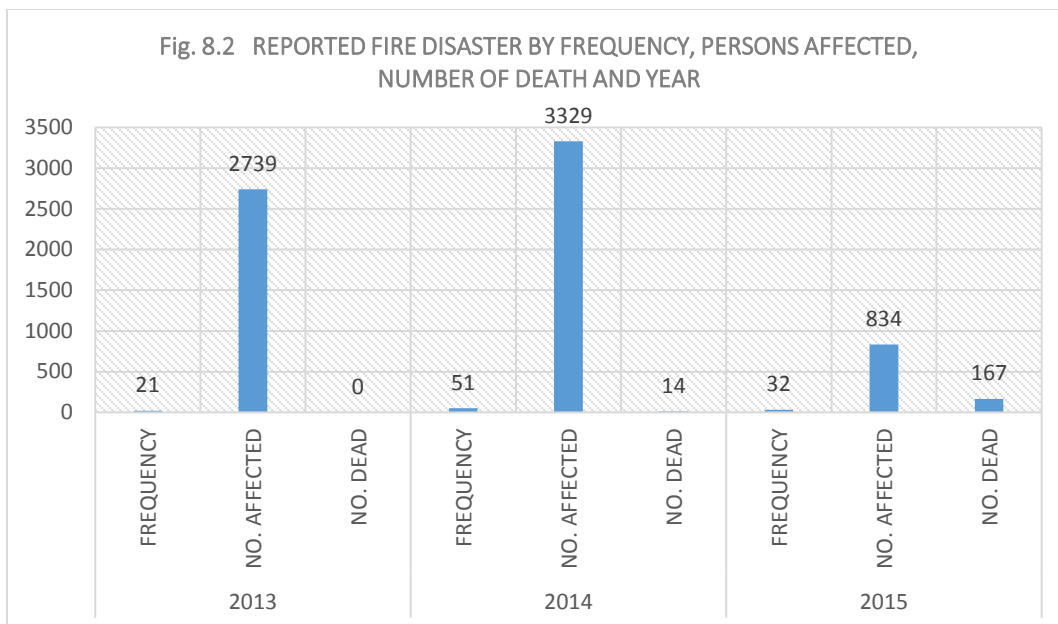
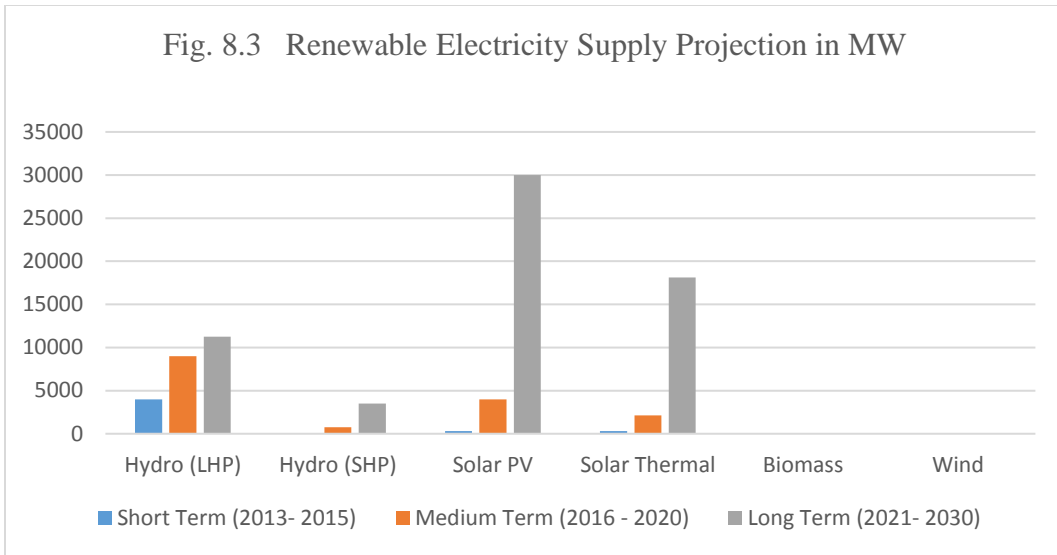


Table 8.3 shows that short term projection for all renewable electricity supply in the country was 4,628MW, medium term 15,966MW and long term 63,032MW. Amongst the energy resources, Hydro (LHP) has the highest with 40,000MW while Biomass was the least with 5MW. Hydro (LHP) was still the highest in medium term while Solar PV was the highest in long term projection.

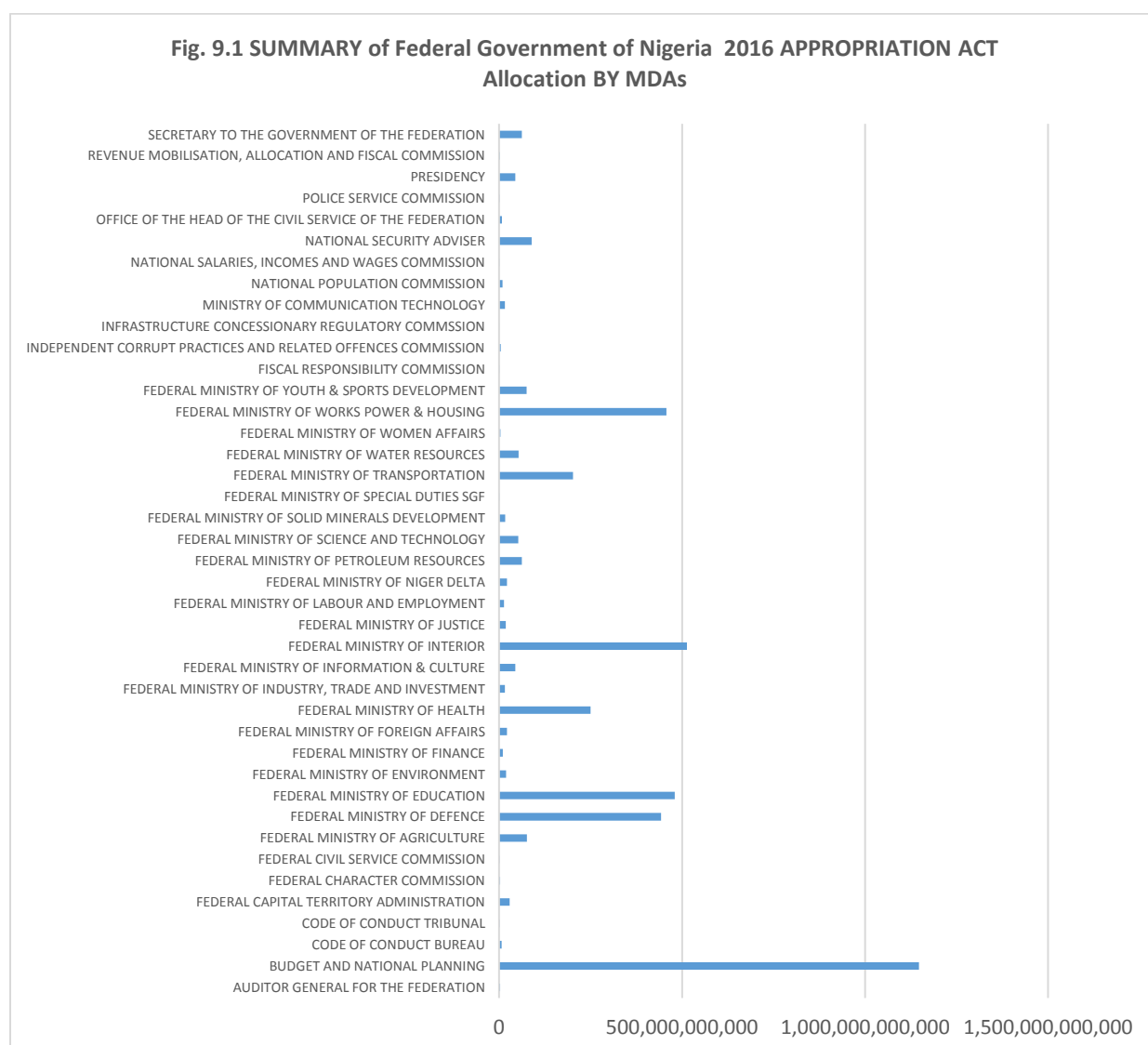
Fig. 8.3 Renewable Electricity Supply Projection in MW



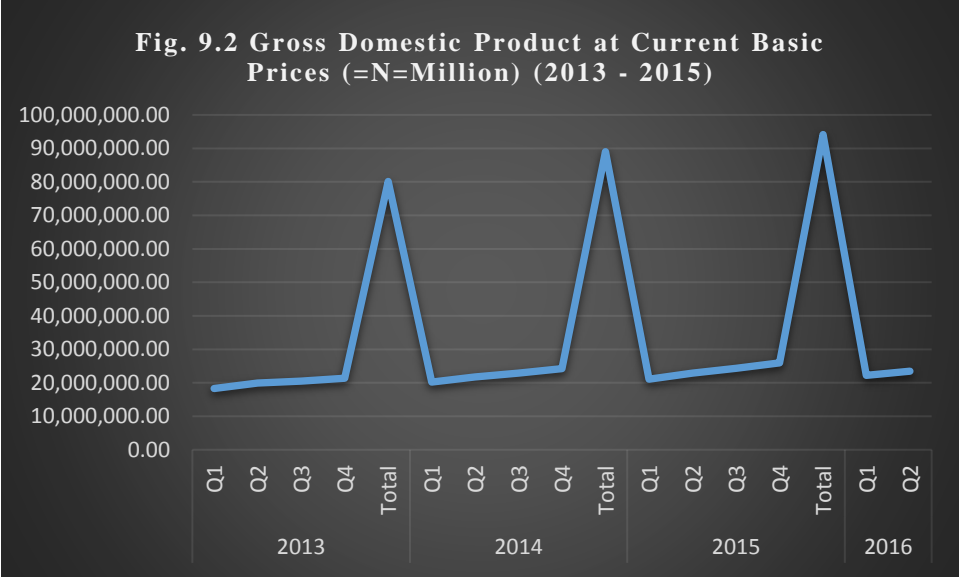
CHAPTER NINE - PUBLIC FINANCE

Public finance deals with government expenditure and revenue generation in the economy. In other words, it is an aspect of economics which assesses the fiscal operation of public authorities and how it is adjusted to achieve desirable macroeconomic targets. Government uses the annual budget to set up expenditure and revenue targets to realise its policy objectives of achieving efficient allocation of resources, equitable distribution of income and macroeconomic stability.

Fig 9.1 summarizes the 2016 Appropriation Act of Federal government of Nigeria by MDAs. The Federal Ministry of Budget and National Planning had the highest allocation with ₦1,147,267,926,465, followed by Federal Ministry of Interior with ₦513,655,831,565. The Federal Ministry of Special Duties (SGF) had the least allocation with ₦65,604,713.



Nigerian Gross Domestic Product at Current Basic Prices, (2013 -2015) is presented in table 9.2 in the appendix. The table shows a continuous rise in GDP under the period of review from 80,092,563.38 in 2013 to 89,043,615.26 in 2014 and 94,144,960.45 in 2015.



CHAPTER TEN -HEALTH

Health is the state of functional and metabolic efficiency of a living organism. In humans it is the ability of individuals or communities to adapt and self-manage when facing physical, mental or social challenges. The role of health in national development cannot be overemphasised. It is one of the indices that determine production capacity of the country's labour force which in turn leads to the growth and development of the economy. The social determinants of health (SDOH) are socio-economic conditions and their distribution among the population which influence individual and group differences in health status. The main sources of data for this chapter are Federal Ministry of Health, National Agency for Food and Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC), National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS), National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA), Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria, Spectrum/EPP, National Agency for the Control of AIDS/HIV (NACA).

The chart outlines various health manpower situation in Nigeria by human resources for a three-year period 2013 to 2015.

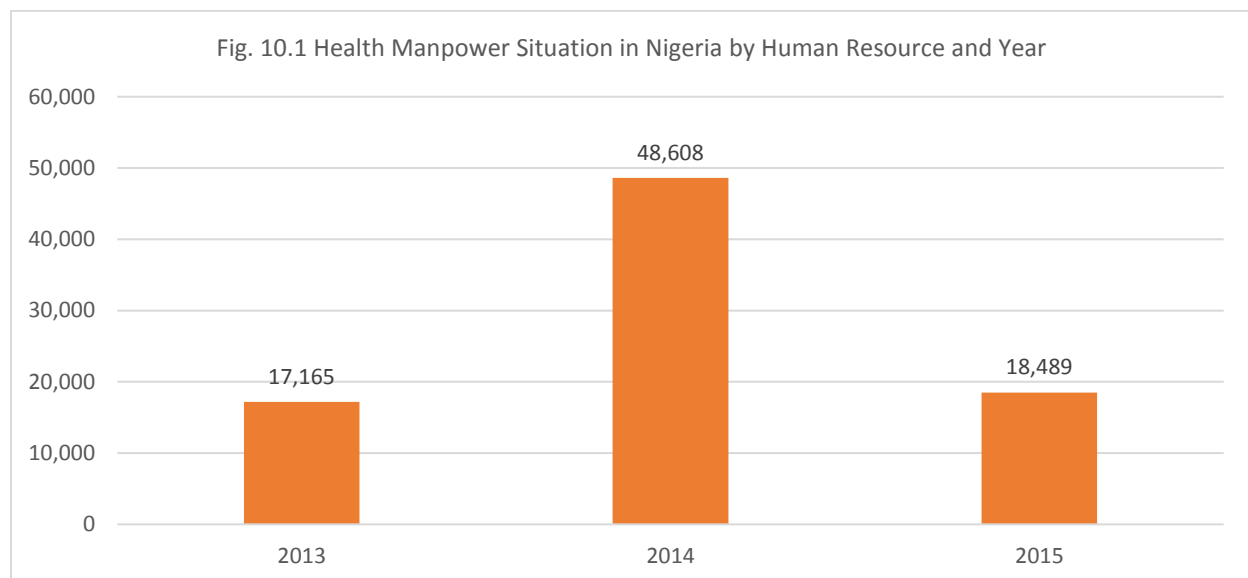


Fig. 10.2 shows that the Medical laboratory technologist had the highest enrolment in 2013 with 4,502 while record officer's professional had the highest in both 2014 and 2015 with 3,838 and 4,798 respectively.

Fig. 10.2 ANNUAL STUDENT ENROLMENT INTO PROFESSIONAL HEALTH PROGRAMMES

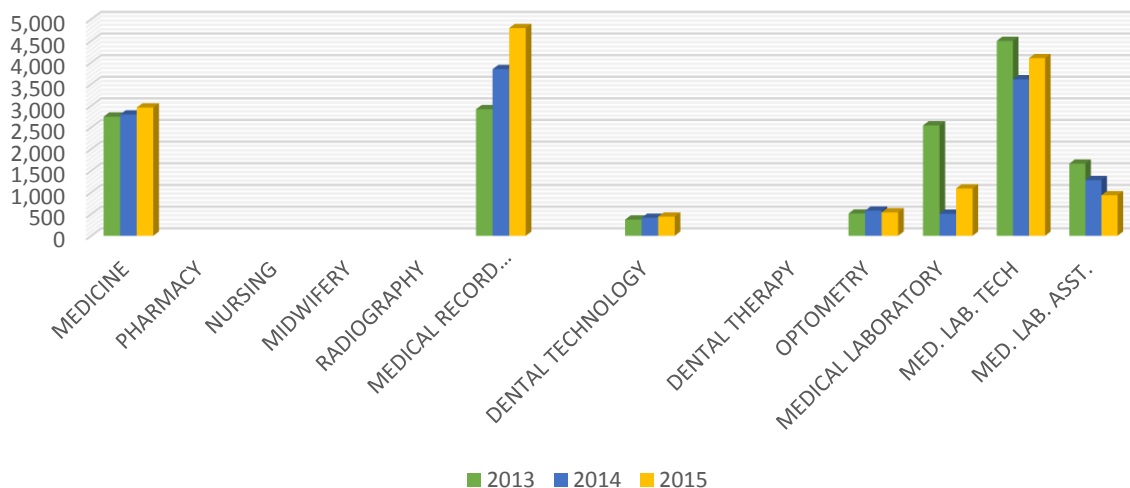


Fig. 10.3 shows the projected HIV population by State for 2013 and 2014. There was a decrease from 3,090,450 in 2013 to 3,070,174 in 2014 (0.66%). Kaduna had the highest with 344,445 followed by Akwa Ibom with 245,489 while Zamfara had the least with 18,681 in 2014.

Fig. 10.3 PROJECTED HIV POPULATION BY STATE AND YEAR

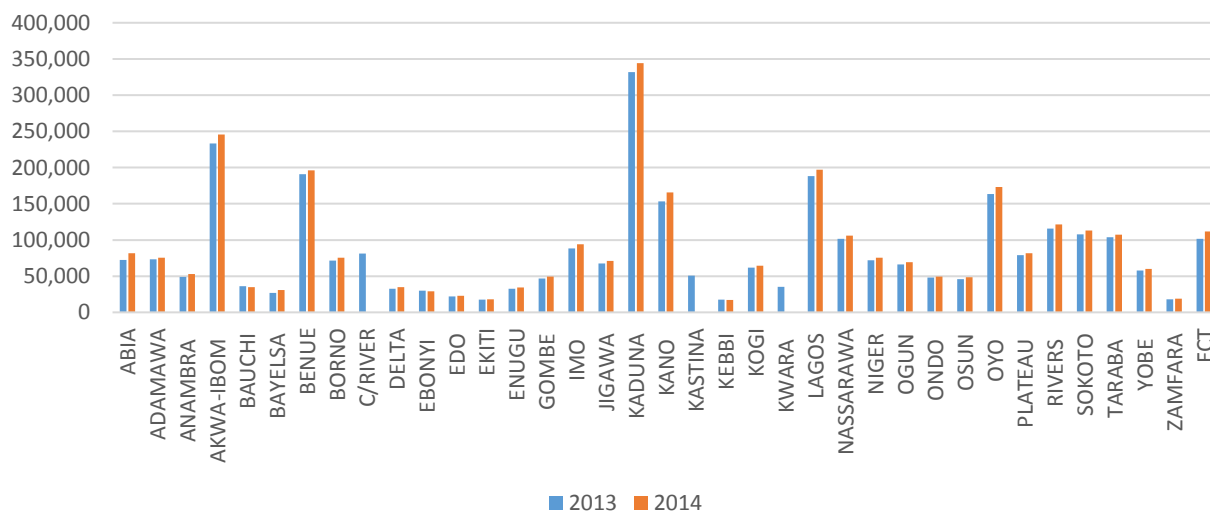
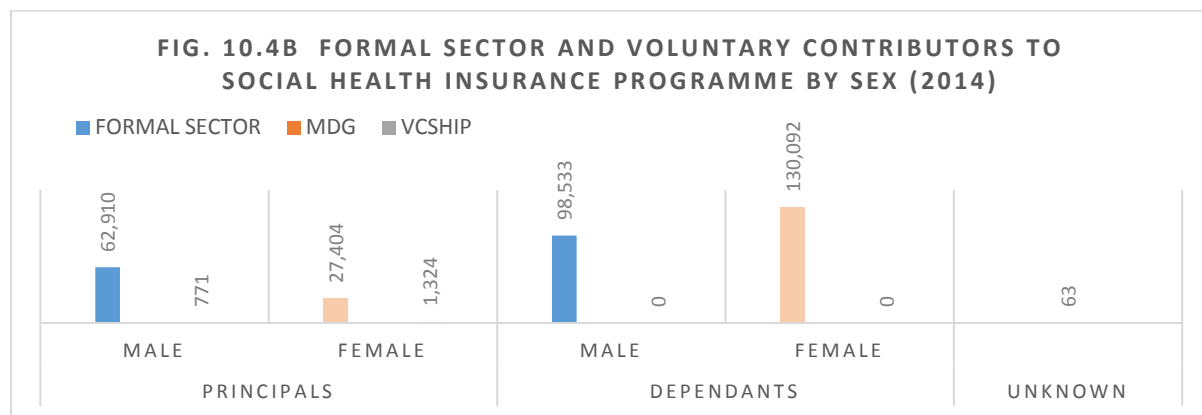
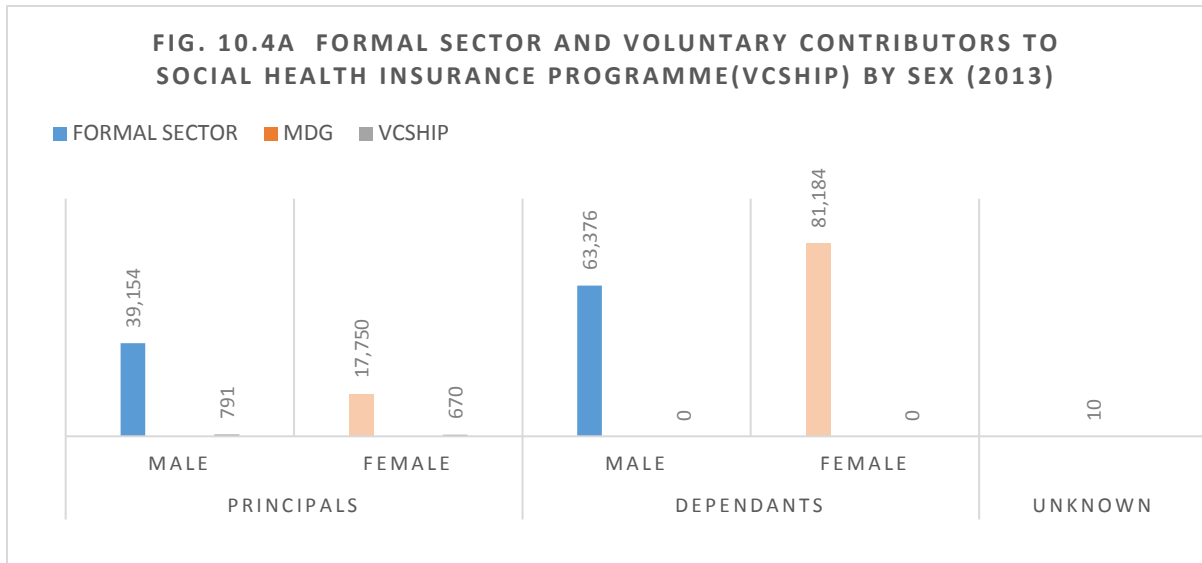


Fig. 10.4(a-c) show registered contributors to the national health insurance scheme by sex 2013 to 2015. The total number of people registered for the scheme fluctuated in the period of under review. The number of contributors in 2013 was 202,925, it increased in 2014 to 321,249 (58.30%) and later dropped to 296,258 in 2015 (7.78%).



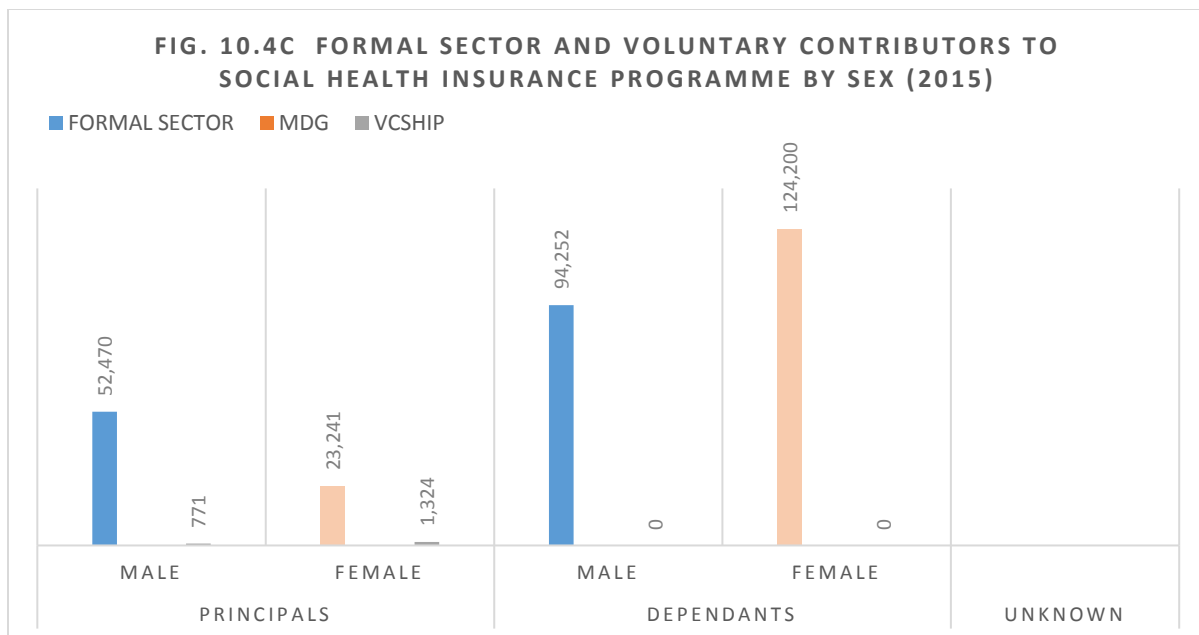


Fig 10.5 shows that the total number of application received in 2013 was 23,399, it increased to 25,871(10.56%) in 2014 and later decreased to 22,066 (14.7%) in 2015. Lagos had the highest number of doctors in the years under review with 4,865 in 2013, then 5,790 in 2014 and 4,671 in 2015.

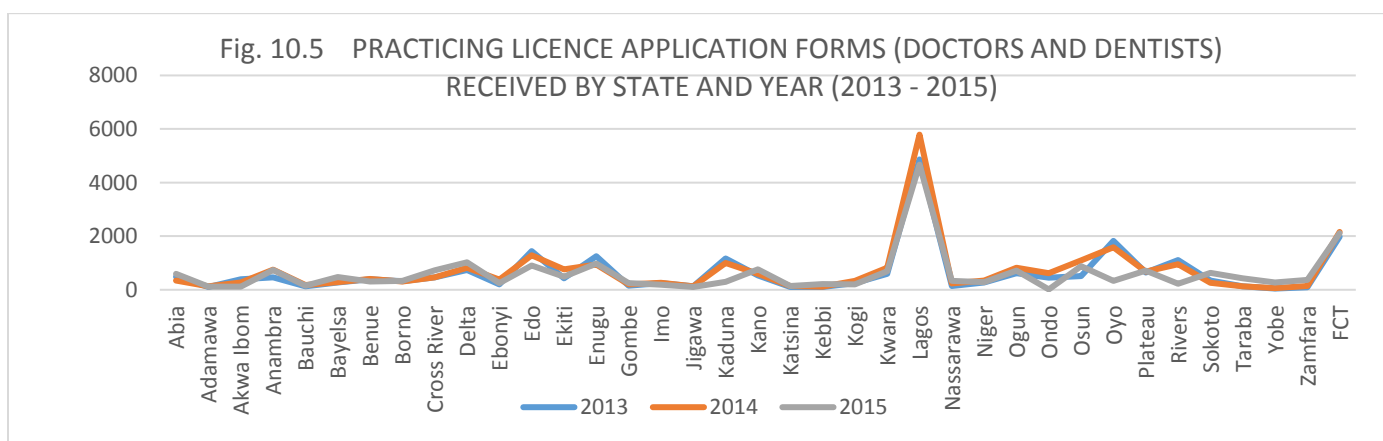


Fig. 10.6 shows a decline in the number of tuberculosis cases detected over the years under review. 2013 had the highest with 100,401 cases, it decreased to 91,354 (9.01%) in 2014 and further decreased in 2015 to 90,315 (1.13%). The new smear positive cases detected in 2013 dropped from 91,997 to 53,923 in 2014 and rose to 57,277 in 2015. However, the treatment success rate remained 87% through out all the years.

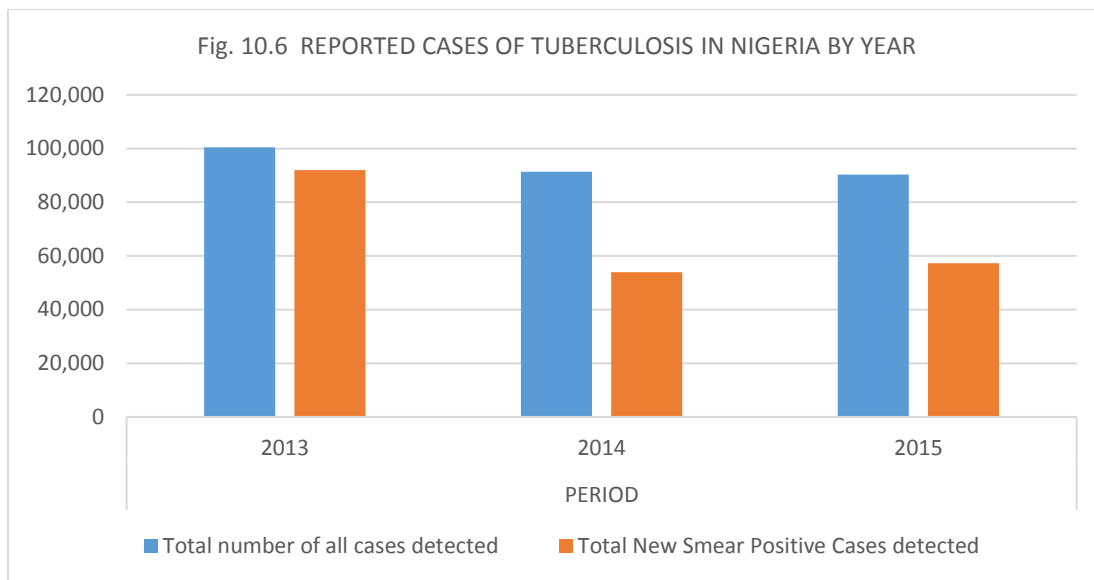
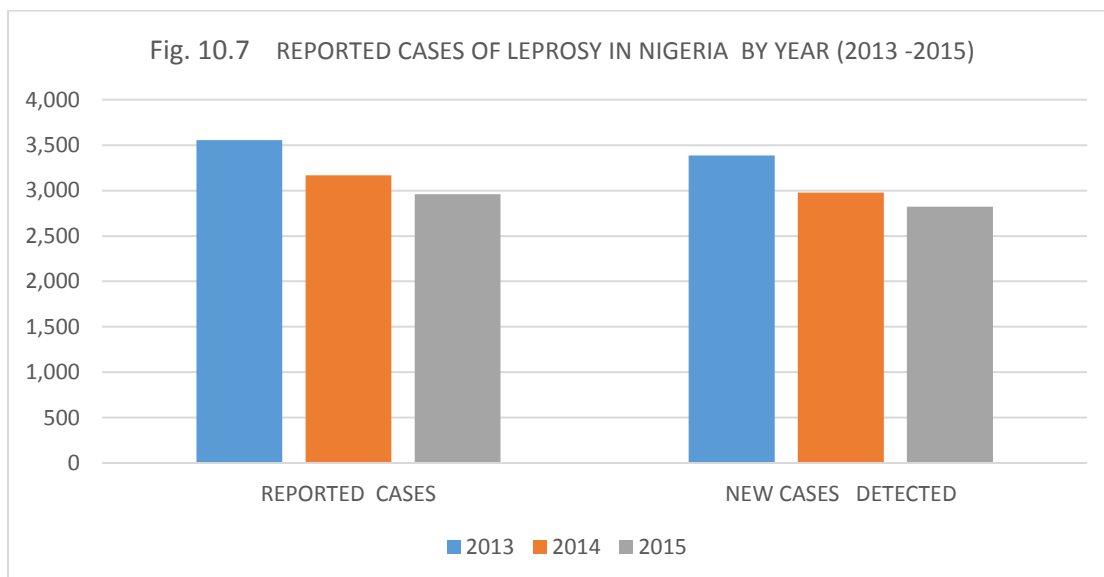


Fig. 10.7 shows a downward trend of reported and new leprosy cases in the years under review. Reported cases in 2013 were 3,556, it decreased to 3,166 in 2014 and 2,960 in 2015. New reported cases were 3,385 in 2013, and then declined to 2,978 and 2,822 in 2014 and 2015 respectively. However, the prevalence rate was 0.2/10,000 population, percentage of children affected (9%) and disabled (13%) remained the same in the years under review.



Nationally, all antigen coverage for 2013 had BCG and Polio 1 recording the highest with 95 percent while Hep-B-O recorded the least with 45 percent. In 2014, OPV-1 recorded the highest with 107 percent while TT-5 recorded the least with 2 percent. In 2015, Antigen coverage had, OPV-1 recording the highest with 111 percent while TT-5 recorded the least with 2 percent.

Fig. 10.8a DISTRIBUTION OF ANTIGEN COVERAGE (2013)

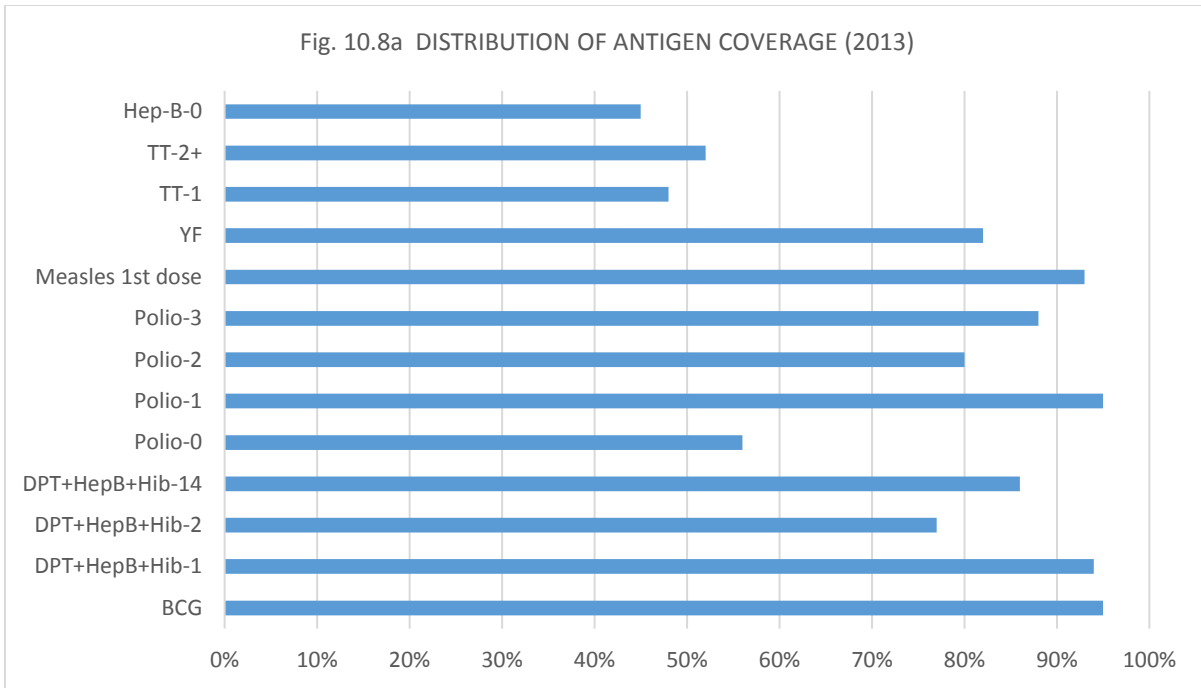


Fig. 10.8b DISTRIBUTION OF ANTIGEN COVERAGE (2014)

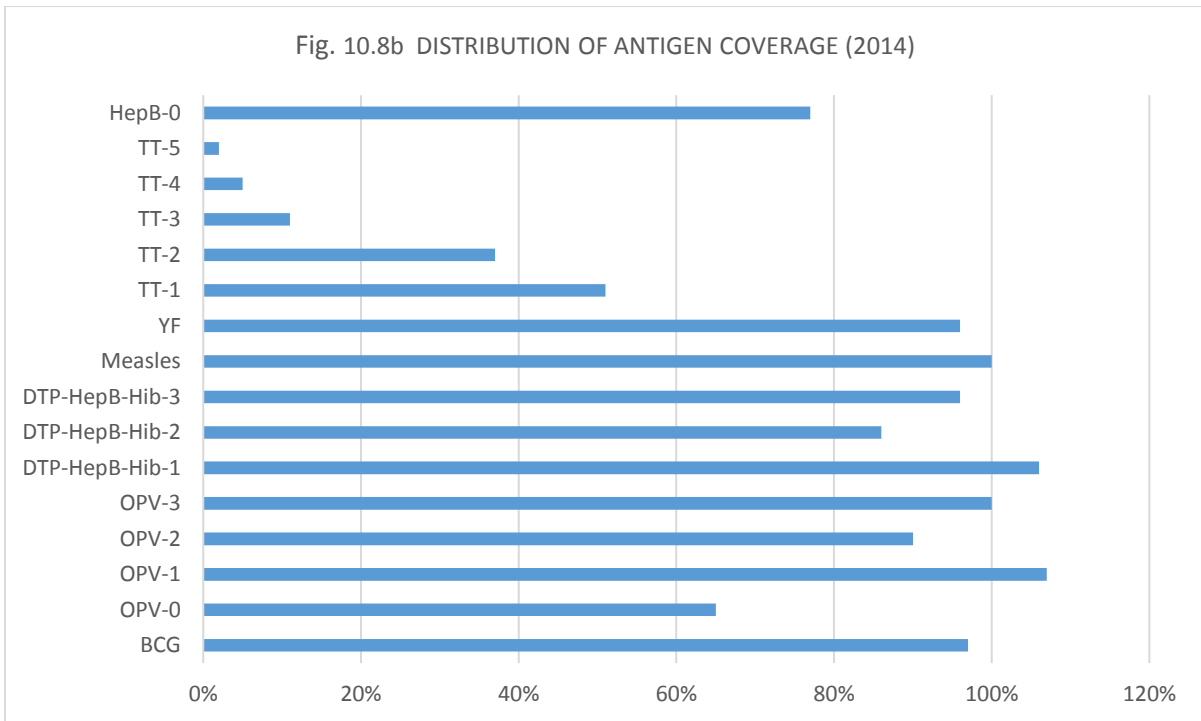


Table 10.8c DISTRIBUTION OF ANTIGEN COVERAGE (2015)

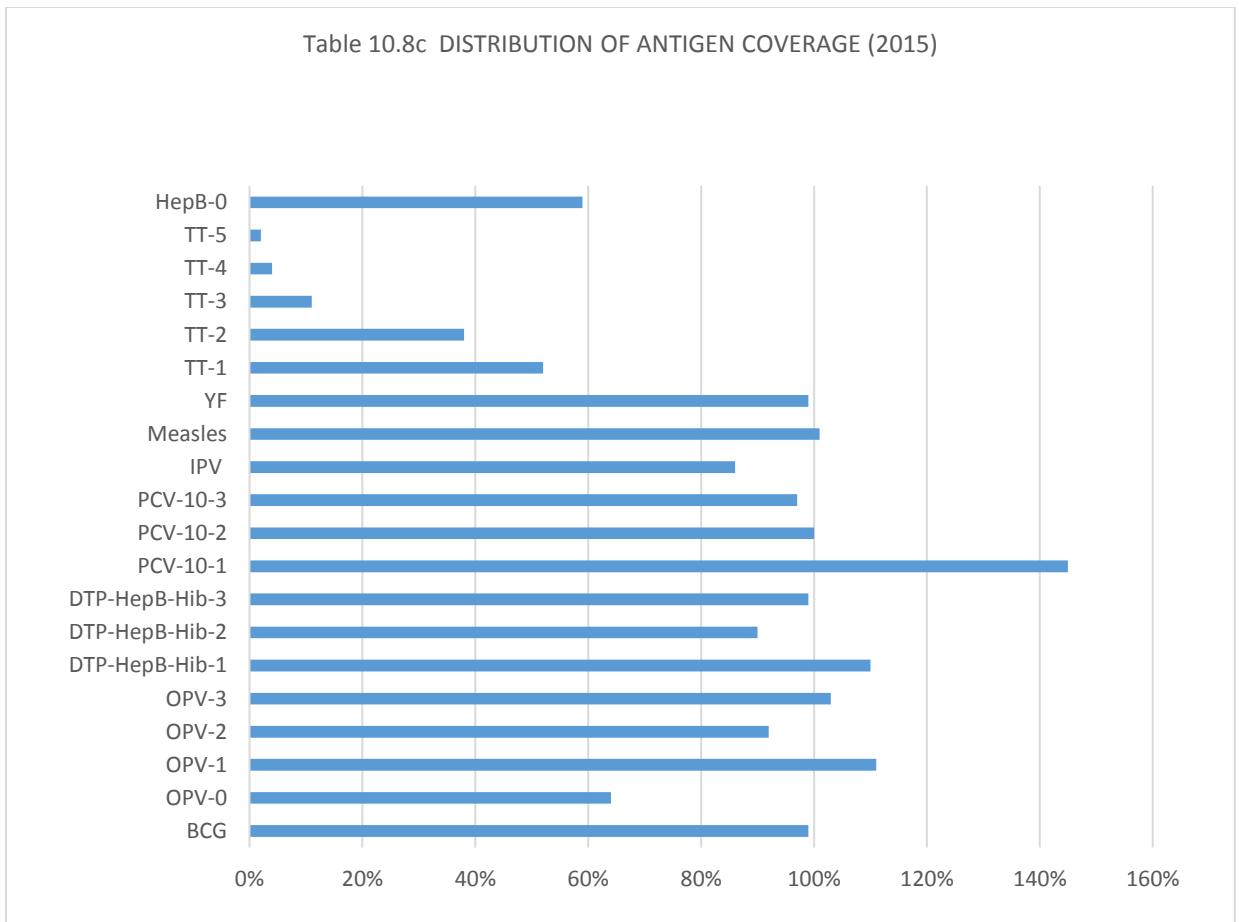
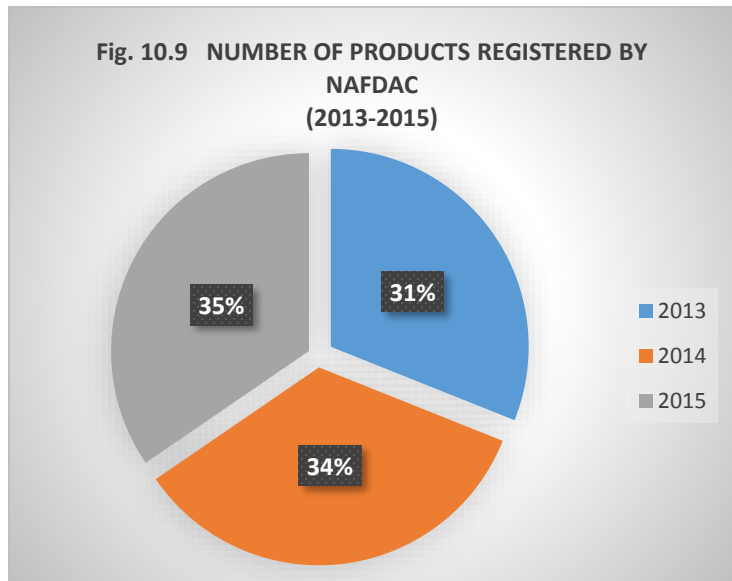


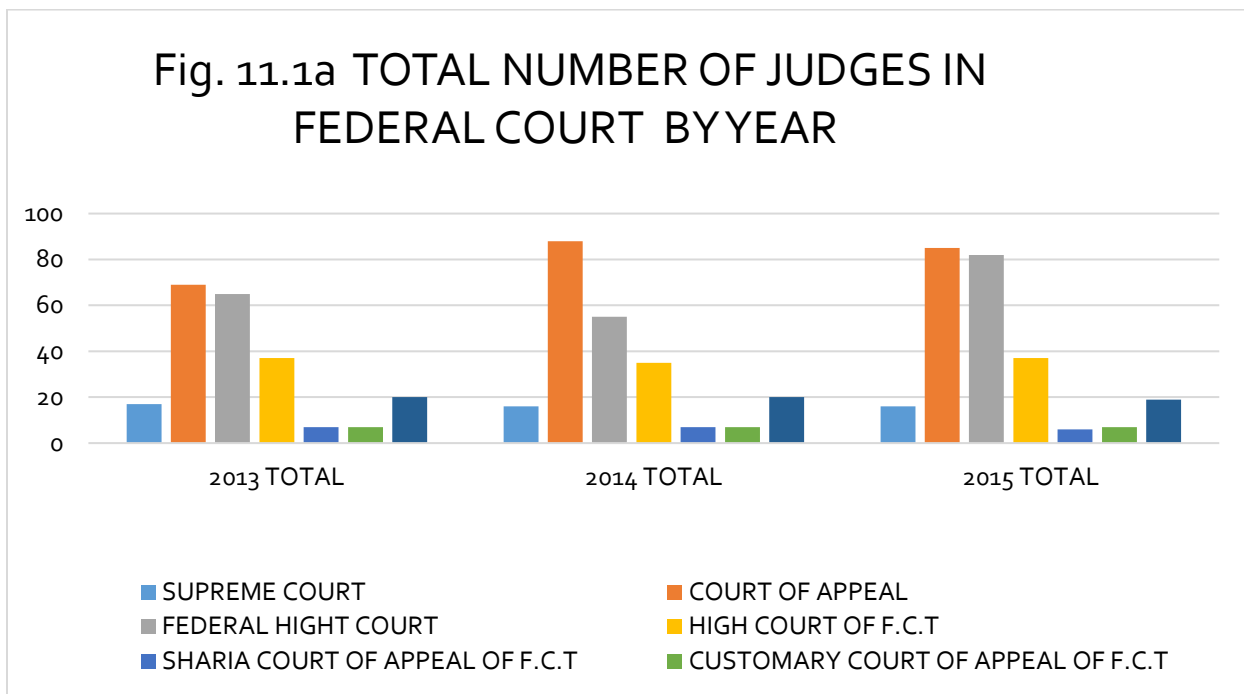
Fig. 10.9 shows consistent increase in the number of registered products, from 10,559 in 2013 to 11,693 in 2014 and then 11,750 in 2015. However, packaged water had the highest number of registration with 3,560 in 2015.



CHAPTER ELEVEN - JUDICIARY

The judiciary also known as the judicial system or court system is the system of courts that interprets and applies the law in the name of the state. The judiciary also provides a mechanism for the resolution of disputes. In Nigeria, the federal judicial power is exercised by the federal and State courts which adjudicates in disputes arising between individuals, government and corporate entities in their inter-relationship with one another within or outside the country in accordance with the law. This chapter shows data on the Courts and Prisons which constitute parts of the Nigerian criminal justice system.

In 2013 court of appeal had the highest number of judges with 69 while sharia court of appeal and customary court of appeal both of F.C.T had the least with 7 judges each. In 2014, court of appeal had the highest with 88 judges while both sharia court of appeal and customary court of appeal in F.C.T recorded the least with 7 judges each. In 2015, court of appeal had the highest with 85 judges while sharia court of appeal of F.C.T had the least with 6 judges.



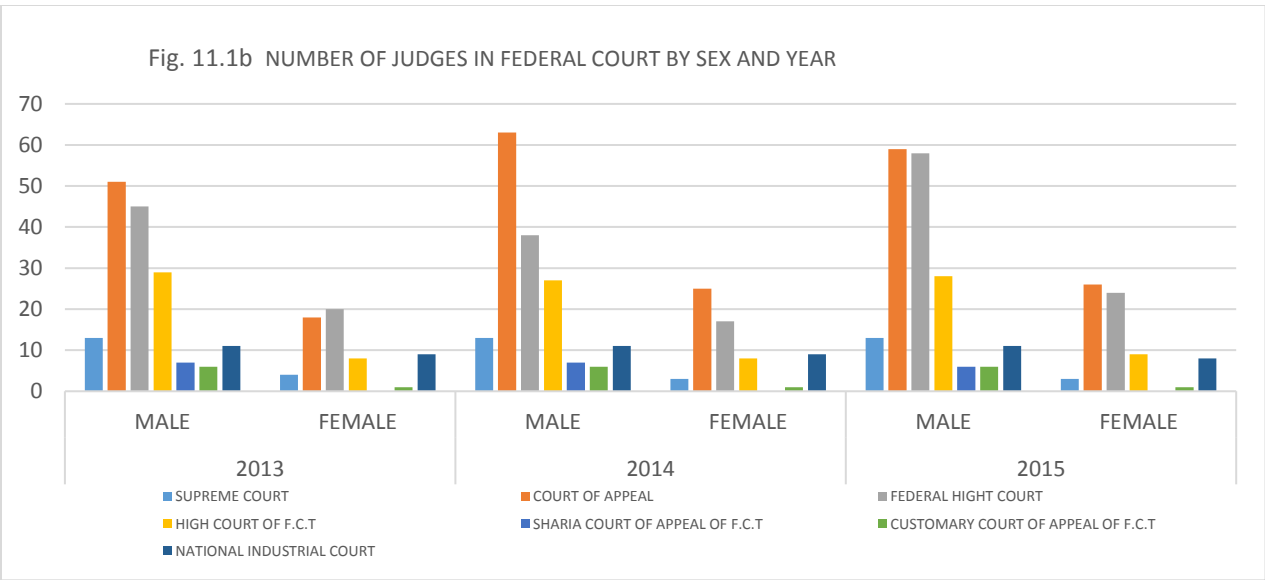


Fig 11.2 shows that the total number of judges in the state high court was 617 in 2013 with 425 males and 192 females. This figure dropped to 598 in 2014 with male having a decrease from 425 to 408 and female from 192 to 190. In 2015, the figure increased to 624 with 419 males and 205 females. It can be observed that Lagos state had the highest number of judges in 2015 with 56 followed by Delta state with 31, Zamfara state had the least among the states with 6 judges in 2015. In summary, there were more male judges in the state high court than the female within the period of reference.

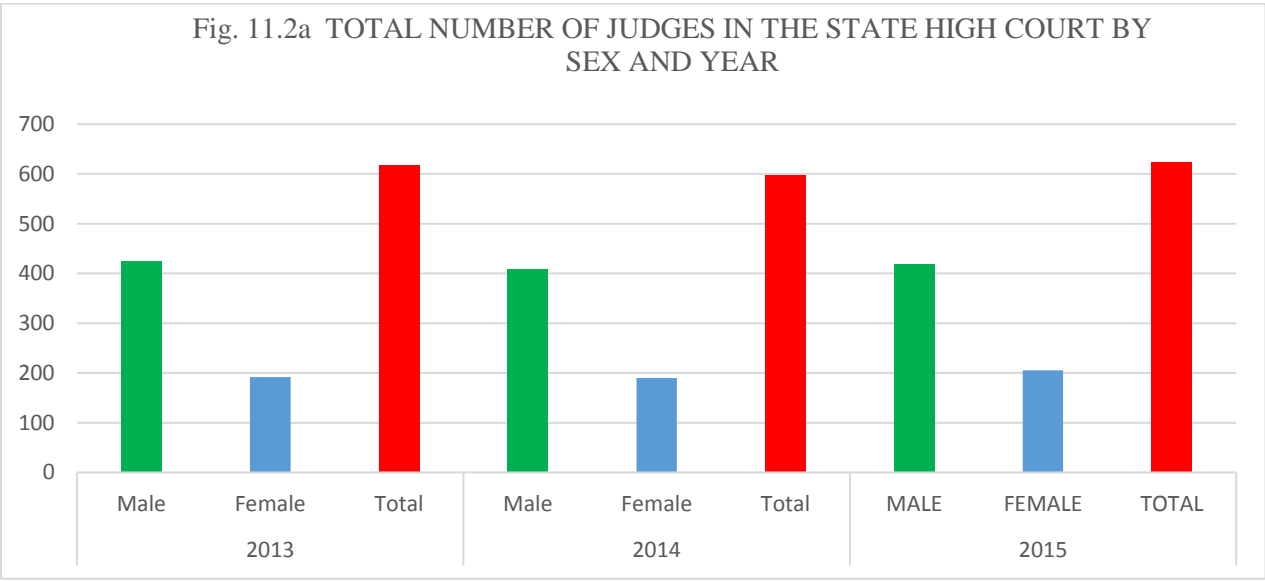


Fig. 11.2b TOTAL NUMBER OF JUDGES IN THE STATE HIGH COURT BY STATE AND YEAR

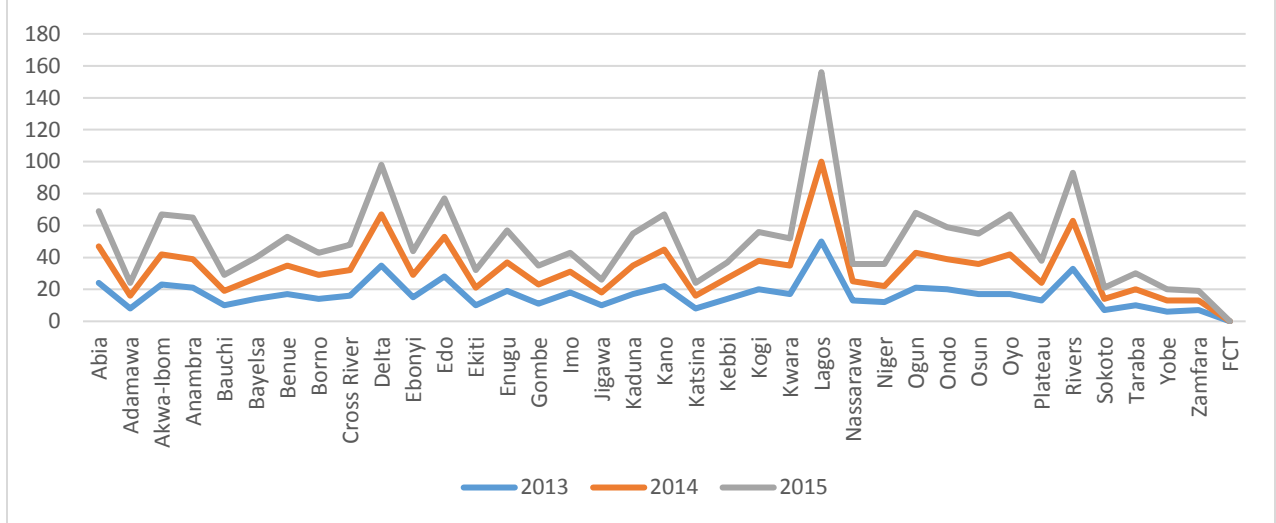
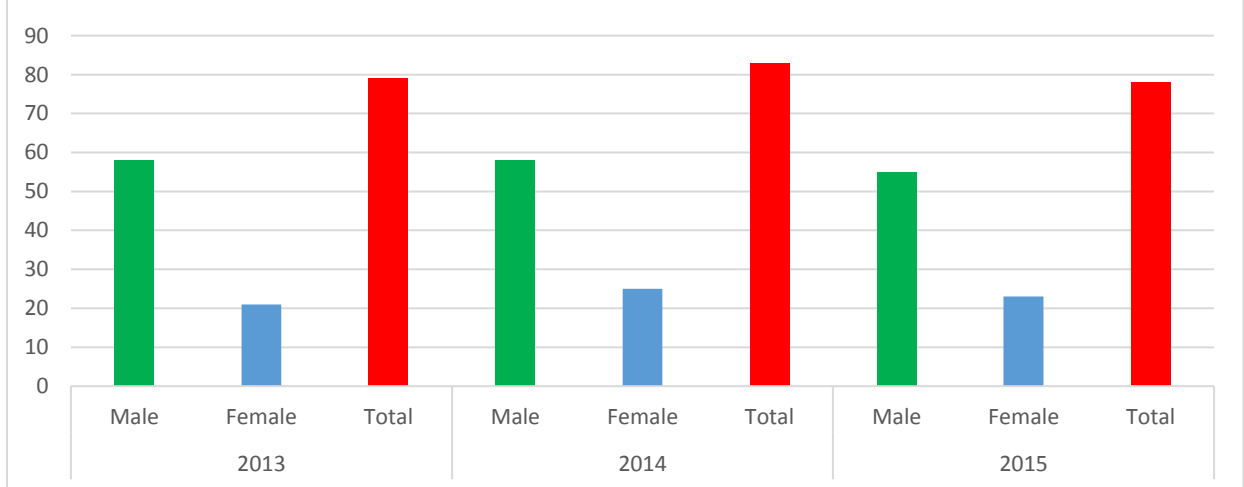


Fig 11.3a shows that the number of judges in state customary court of appeal increased from 79 in 2013 to 83 in 2014 but decreased to 78 in 2015. Delta state had the highest number of judges with 7 while Nasarawa and Rivers states had the least with 3 judges each in 2015. There were more male judges than female in the three years of reporting.

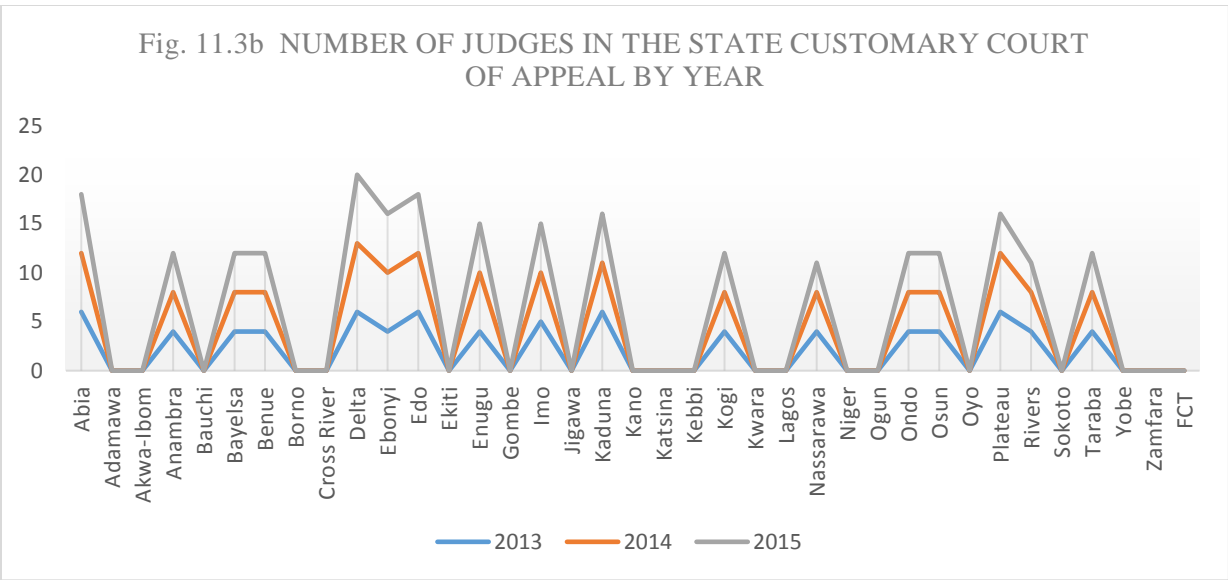

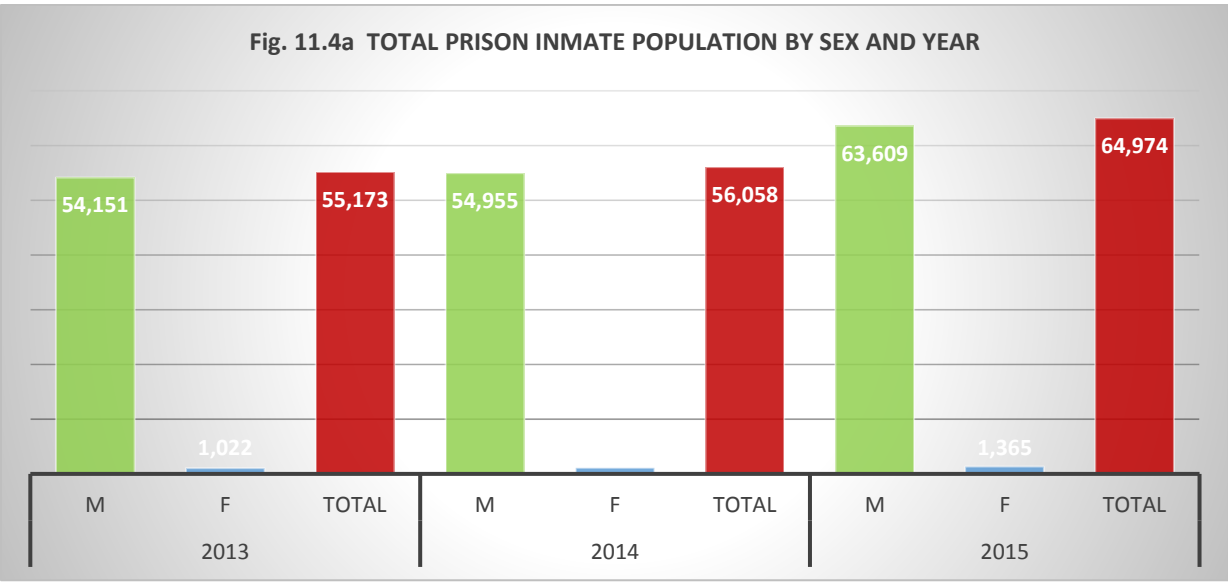


Fig. 11.4b PRISON INMATE POPULATION BY STATE AND YEAR

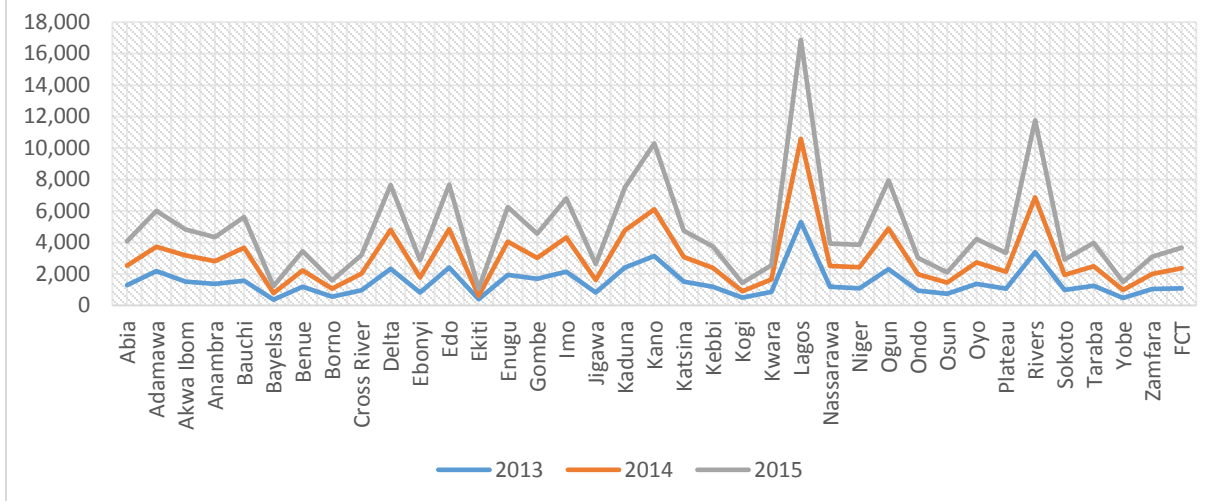
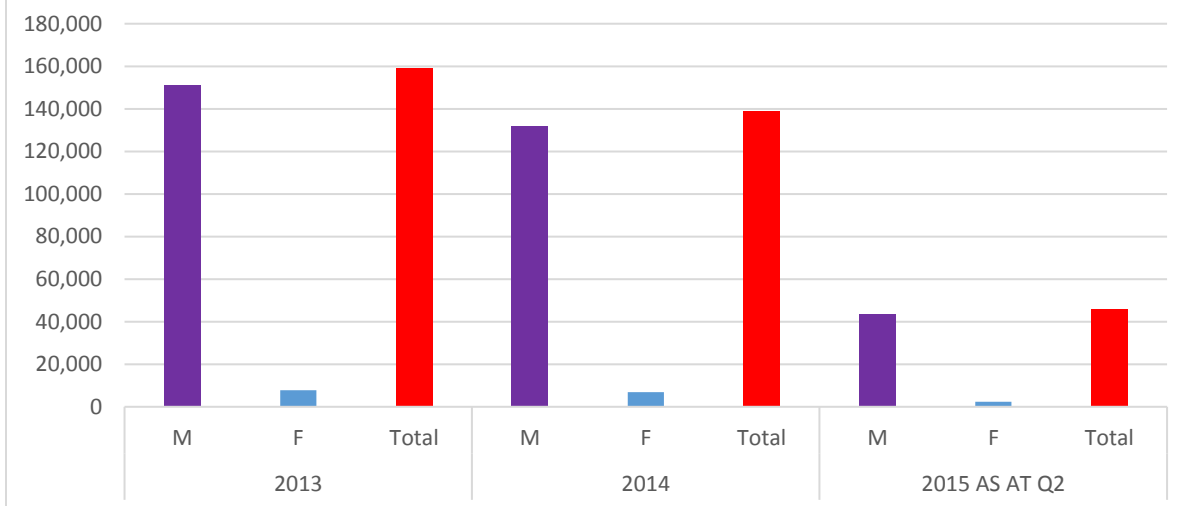

Fig. 11.5a TOTAL PRISON ADMISSION BY SEX AND YEAR



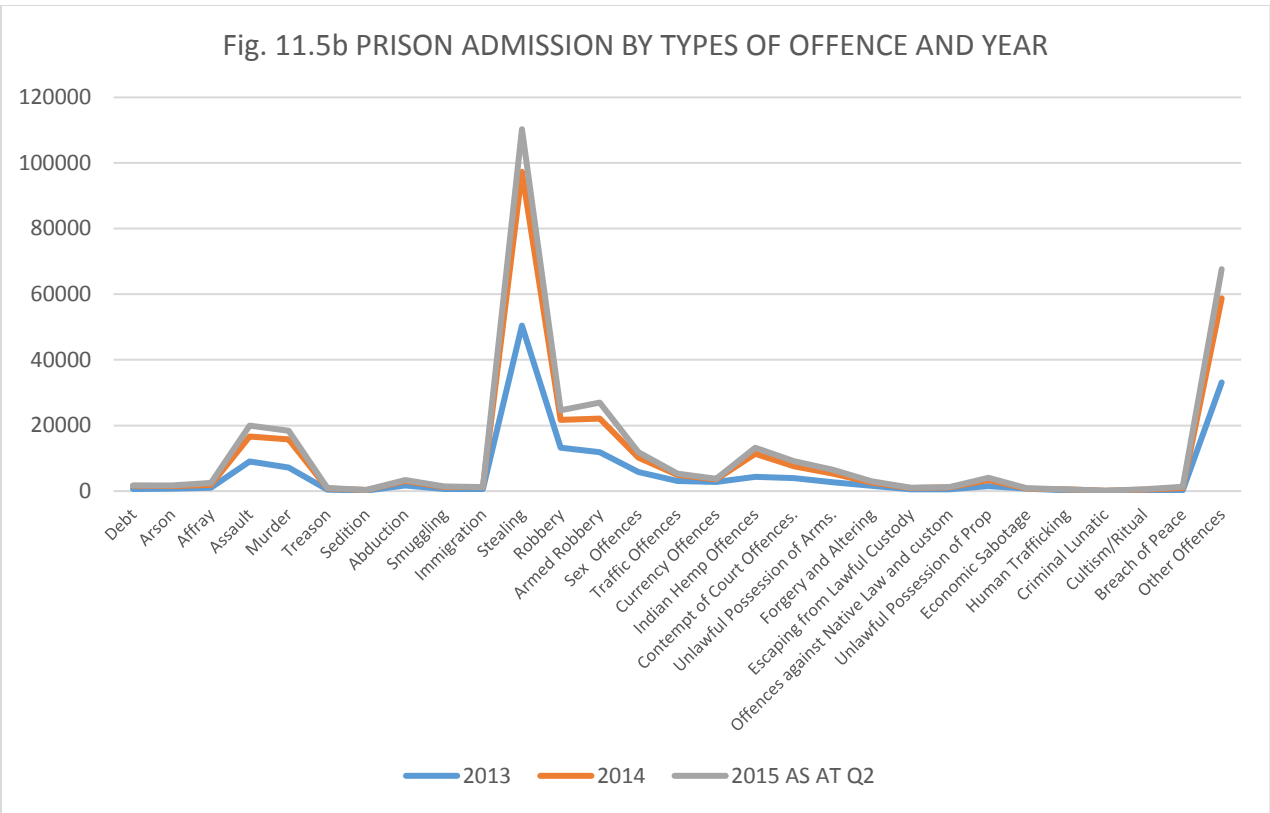
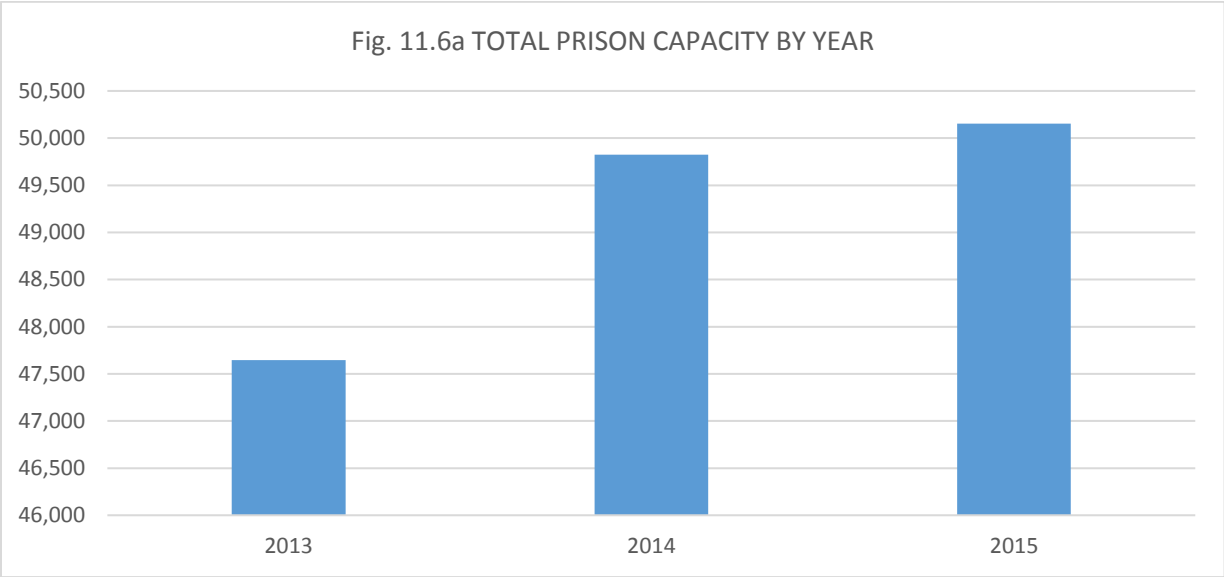

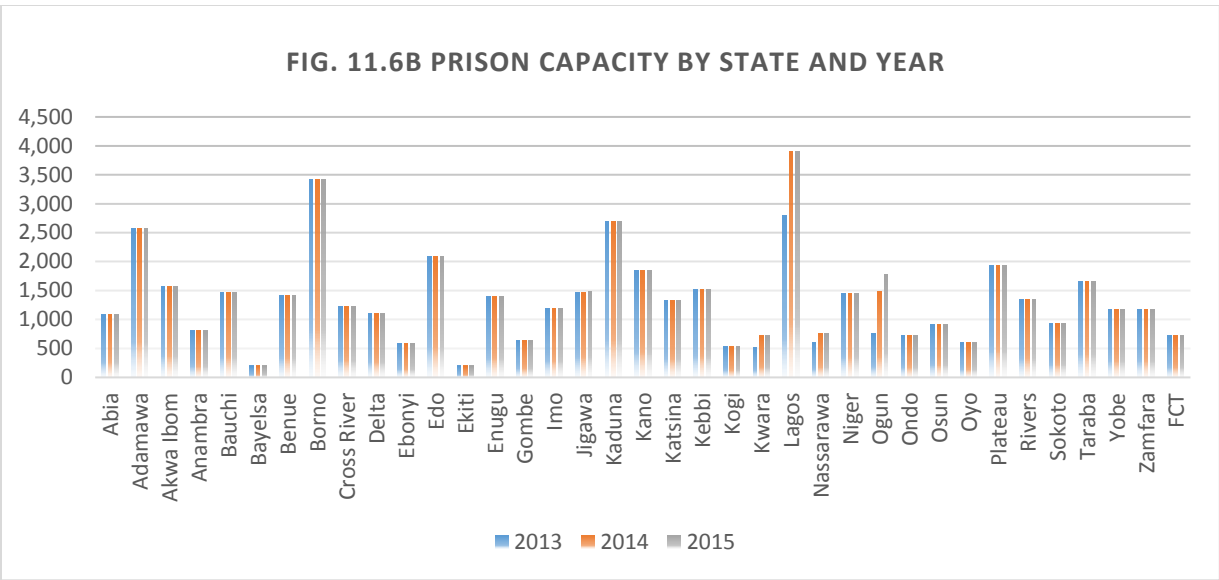
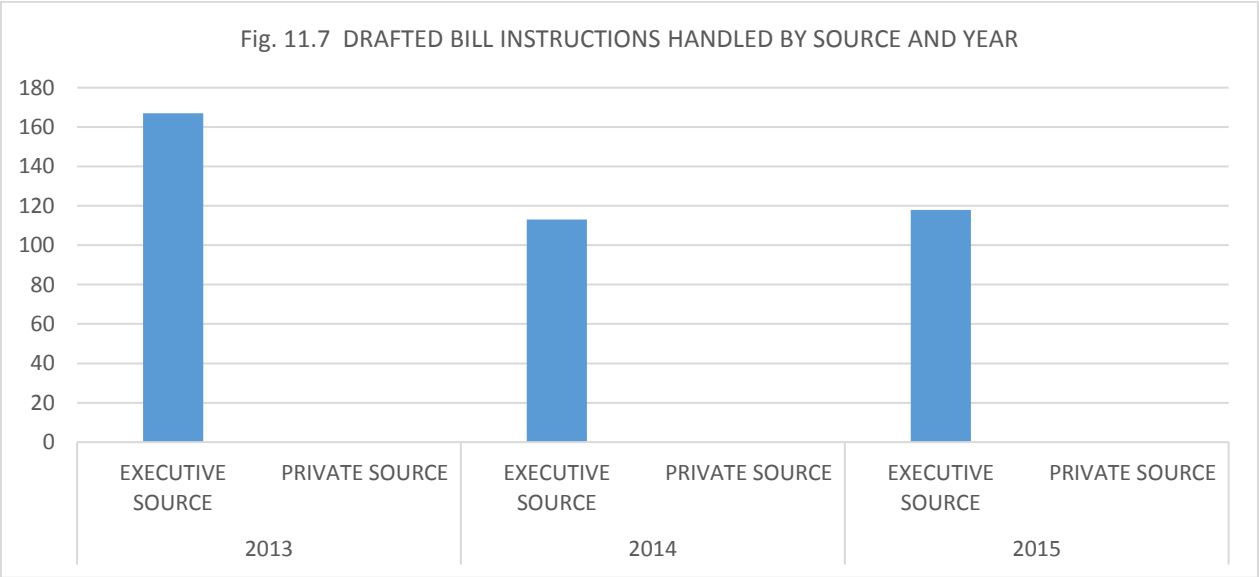

Fig. 11.8 NUMBER OF PETITIONS RECEIVED BY NATURE OF PETITION

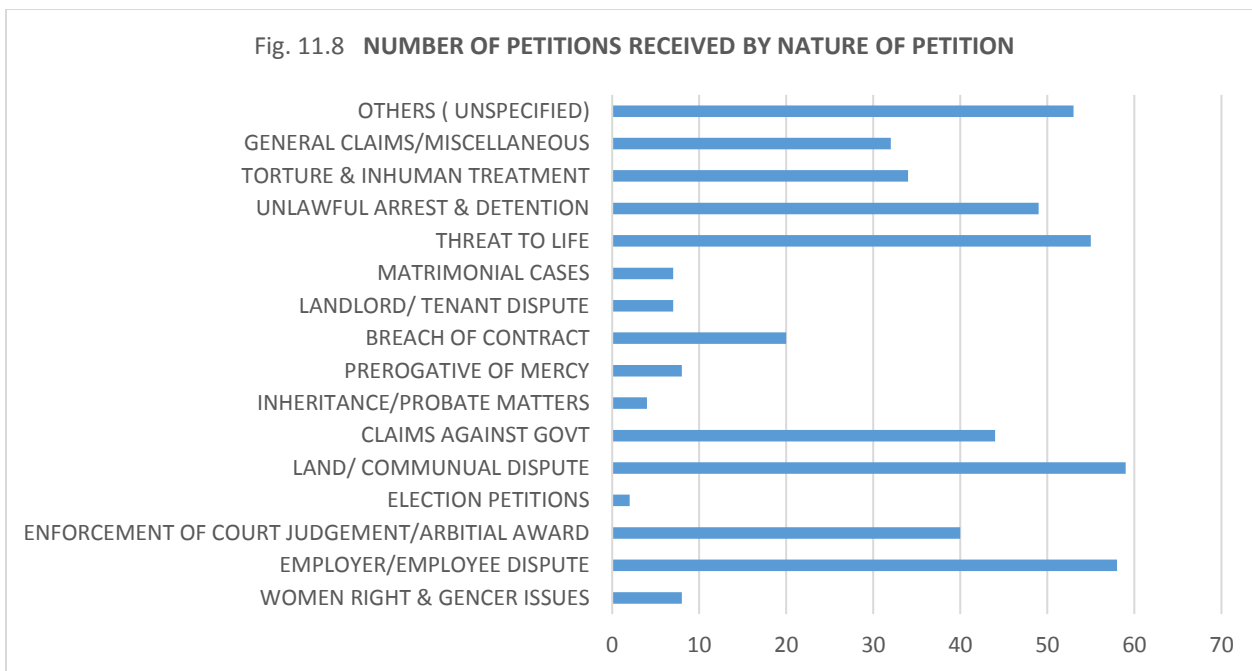

Fig. 11.9 NUMBER OF CRIMINAL CASES BY NATURE , STAGE AND YEAR

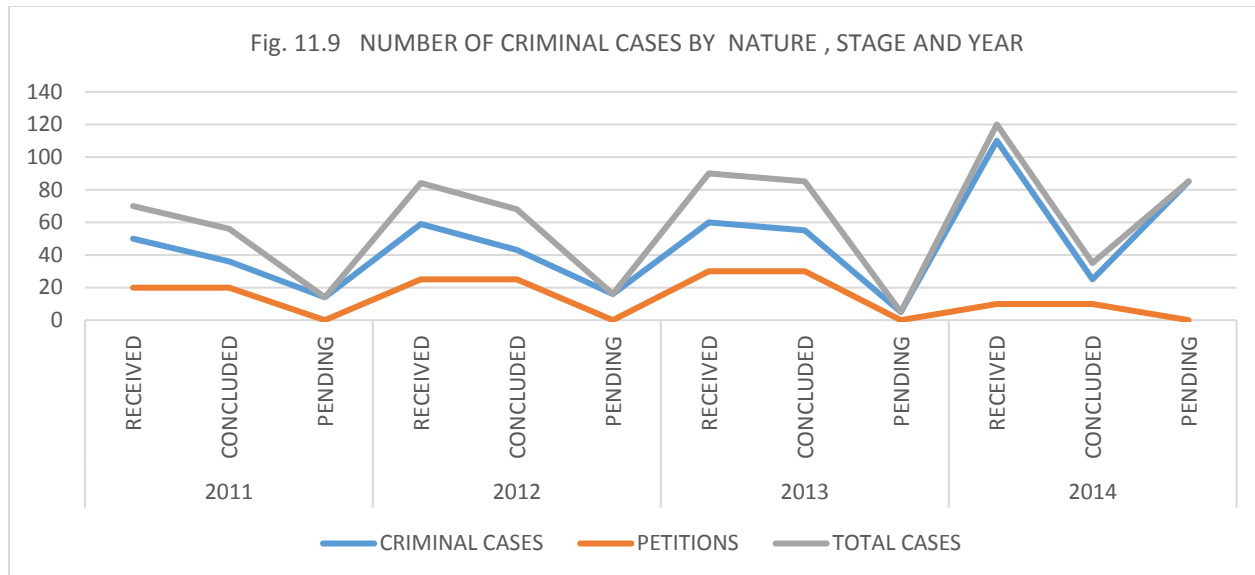

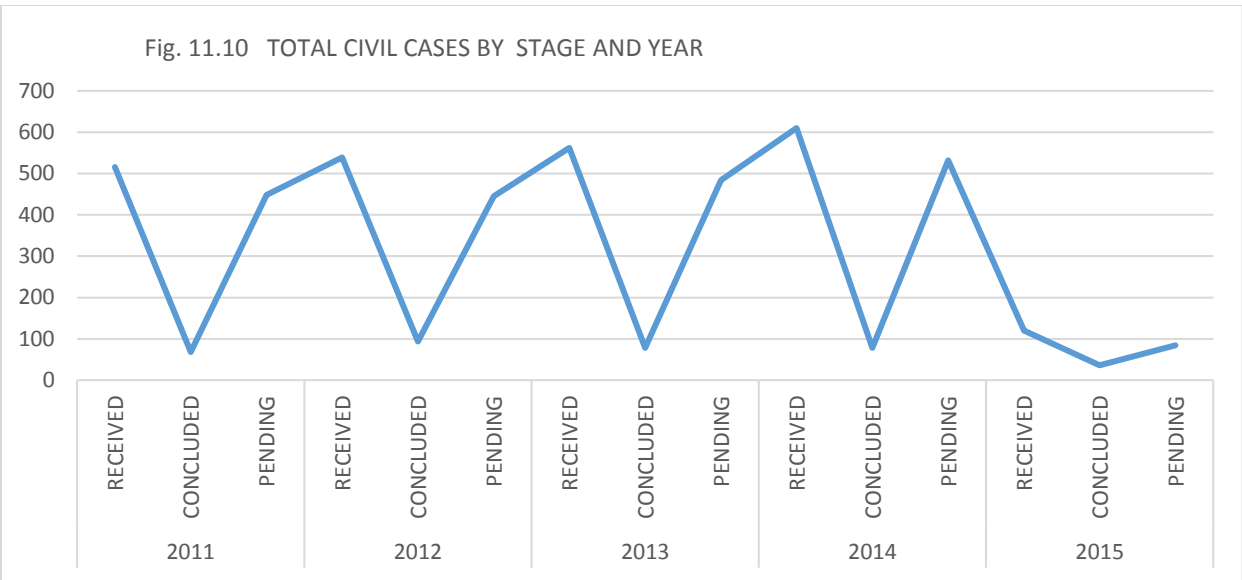
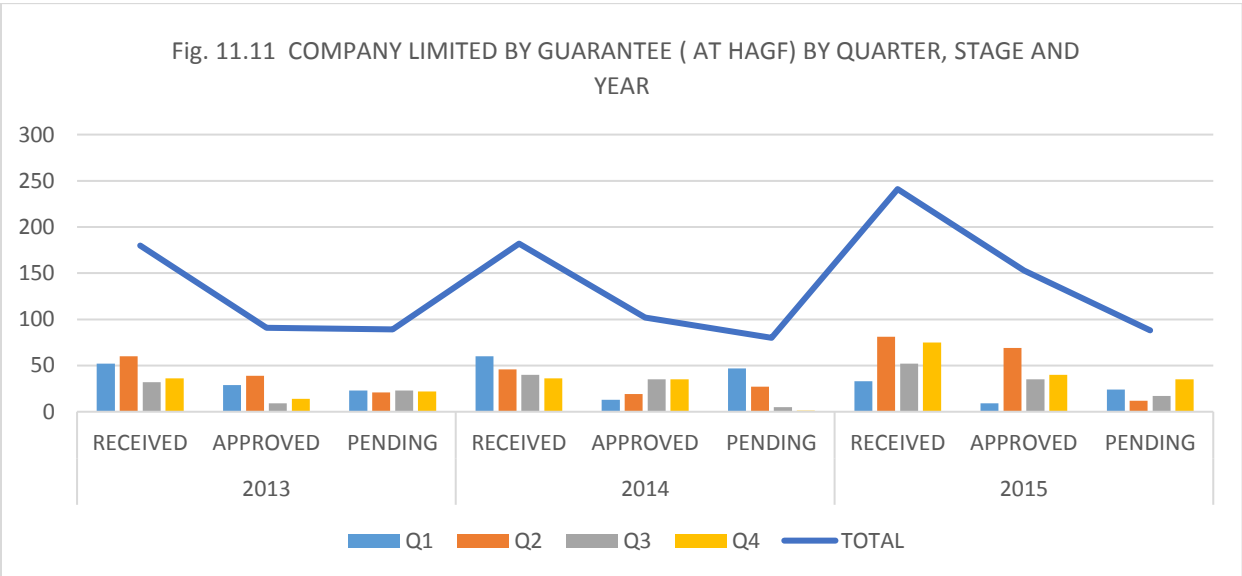

CHAPTER TWELVE - LABOUR

Labour is a primary factor of production. The size of a nation’s labour force is determined by the size of its adult population and the extent to which the adults are either working or are prepared to offer their labour for wages. The labour force population include all persons between ages 15 to 64 years who are willing and able to work regardless of whether they have a job or not. Skills acquisition is essential in building active and dynamic labour force that is employable. This chapter therefore captures data that is related to human training, job creation, industrial disputes unemployment and underemployment in Nigeria.

The highest number of trained youths that have been provided with tools and equipment to establish and run their own business in 2014 was 1,834, (male 940 and female 894) compared to 2013 which had 178 (male 132 and female 46).

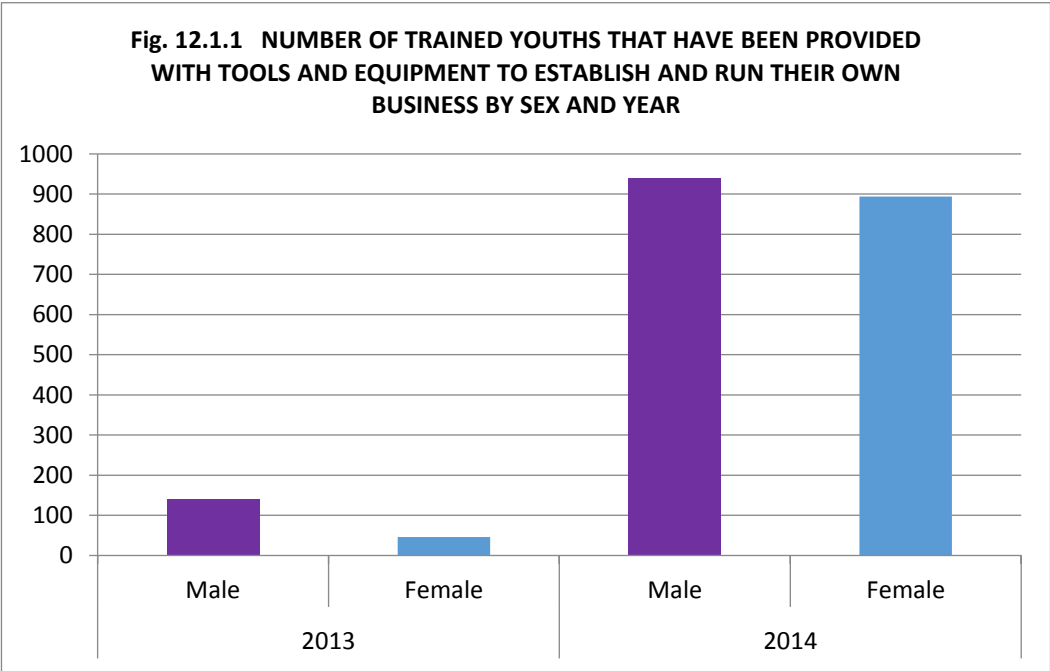

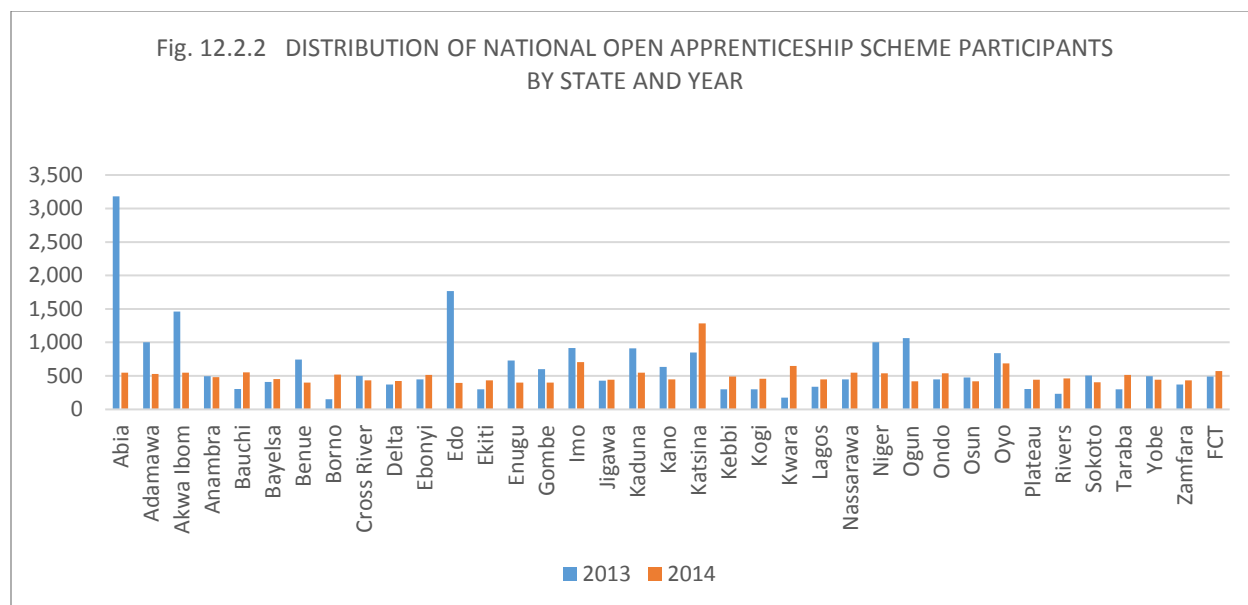
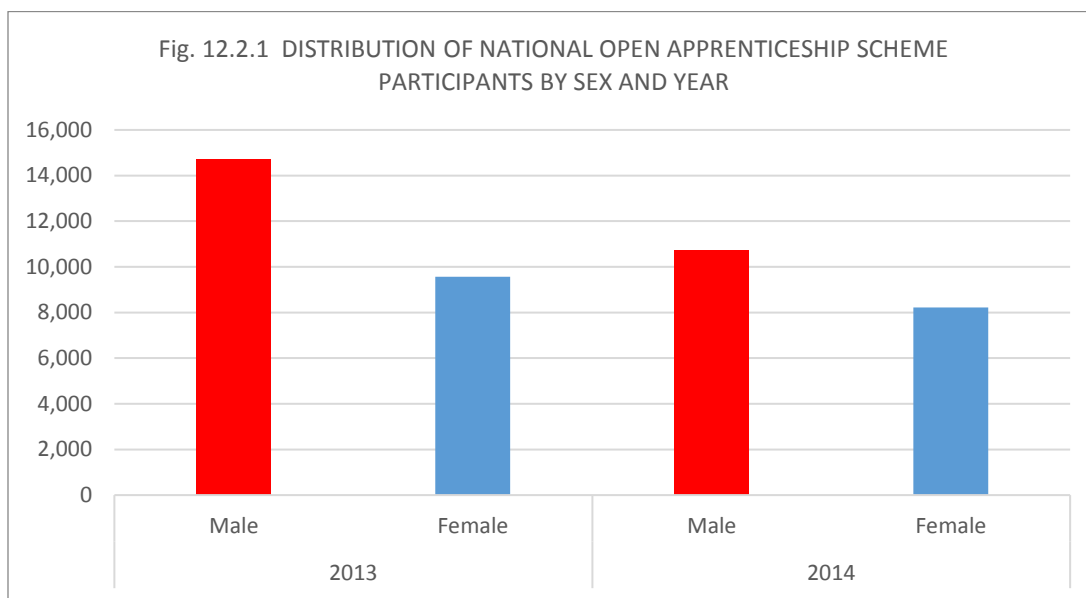

Fig. 12.3.1 INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES BY TYPE AND YEAR

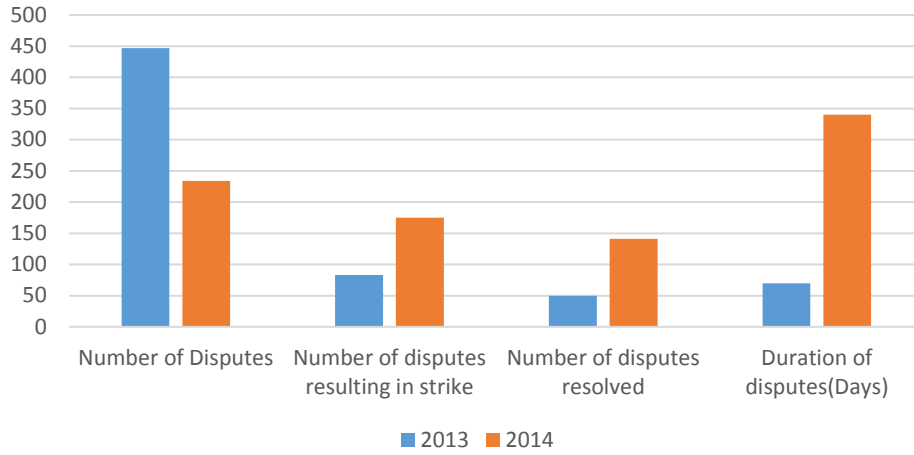


FIG. 12.3.2 PERCENTAGE OF WORKERS INVOLVED IN INDUSTRIAL DISPUTS BY YEAR

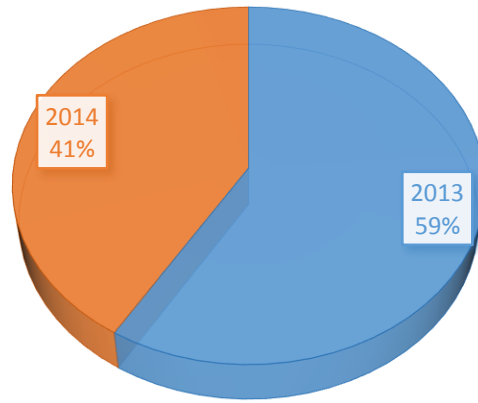


Fig. 12.3.3 TOTAL MAN-DAY LOST BY YEAR

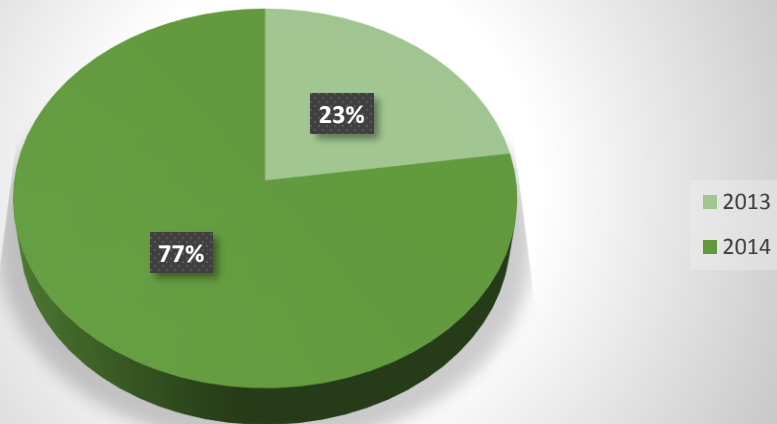

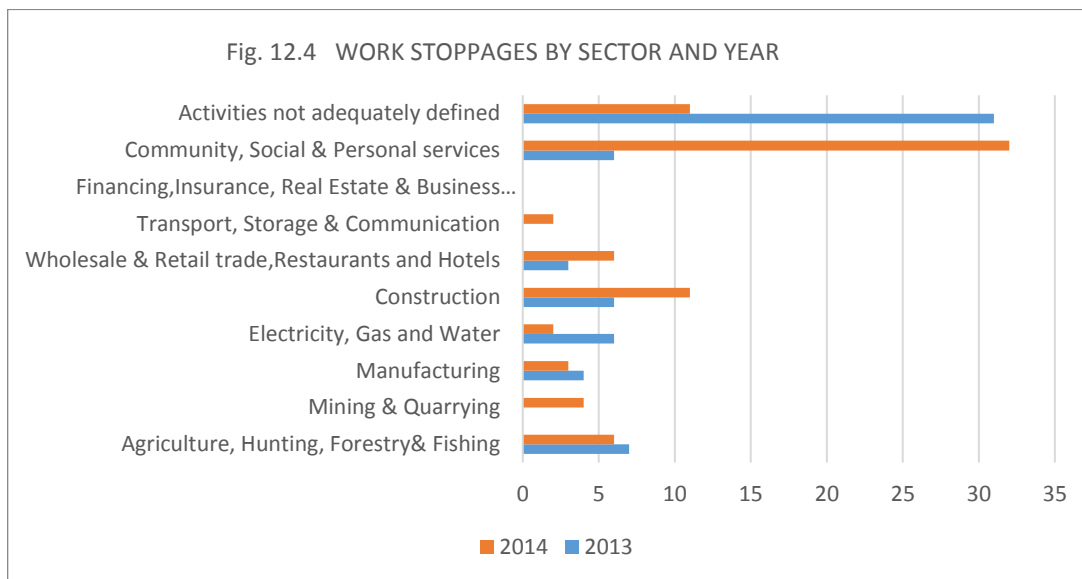
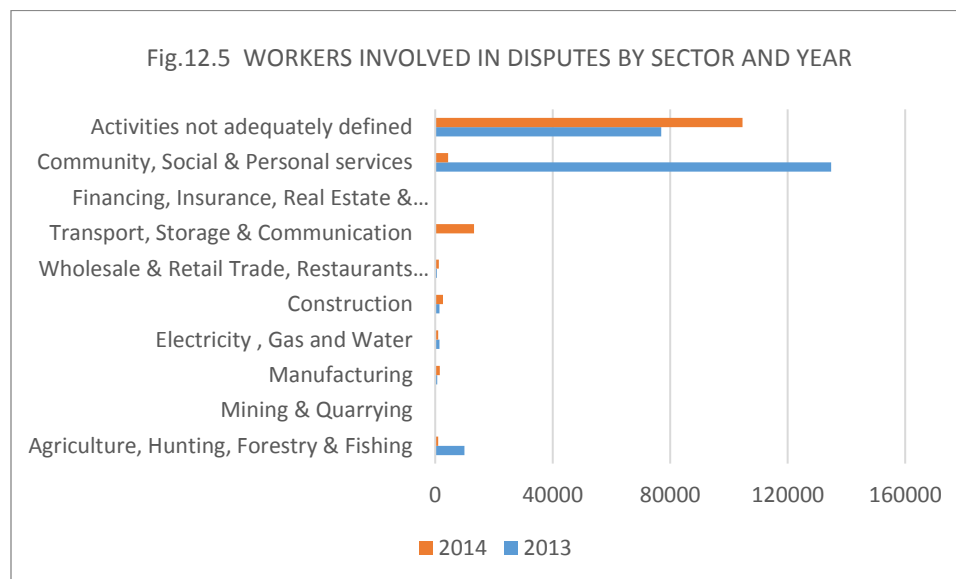

CHAPTER THIRTEEN - PETROLEUM

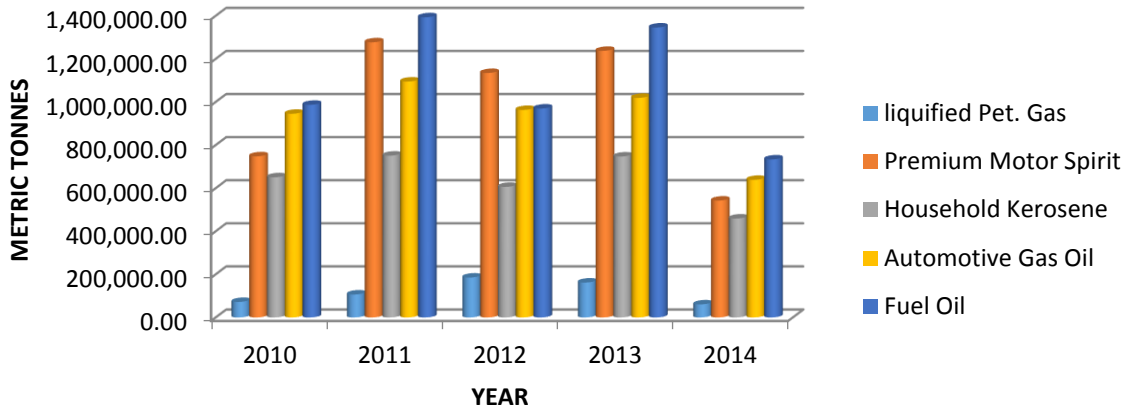
Petroleum plays an integral role in the socio-economic history of Nigeria. This chapter deals with data covering crude oil production and exploration, finished products from Nigeria refineries and pipeline vandalization. The data was provided by the Ministry of Petroleum Resources.

Fig 13.1 Shows Nigeria crude oil production and export by year. In 2010 crude oil production was 896,043.41('000 barrels) but recorded a downward trend in 2014 with 699,486.20('000 barrels) which represents a decrease of 28.1 per cent. In the same vein, Export of crude oil recorded a steady decline from 2010 to 2014 but with slight increase to 773,833.13('000 barrels) in 2014 compared to 2013.



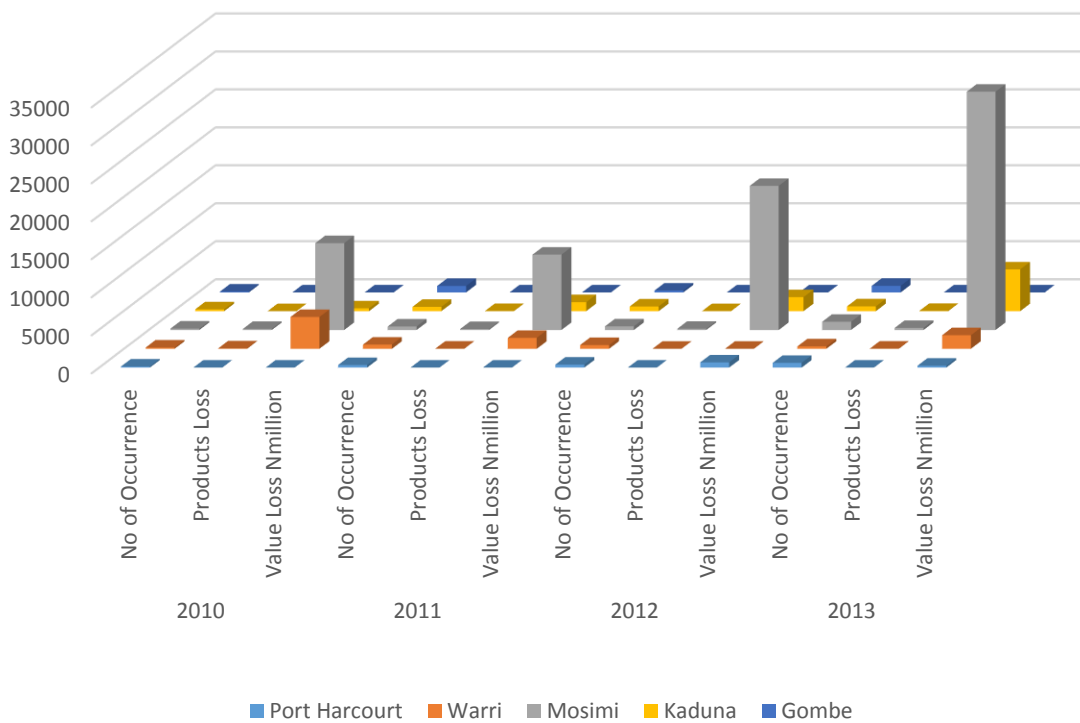
The Premium motor spirit known as Fuel recorded 747,776 metric tonnes in 2010; it increased to 1,276,871, in 2011. There was a sharp drop in 2014 with 542,399 metric tonnes. Household Kerosene had the highest metric tonnes under the period of reference with 750,906 in 2011, while the least was 638,604 in 2014.

In 2010, the occurrence of pipeline vandalization in Nigeria recorded 836, increased to 2,768 in 2011, and slightly dropped to 2,230 in 2012. The year 2013 had 3,505 occurrences which indicates a 36.4% increase from 2012. In 2013, the Mosimi zone recorded the highest loss of product amounting to ₦31.4 billion, followed by Kaduna zone with ₦5.5 billion, while Port-Harcourt zone recorded the least loss of product through vandalization with about ₦244 million.

CHAPTER FOURTEEN - SECURITY

The social-political and economic landscape in Nigeria has been affected by the endemic twin of crime and violence. Such crimes include militancy, kidnapping, bombing, armed robbery, destruction of government properties, among others. The activities of various militia groups consequently resulted in low income for government from oil revenue, with adverse effect on the gross domestic product growth rate, low participation of local and foreign investors in economic development and insecurity of lives and properties to the citizens. This chapter looks at data on security and safety generally and the different reported cases of accident in the country.

Fig. 14.1 shows total number of reported road accident cases with injury by state and year. In 2013 Jigawa state recorded the lowest number of injured cases of road accidents with 20, while FCT recorded the highest with 1,246. In 2014, Ogun state recorded the highest with 1,747 while Jigawa State recorded the lowest with 11, showing a decline from 2013. However, in 2015 Kogi State recorded the highest with 984 while Borno state recorded the least with 5 cases. In summary, the total number of reported injured cases of road accidents for 2013 was 12,372, this decreased to 12,227 and 10,257 in 2014 and 2015 respectively.

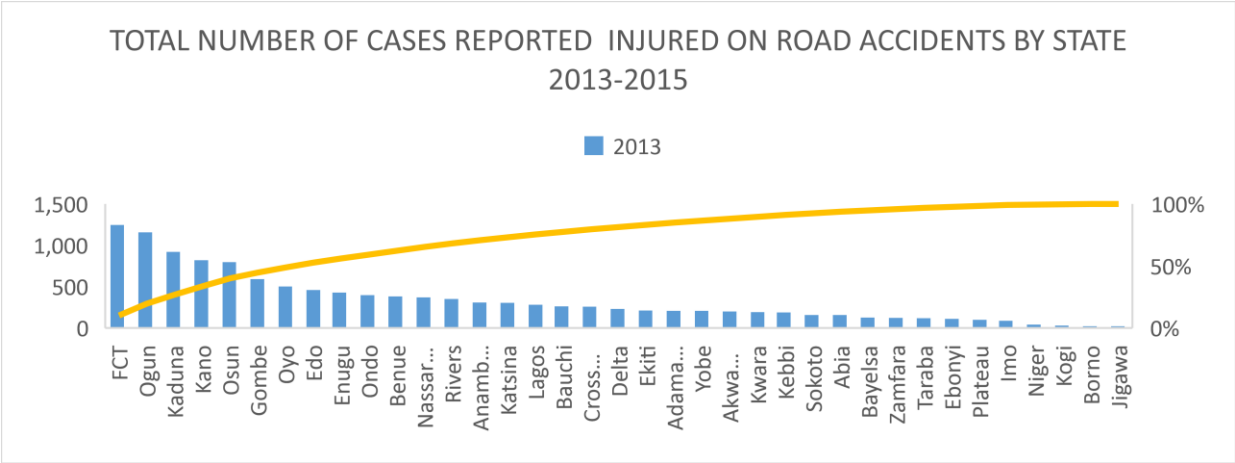


Fig. 14.2 shows that, in 2013 Kogi state recorded the least number of reported cases of road accident with 31, while Ogun State recorded the highest number with 2,847. In 2014, Jigawa state recorded 205 which was the lowest, while Lagos recorded the highest with 3,919. In 2015 Ogun state recorded the highest with 1,513, while Borno state recorded the least with 410. In summary, the total number of reported road accidents was 29,494 cases in 2013, it decreased to 25,427 and 24,954 in 2014 and 2015 respectively.

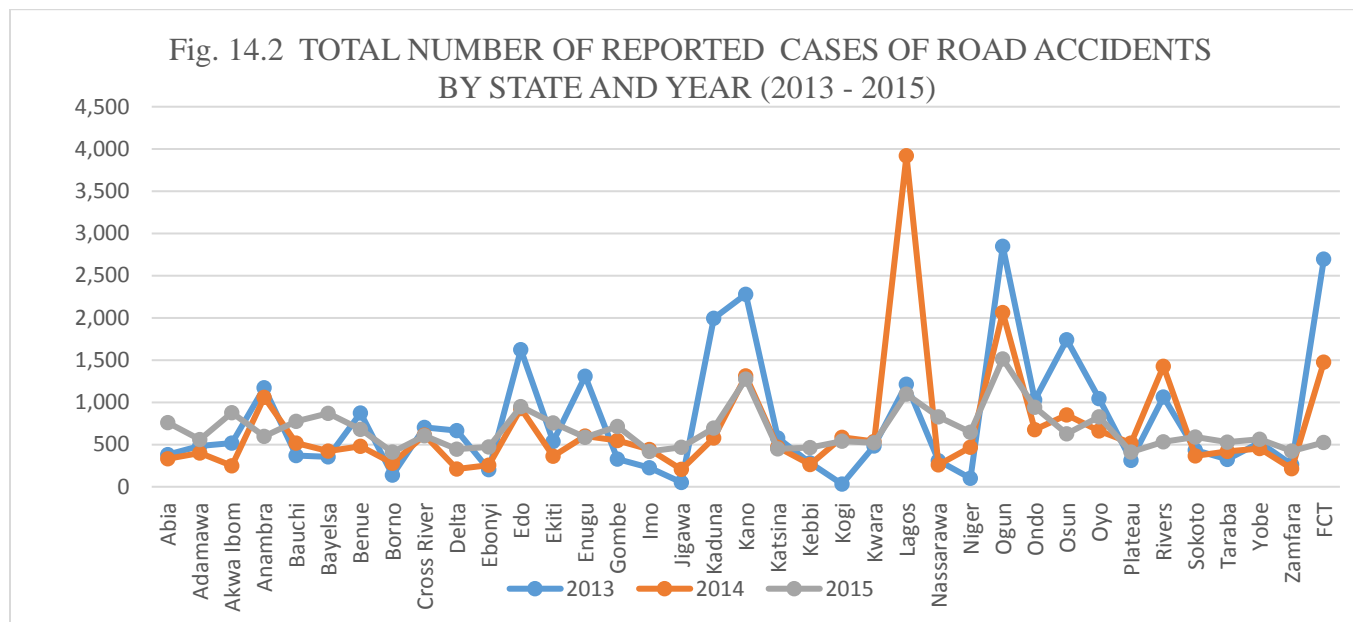
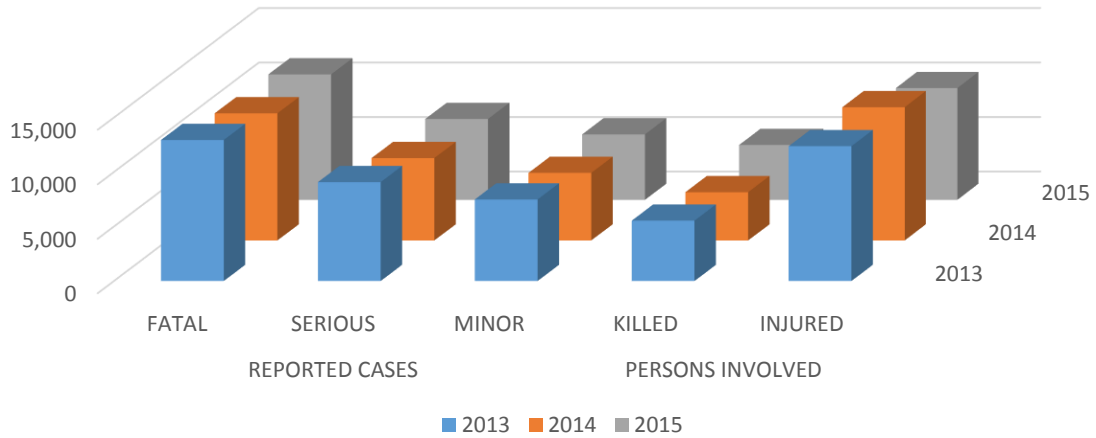


Fig. 14.3 shows the total number of reported cases of road accidents by state and year. In 2013 the reported cases by classification in Nigeria was 29,494, this decreased to 25,427 in 2014 and 24,594 in 2015. Accidents that were classified as fatal in 2013 was 13,021, this decreased to 11,665 in 2014 and 11,507 in 2015. For those classified as serious, 8,917 cases were recorded in 2013, this decreased to 7,561 in 2014 and 7,309 in 2015. Minor accidents had 7,556 cases in 2013, it decreased to 6,201 and 6,057 in 2014 and 2015 respectively.

In 2013, the total number of stolen vehicles in Nigeria was 551, this increased to 1,201 in 2014 and in 2015 it dropped to 818. The total number of stolen vehicles recovered was 341 in 2013, the number increased to 600 in 2014 and decreased to 436 in 2015. The total number of unrecovered vehicles in 2013 was 210, this increased to 574 in 2014 and in 2015 it decreased to 381.

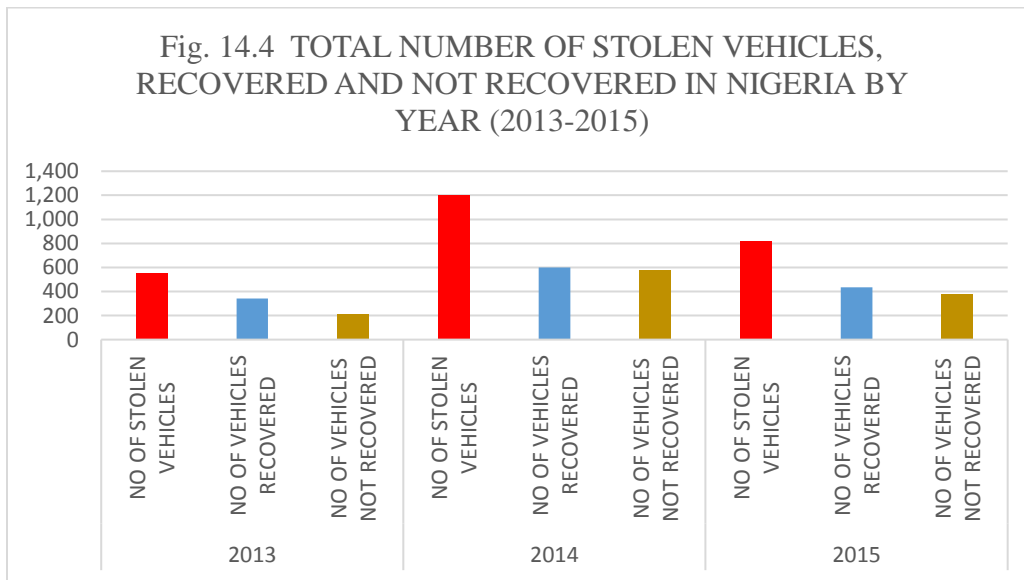

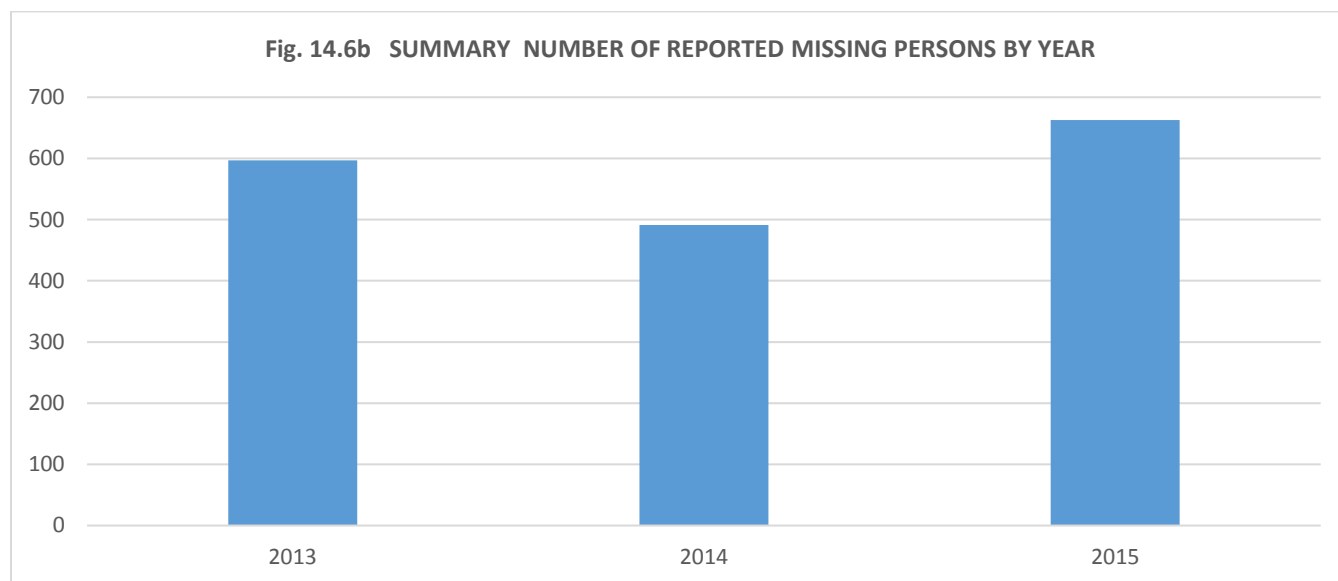
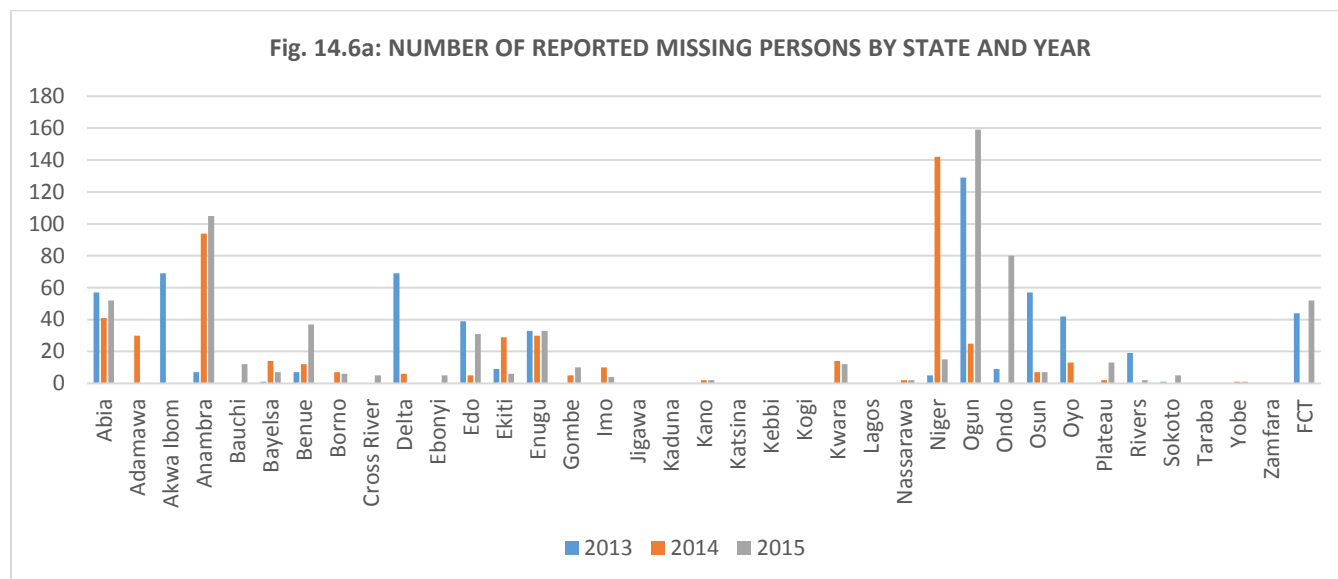
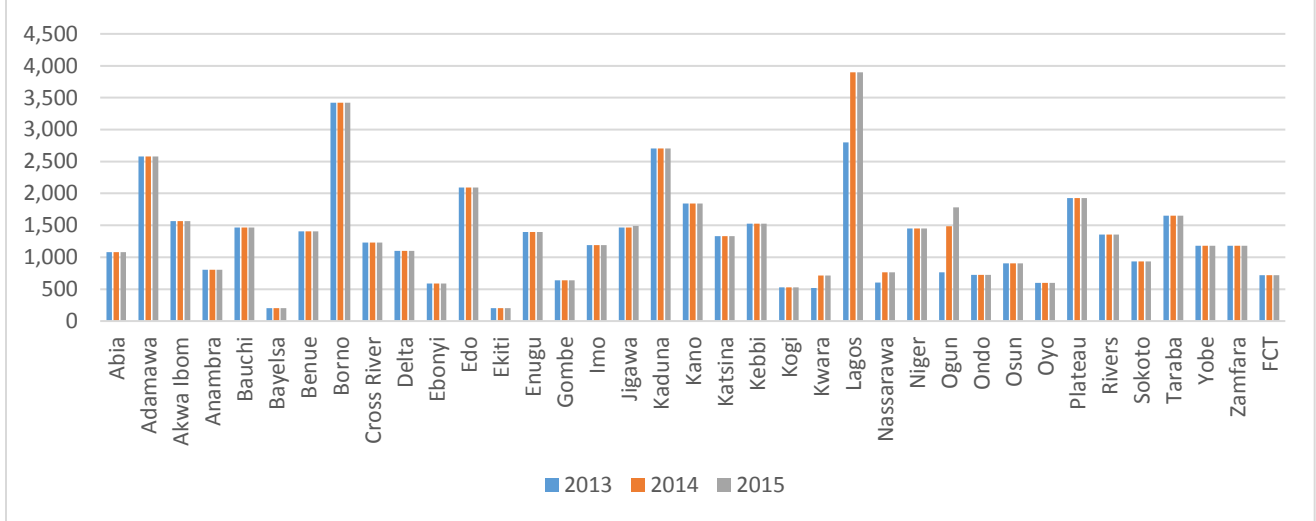


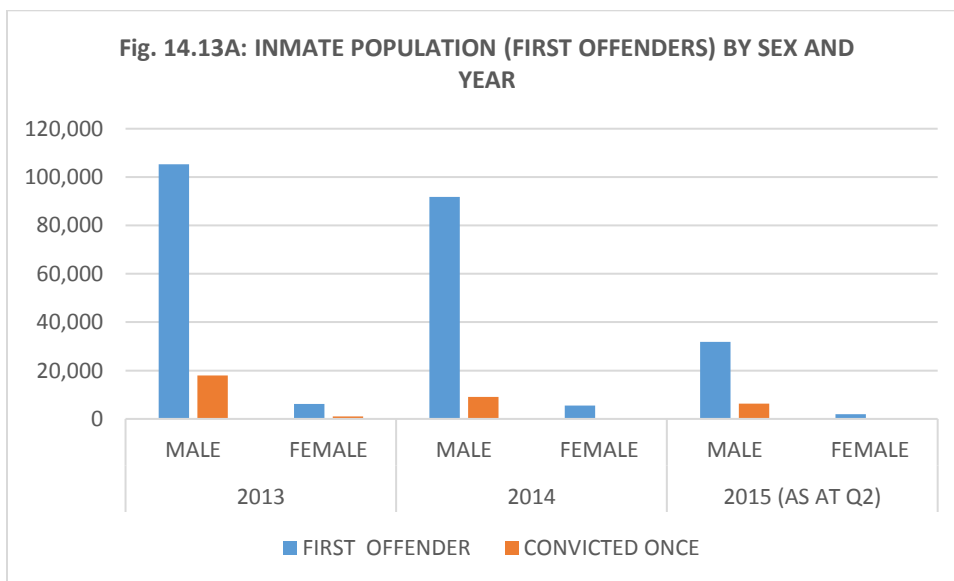

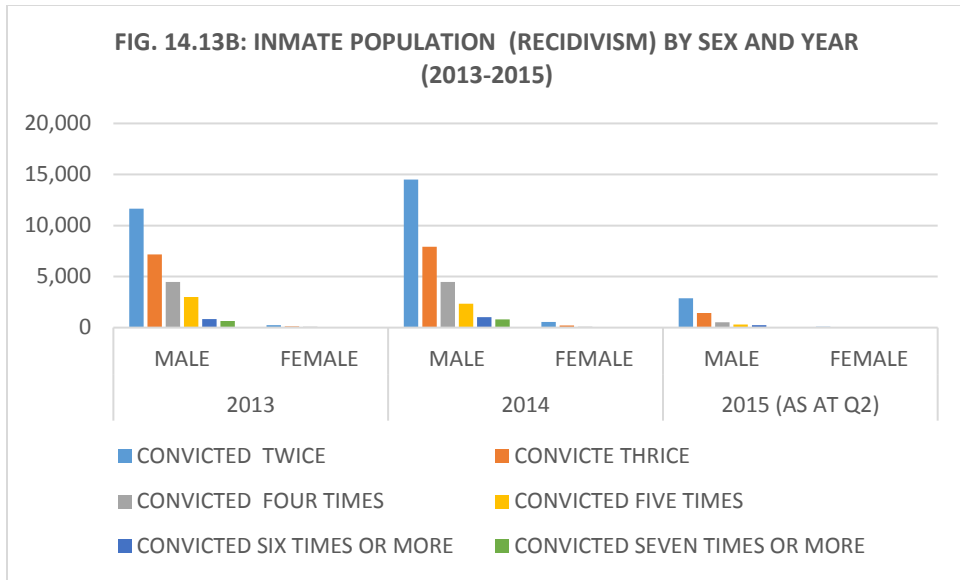
Fig. 14.12: PRISON CAPACITY BY STATE AND YEAR (2013-2015)

Those convicted as recidivist (more than once) in 2013 were 27,768 males and 555 females, this increased to 31,031 (male) and 938 (female) in 2014. The second quarter of 2015 recorded 5,363 males and 120 females.

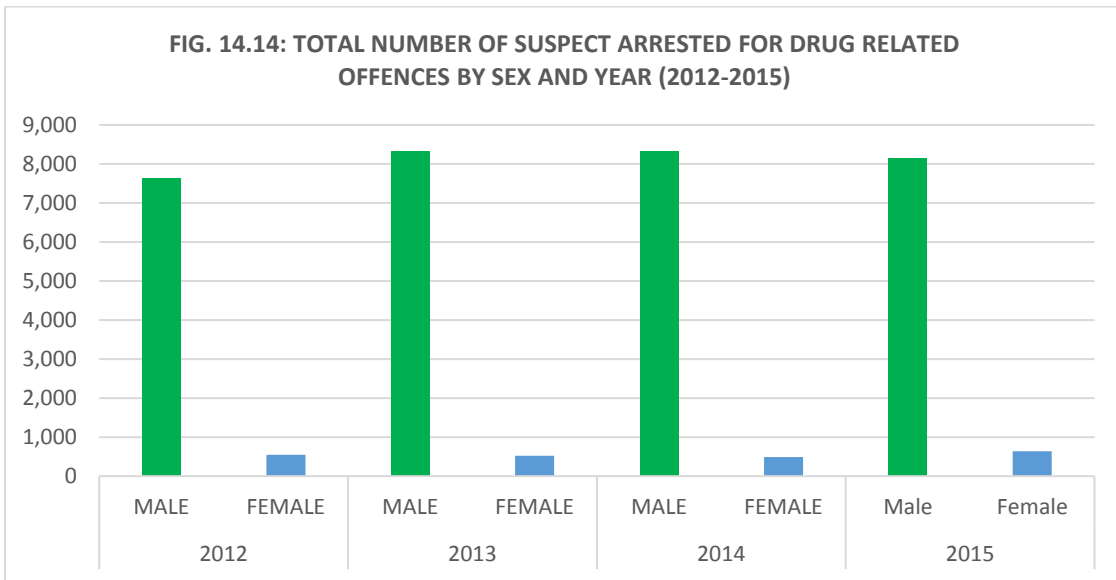
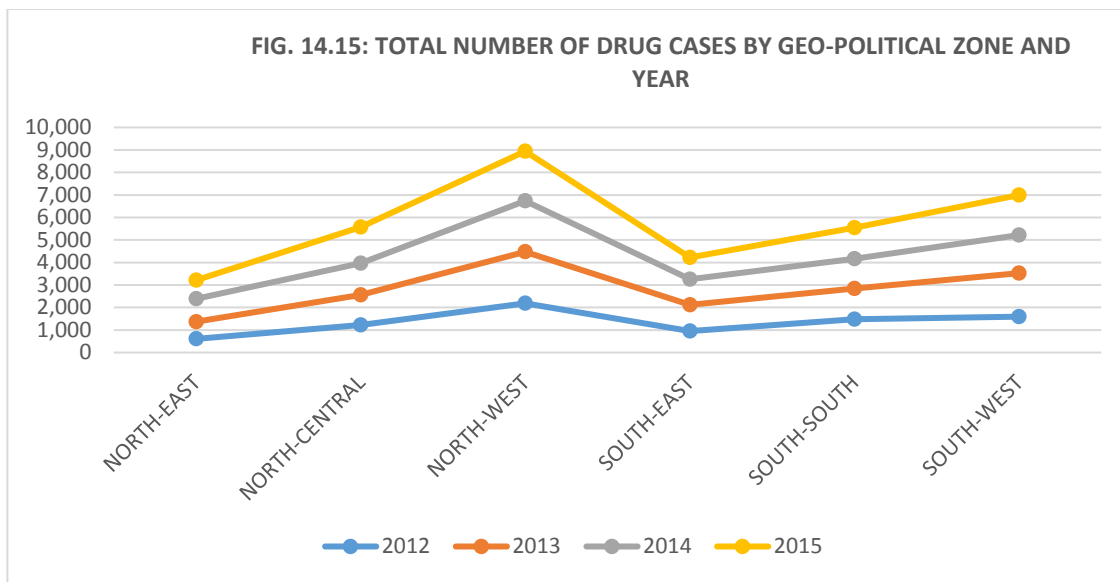

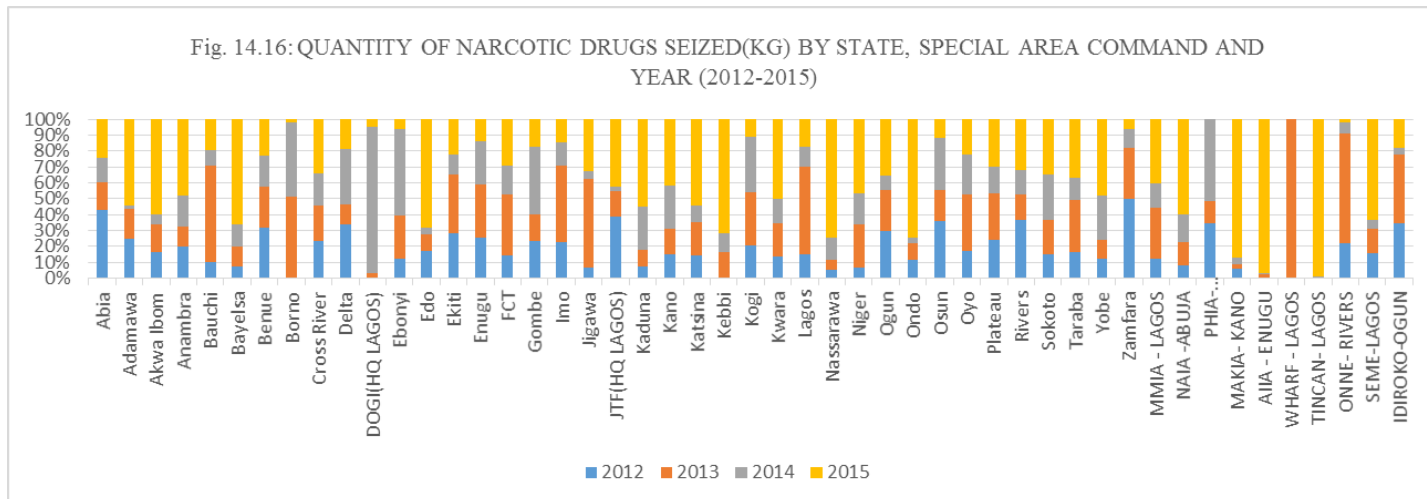
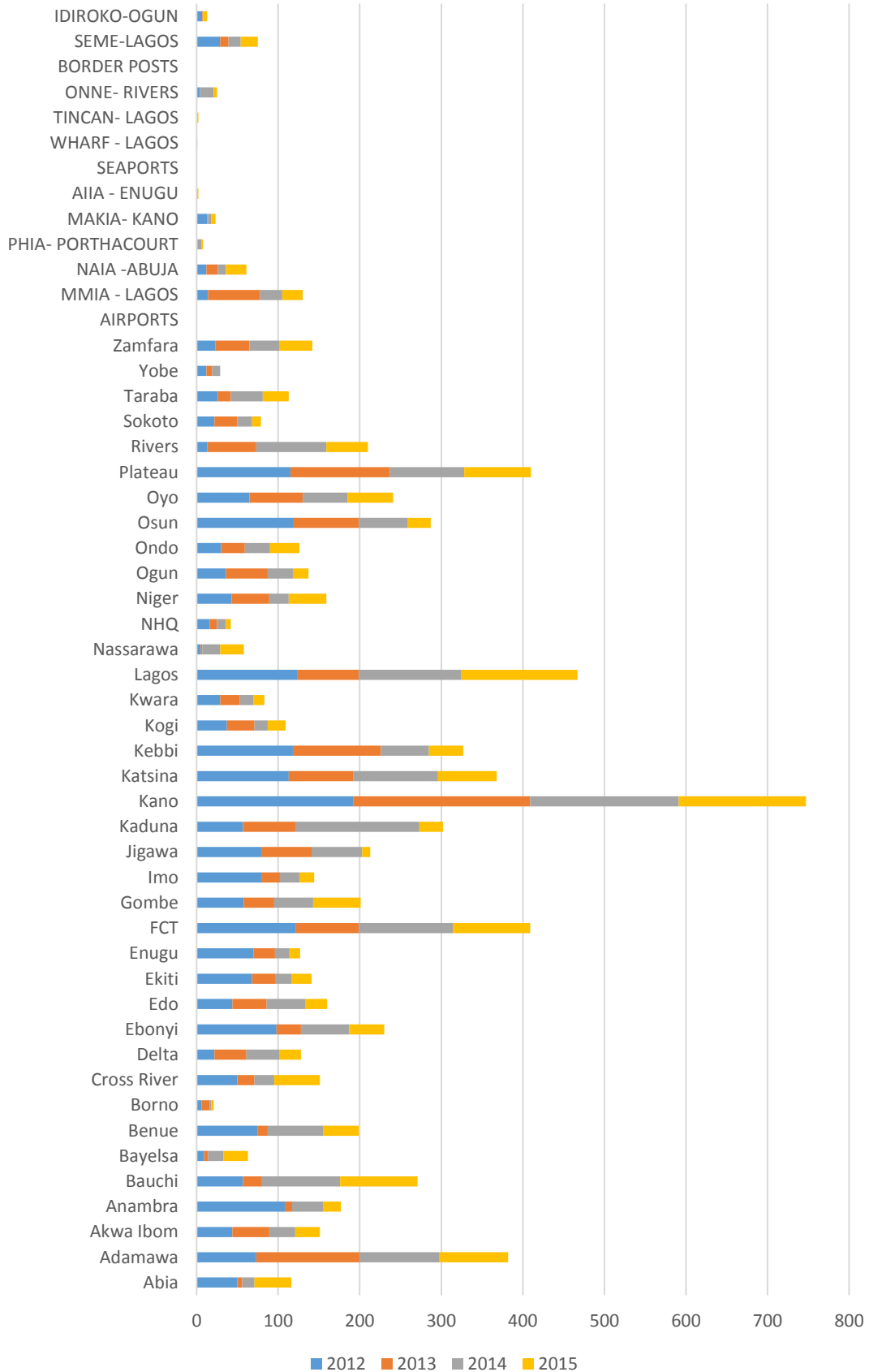

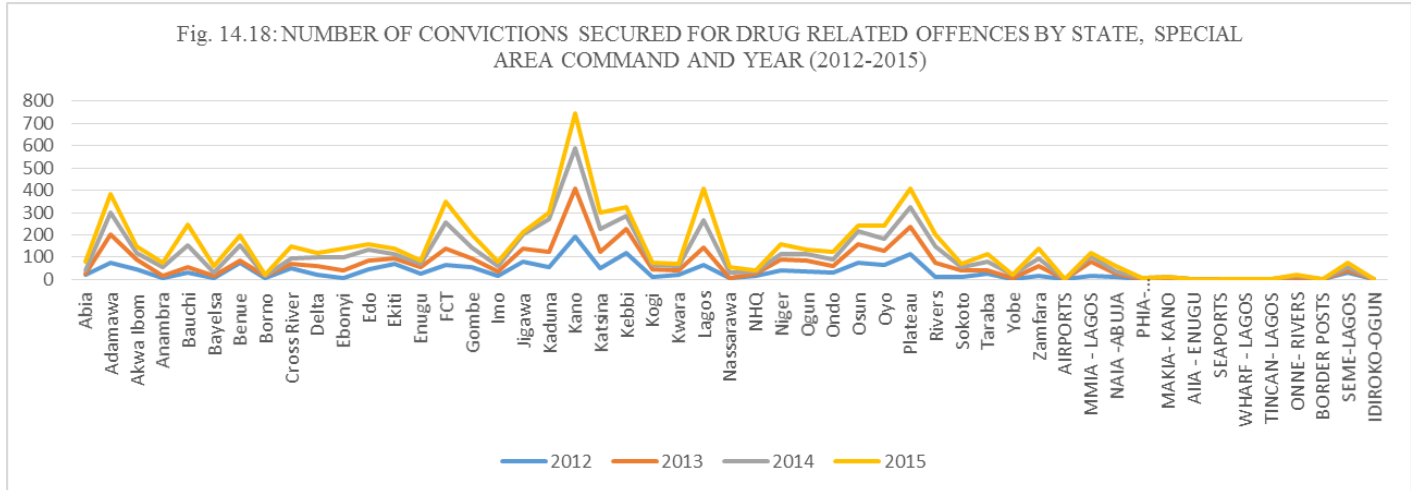
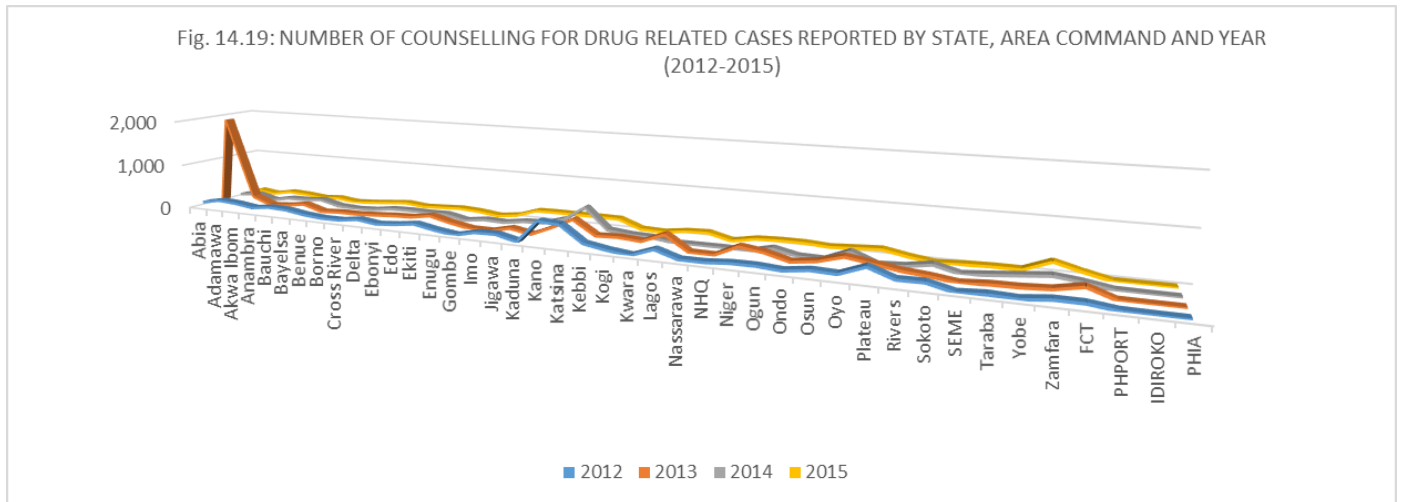
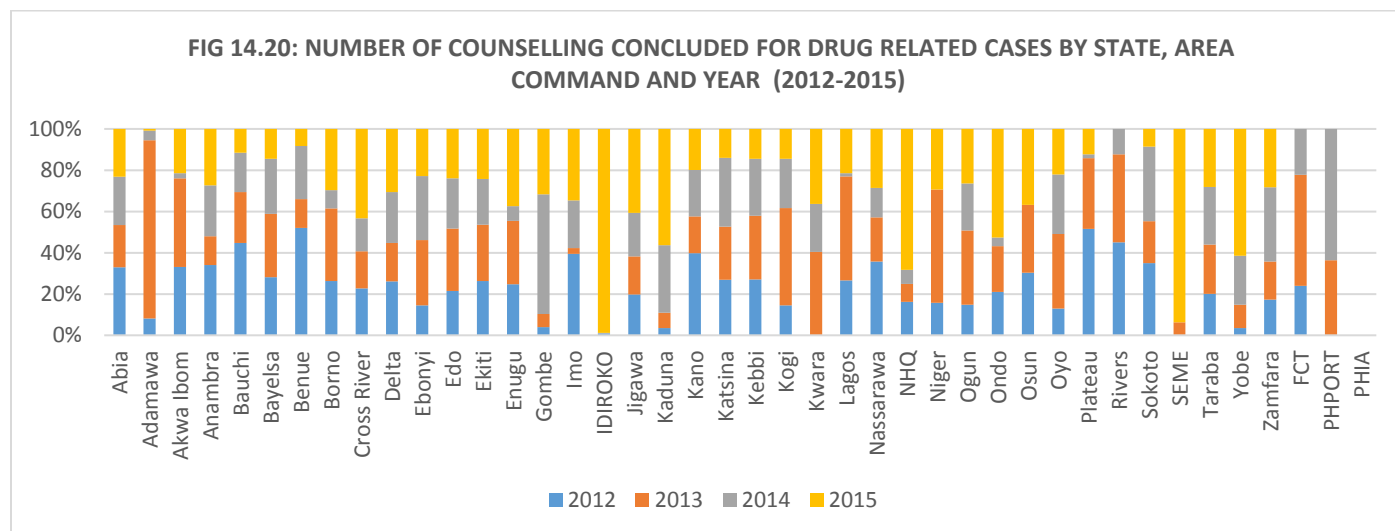


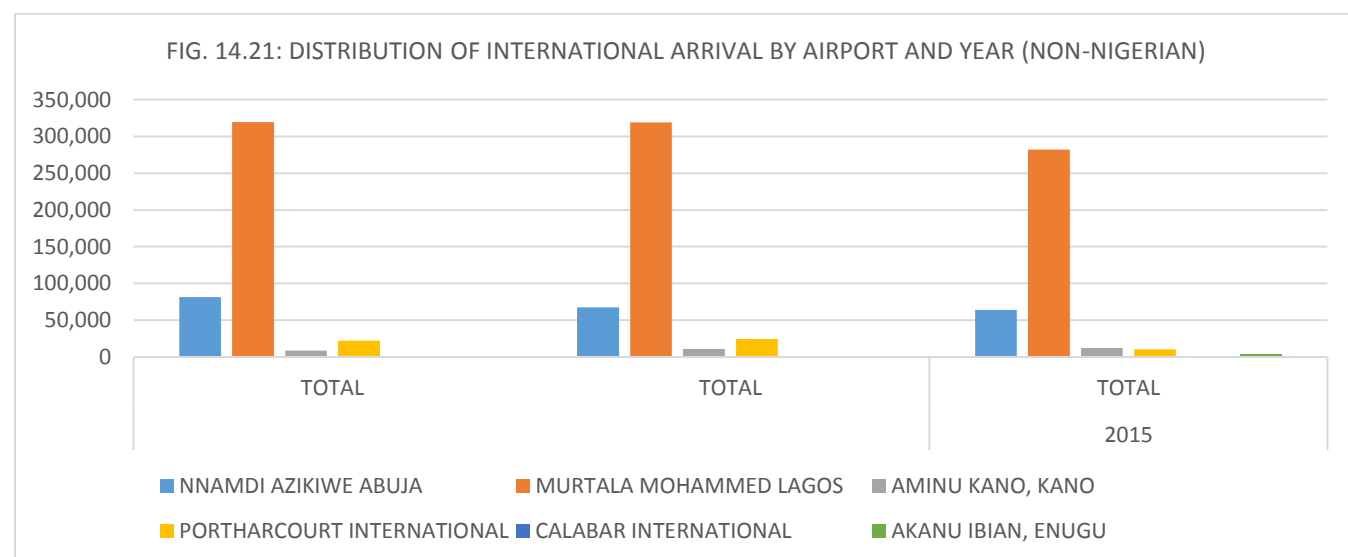

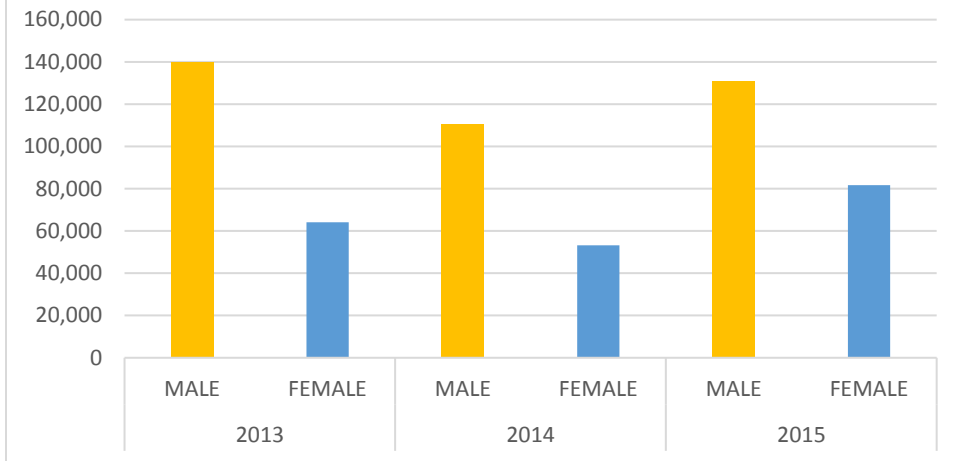

CHAPTER FIFTEEN - TRANSPORT

The transport sector is of great significance to a largely populated country like Nigeria, which has high volume of trade and movement of people. Highway, Rail and Aviation transportation systems are of vital importance to the national economy. Accurate travel information is important for evaluating transportation sector. In recent years, transportation statistical collection practices have improved. Transport statistics provides data on land transportation, maritime and air. For this report, some selected key indicators, accompanied by tables, graphs and charts, have been included for quick understanding of the basic trends of the transport sector in the country.

Fig. 15.1 shows that, in 2013 the total number plates produced in Nigeria for motor vehicles was 1,004,505 and 303,758 for motor cycles. There was a drop for motor vehicles in 2014 with 560,947 plates and an increase for motor cycles with 418,417. In 2015, motor vehicles and motor cycles had 303,274 and 269,795 plates respectively.

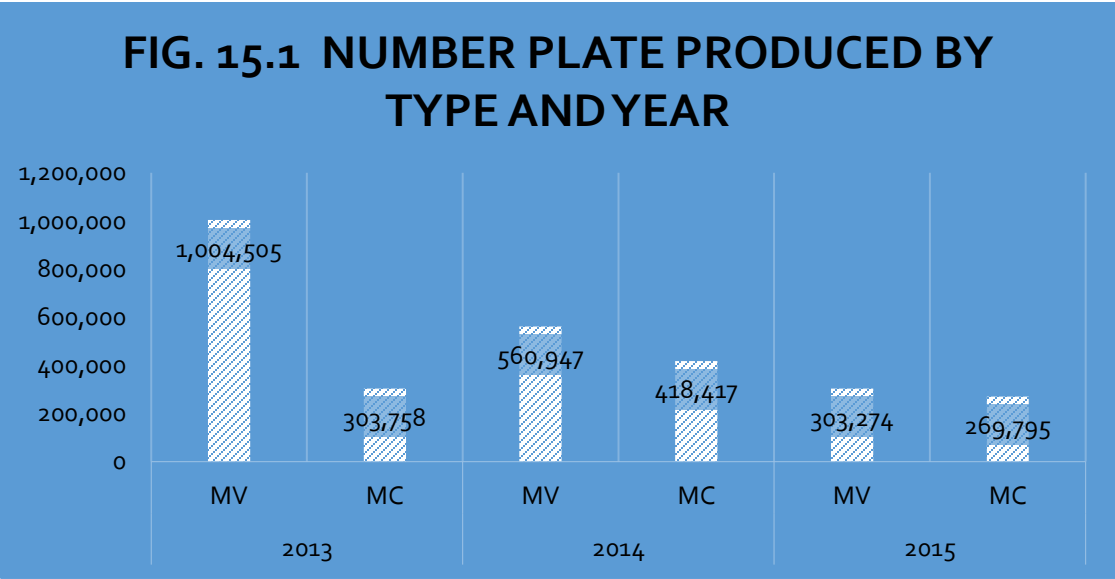


Fig. 15.2 shows that, drivers licence processed had an upward trend in the period under review. Drivers licence increased from 395,530 in 2013 to 653,046 in 2014 and 1,151,906 in 2015. Among the states, Lagos state had the highest licence processed with 127,261 in 2013 which increased to 298,319 in 2015, while Kebbi and Yobe States processed the least with 1,274 and 2,373 in 2013 and 2015 respectively.

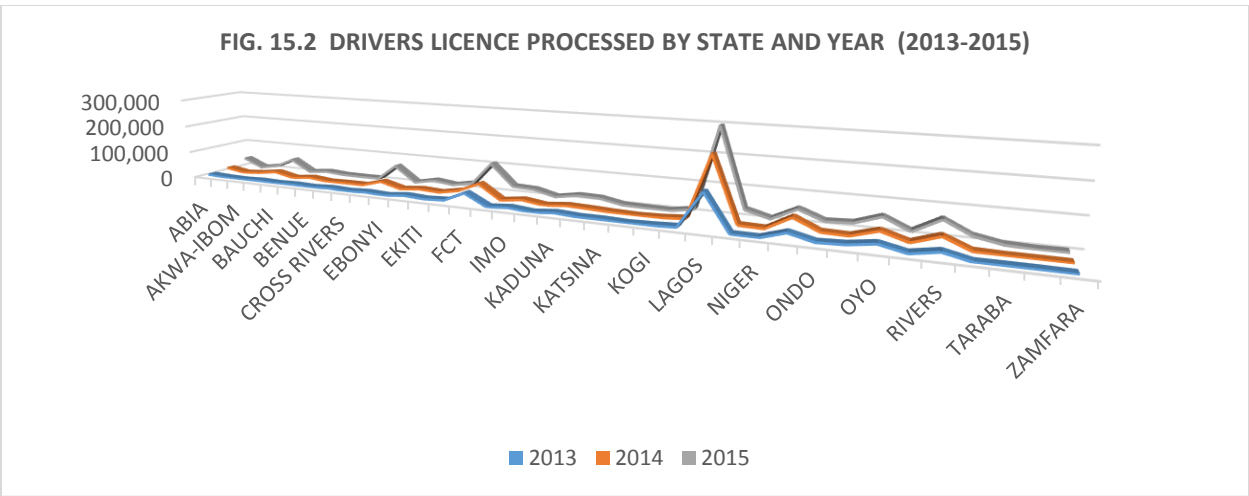
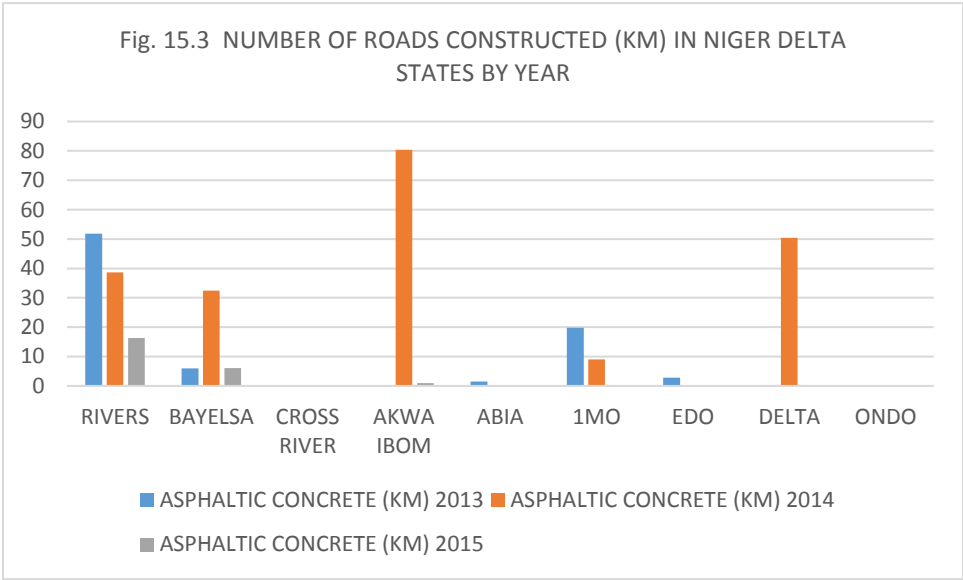

CHAPTER SIXTEEN - YOUTH AND SPORTS

Nigeria has a large youthful population. In absolute terms, there are more young people in Nigeria today than any other segment of the population, and this comes with its peculiar social and economic implications. Young people are key actors and a driving force for global development and peace. They are critical partners in the development of Nigeria.

The UN definition of youth are 'those persons between the ages of 15 and 24 years, without prejudice to other definitions by Member States. All UN statistics on youth are based on this definition'.

UNESCO adopts the definition of 'youth' based on the definition given in the African Youth Charter where 'youth' is defined as 'every person between the ages of 15 and 35 years'. The National Youth Policy defines youth as a person between the ages of 18 – 35 years. The data for this report covers ages 15 – 35 years

The data used in this chapter is from the National Youth Survey conducted in collaboration with Federal Ministry of Youth Development in 2012.

The percent distribution of male/female within each age group is shown in fig. 16.1. It was generally found that the female/male ratio was higher in all the age groups except in the case of 15-19 years where the male showed a higher ratio than the female.

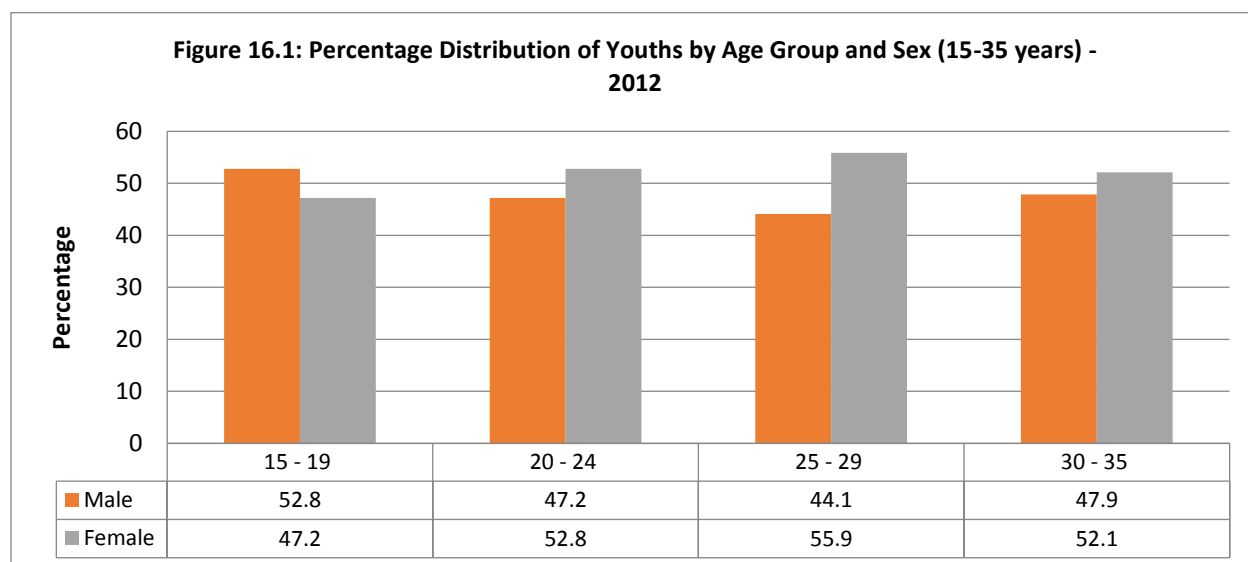


Fig 16.2 shows the percentage distribution of youth by marital status and sex. Females were more in number in all categories than their male counterpart except those who were yet to marry. Out of the group of married youths, 68 per cent were females, while 32 per cent were males. Rate of divorce and widowhood was high among the female youths (70.9 and 71.8 per cent) while the percentage for those who were never married was 38.5 per cent (female).

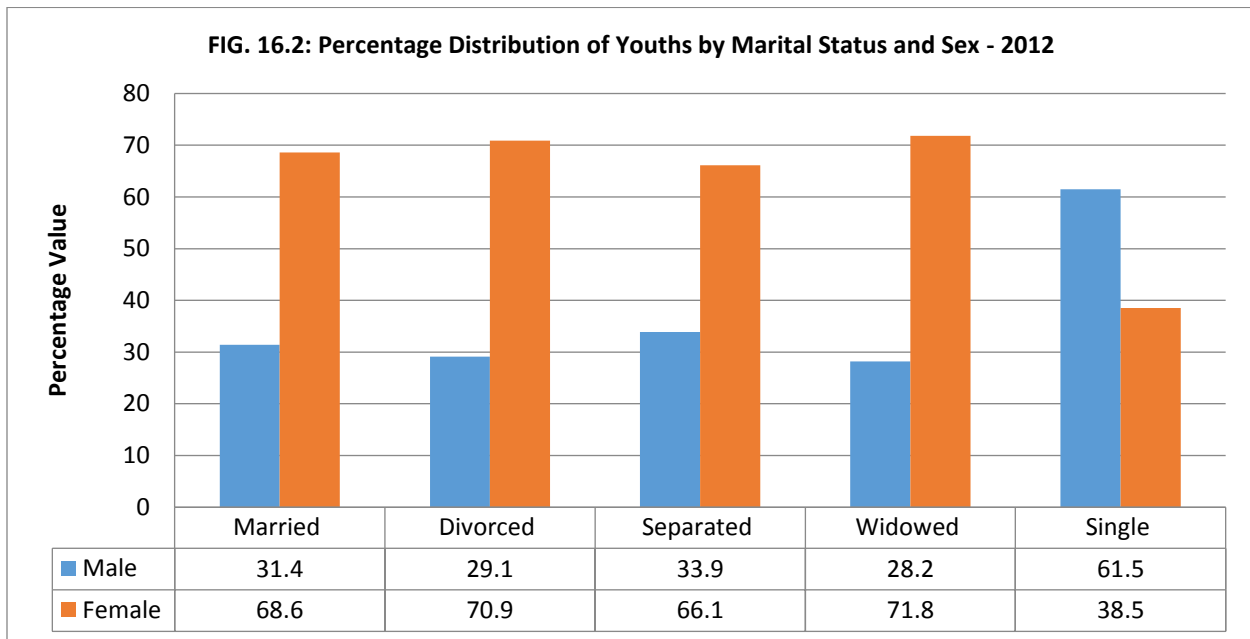


Fig 16.3 below shows the distribution of youths by attendance in school. Out of the total number of youths that were never in school, more females (64.3 per cent) were never in school compared to their males' counterpart (35.7 per cent). Currently more males (56.7 per cent) can be seen in school while more female youths (52 per cent) were formerly in school than male youths.

FIG. 16:3 Percentage Distribution of Youth by Attendance in School - 2012

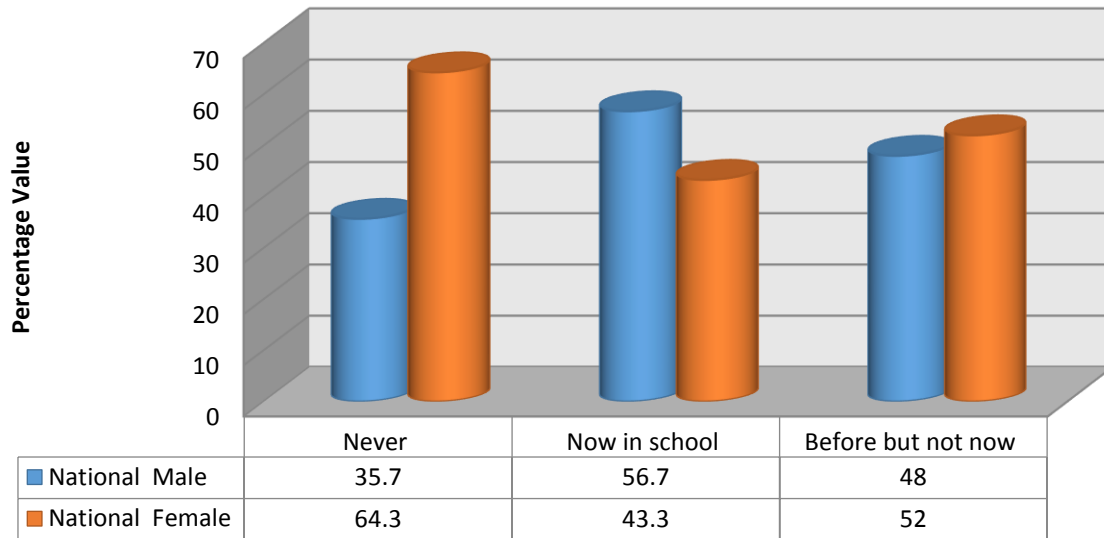


Fig. 16.4 shows that 64.1 per cent of youths age 15 – 19 were in school while 21.3 per cent had never been to school. For age group 20 – 24, most had been to school (23.2) while 20.2 per cent had never. Only 9.0 per cent of youths age 25 – 29 were currently in school, but most (28.4 per cent) had been to school before. Similarly, only 4.3 per cent of youth age 30 – 35 were currently in school.

FIG. 16:4 Percentage Distribution of Youth by Attendance in School and Age Group - 2012

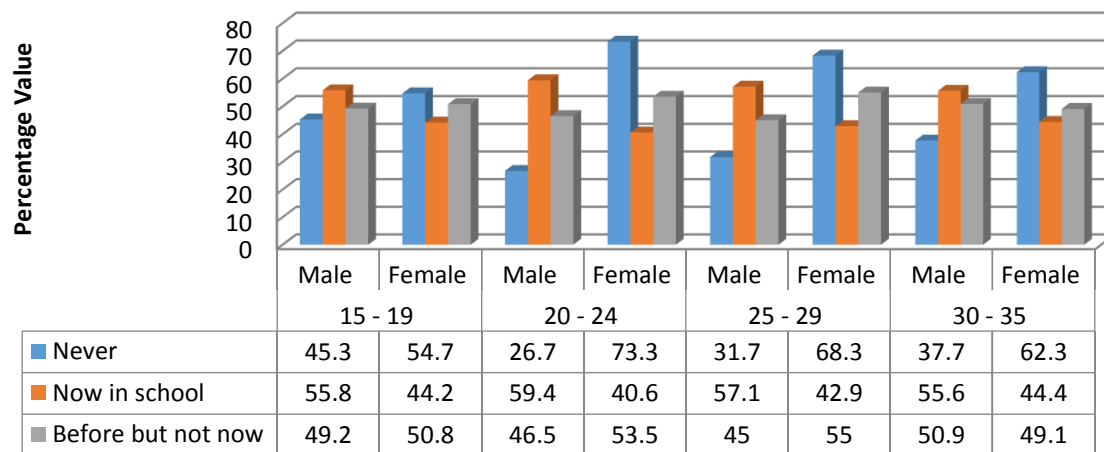


Fig 16.5 shows courses in social sciences leading other courses (26.7 per cent of youths) followed by management science courses (22.9 per cent). Medicine is the least enrolled with 1.5 per cent of youths.

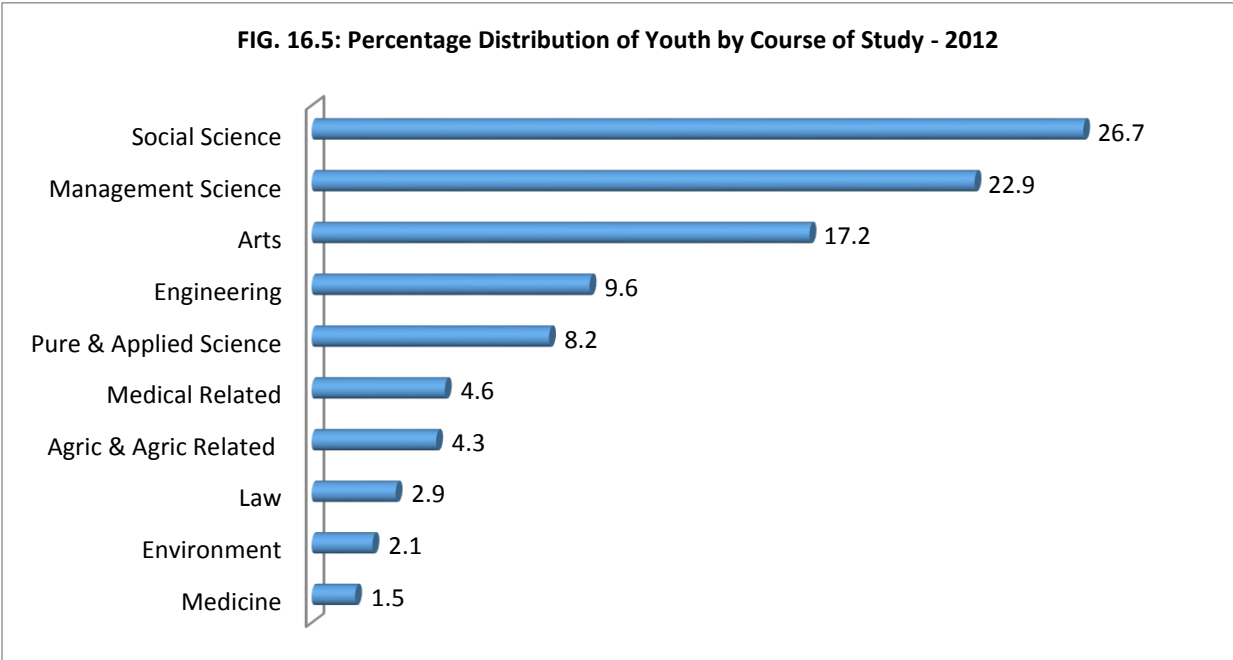


Figure 16.6 shows that 47.4 per cent of youths in the country had access and used Public hospitals, compared to 19.5% recorded for the Private hospitals. The Pharmacy/Chemist was accessed by 4.0 per cent of the youths, Religious hospital recorded 1.8 per cent access by youths, Private Doctors (0.7 per cent) and other Health care facilities (0.2 per cent).

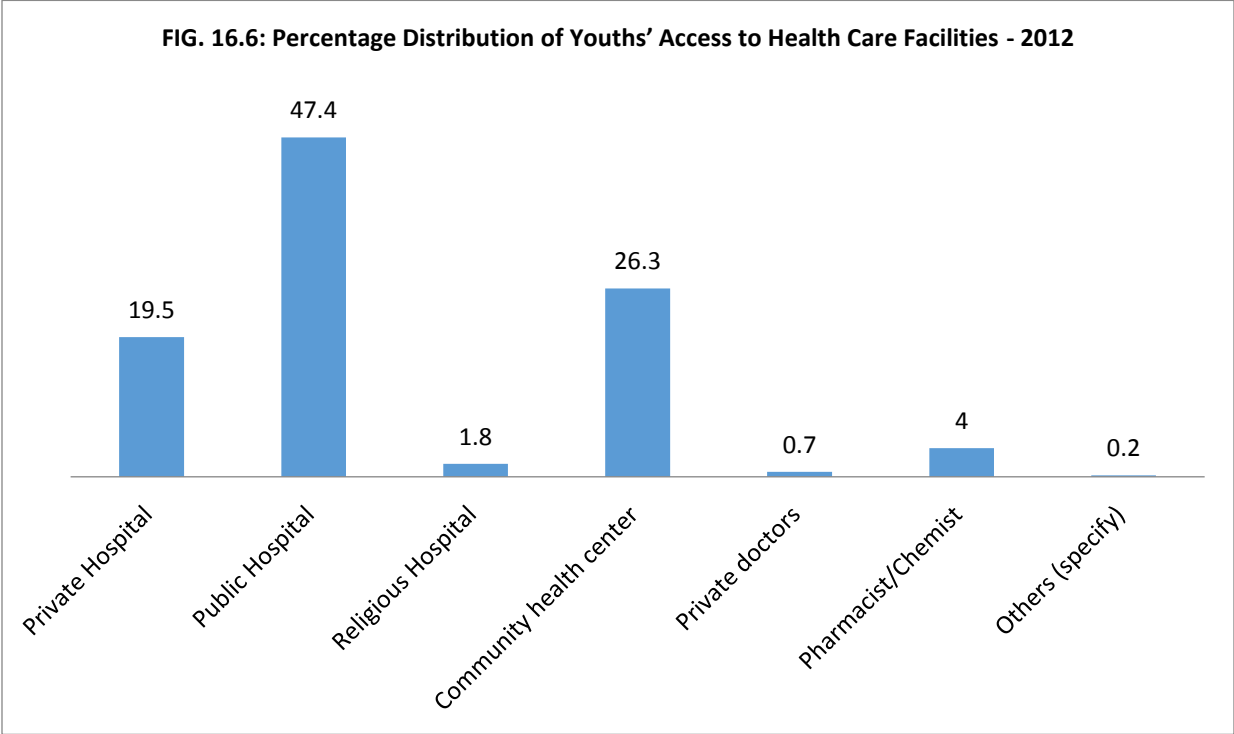


Fig 16.7 on youth involvement in sports in Nigeria shows that at a national level, more males (68.6 per cent) than females (31.4 per cent) were involved in recreation and sporting activities. Also a higher proportion (77.2 per cent) of males compared to only 22.8 per cent females are engaged in professional recreational activities.

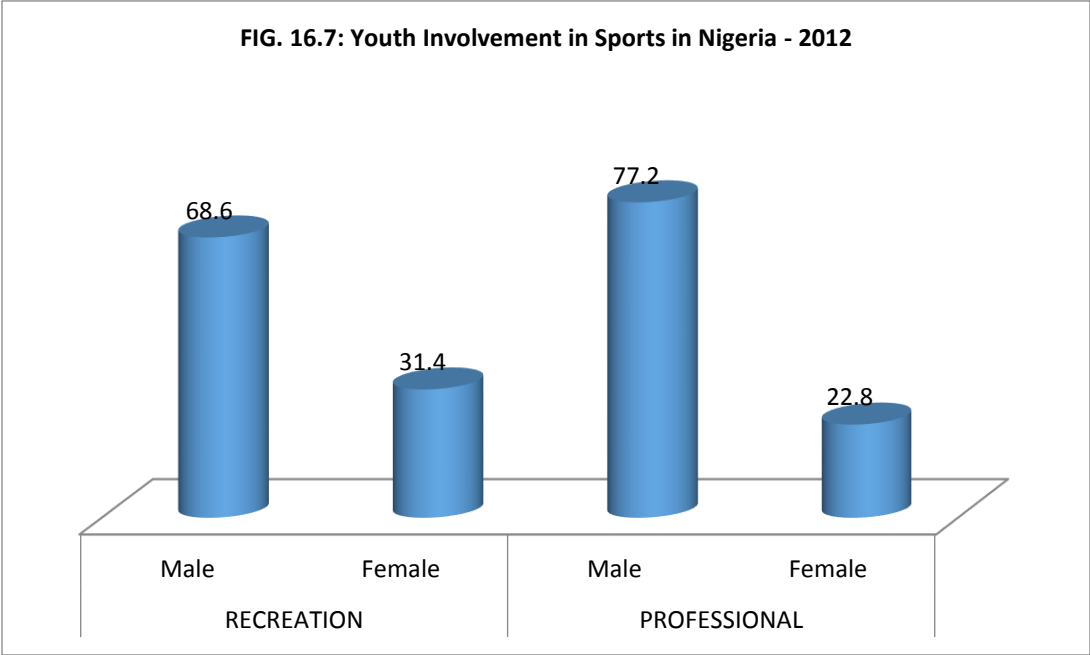
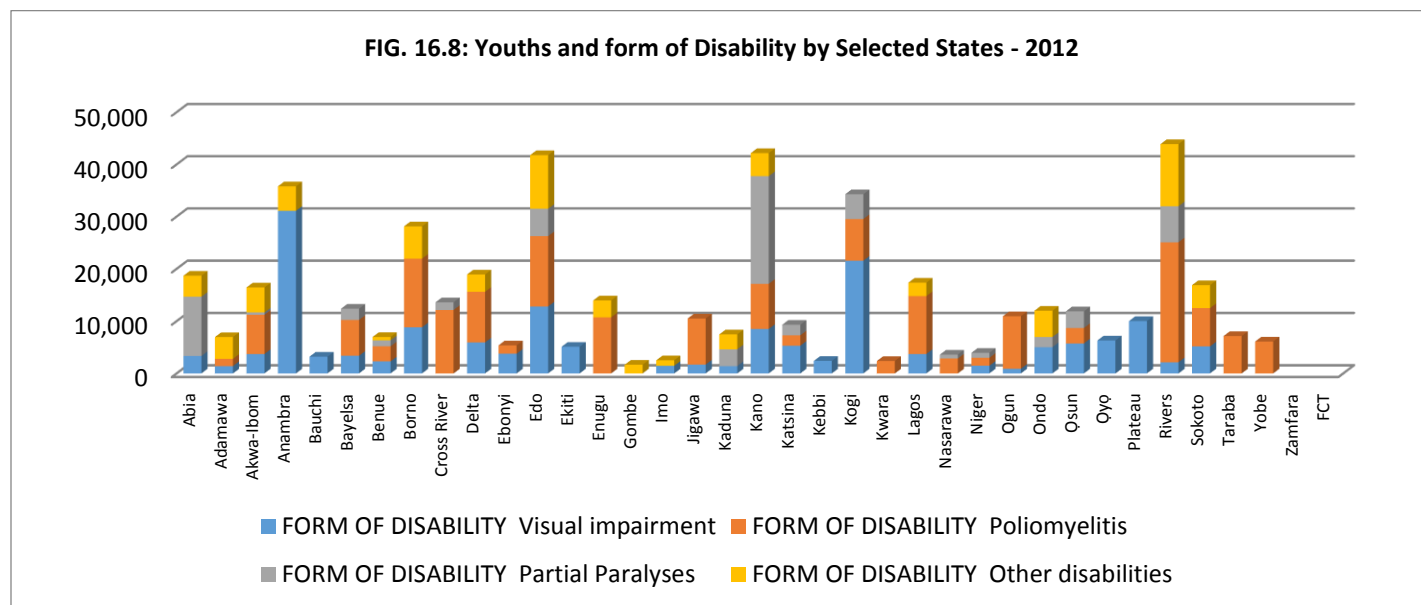
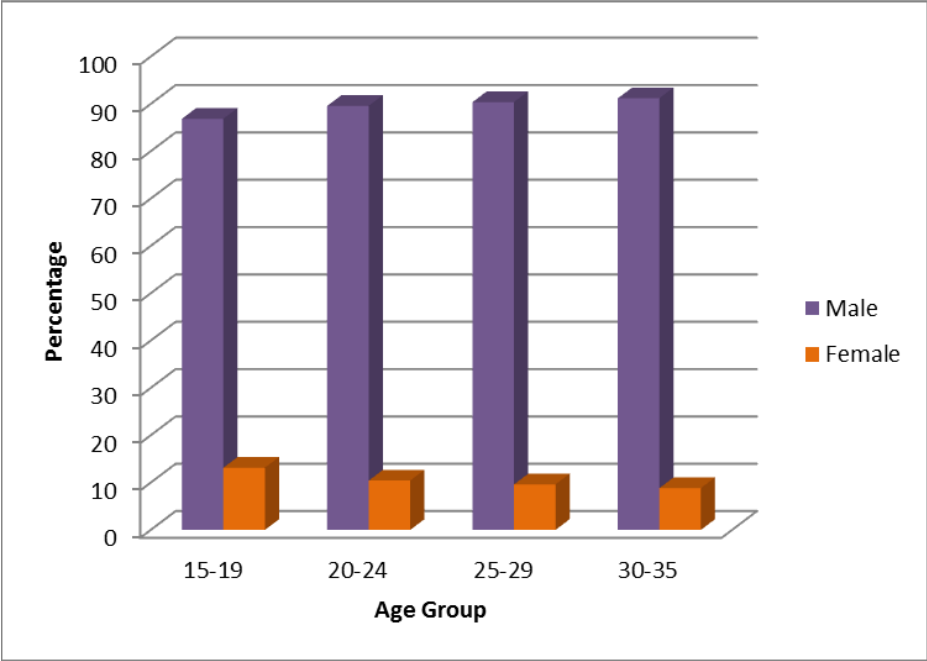


Fig 16.8: show that more Nigerian youths (37.0 per cent) suffer from Poliomyelitis than visual impairment (34.2 per cent) and partial paralysis (13.5 per cent). However, there are variations in the proportion of youths by form of disability experienced. More youths from Bayelsa (55.4 per cent) suffer from Poliomyelitis than they do from visual impairment (27.3 per cent) and partial paralysis (17.3 per cent) while more youths from Kano (48.9 per cent) were partially paralyzed compared to their experience of poliomyelitis (20.5 per cent) and visual impairment (20.2 per cent). On the other hand, a higher proportion of youths in Osun state (48.3 per cent) were visually impaired when compared with their experience of partial paralysis (26.9 per cent) and poliomyelitis (24.8 per cent).



In Fig 16.9, age group 15 – 19, males accounted for 86.86 percent disability and females were 13.14 percent; in age group 20 – 24, males recorded 89.58 percent while females recorded 10.42 percent. In age groups 29 – 29 and 30 – 35, males accounted for 90.37 and 91.17 percent while females recorded 9.63 and 8.83 percent disability respectively.
